He was married to Miss Eula B. Hollifield on December 16, 1891.


Mr. Northcutt was a native of Comanche County and moved to Desdemona in the early 20's where he made his home until







For instance, "If everyone directly or indirectly interested in Southwest Spanish Peanuts would buy one to five pounds of Spanish Peanuts, or peanut butter next week - - ? ? You figure out theanswer."

Lower Right:-Hubert Craddock, co-owner of the King Theatre in Gorman, was roasting some Spanish Peanuts in Popcorn Machine one evening for his daughter, Kay Anne. What is more tantalizing to the appetite than peanuts pasting? A show patron wanted to know if they were for sale. Seeing the possibility for increased income, Hubert made the sale. Starting with a couple of pounds he has increased his sales about forty pounds a week.


As Hubert stated, "Our income depends largely on the peanut grower and I am glad to sell peawater softener, hot water tank. nuts on that account. Now, if we can get several hundred small shows using a minimum of forty pounds a week, not counting the larger shows, - -say 100 shows sell forty pounds each per week That is 104 tons of peanuts a year. This is only one of the many ways you can help boost peanut sales.

Help create a market to use surplus peanuts and increased acreage will take care if itself.




