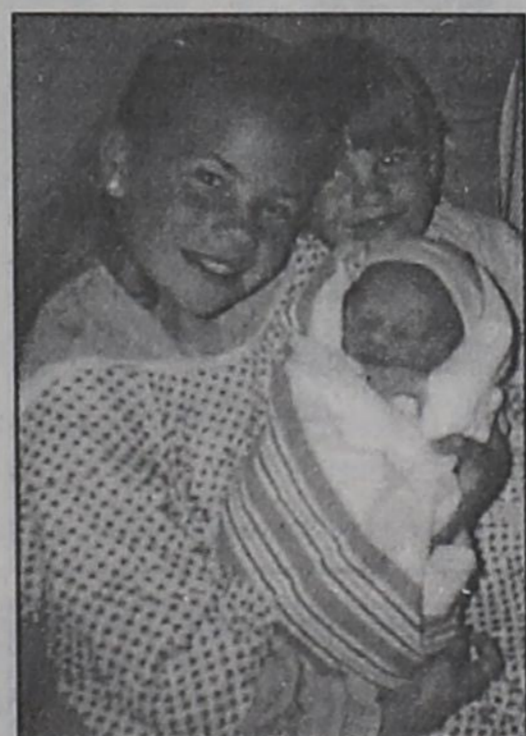
No City Or School Election This Year

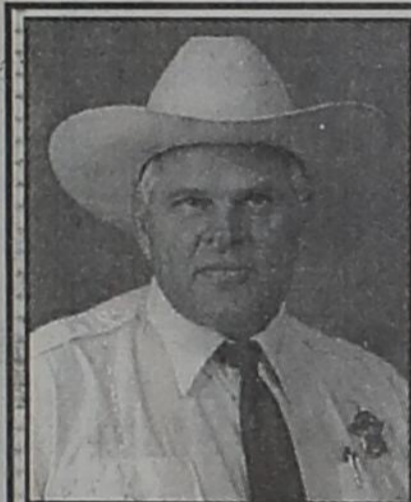
Jr. Hi. Band Receives Division I Fifth Grade Band Division II

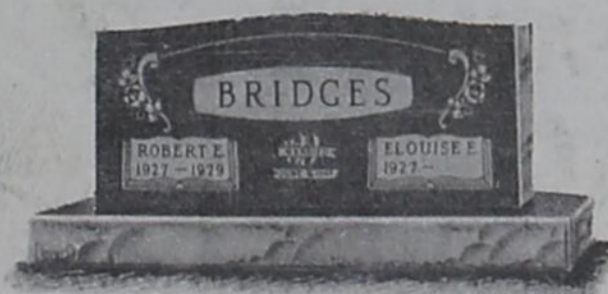

cide disposal sites in April and farmers and ranchers from across the state are invited to dispose of un-needed waste pesticides and agricultural chemicals.

Clifford Hoelscher, professor and Extension specialist, Bryan, said, "Our goal is to improve the environment by getting waste material properly disposed."

The Extension Service has contracted with a private pesticide disposal company to collect and dispose of the waste chemicals. The company takes the materials out of state where they are incinerated.

More than 700 tons of waste pesticides have been collected by the program. Sixty-six tons were disposed in 1995 alone.

Only three collection sites are scheduled. There will be a collection site in La Feria in Cameron county on April 11, Circleville in Williamson County on April 11, Circleville in Williamson County on April 16, and Stanton in Martin County on April 19.

The Circleville collection site will also be taking empty pesticide containers for recycling. Hoelscher said these containers must be triple rinsed in order to be accepted.

He added that farmers and ranchers need to secure and pack all materials so they do not spill or fall from their vehicle during transport. He said any specific questions on the transport of pesticides could be answered in the Regional Pesticide Disposal Bulletin which is available in all county offices.

Farmers and Ranchers are reminded the contractor working with the pesticide disposal project will not accept explosives, fertilizers, paint, 245-T or pentachlorophenol because they require special handling. All other agricultural chemicals will be accepted for disposal.

Extension agents will be coordinating the event taking surveys to see how far people have traveled and how much pesticide they are disposing with the program.

"We want to stress that it's free and there are no questions asked," Hoelscher said. "We do a survey, but it's just to check the success of the program."

Hoelscher said money for the projects if coming from chemical companies in their registration fee which they must pay to seal their products in the state. He said to taxpayer dollars are being used for the program, but the budget is limited.

He added these events are the only ones planned for this year so far and they will be conducted rain or shine.

Southwest Field Day Set For Comanche Dairy

The 1996 Southwest Dairy Field Day will be held May 9 at the Ray Johnston Dairy in Comanche, Texas from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Programs will include: heat stress, BST management, parlor equipment evaluation, silage management, ration particle size evaluation and composting dairy waste. Informational exhibits will be displayed throughout the day.

The host operation includes 1,590 cows with a rolling herd average of 25,600 pounds of milk, 818 pounds of protein and 894 pounds of fat on 3 milkings per day. Cattle are grouped according to age and production and milked in a modern double 20 parallel parlor. The herd is on DHIA test. The operation has taken several steps to increase cow comfort in the summer heat, including the addition of misters and fans in the holding area and a freestall barn for high producing cows. The ration base includes corn silage, alfalfa hay and coastal bermudagrass.

Dry cows are managed in groups, with all cows within 30 days of calving being primed for the next lactation. The operation includes 1,000 acres of crop land, with approximately 350 acres in corn, 150 acres in small grain and 570 acres in coastal bermudagrass. Emphasis on the breeding program allows this operation to raise a majority of the herd's replacement heifers, with a few additional animals being purchased. All animals are bred using artificial insemination.

Ray is joined in the management of the operation by his wife Debbie (who manages the books) and his father Thomas who helps oversee the day to day farming operation, and Brad Barnett, Dairy Manager. Other family members involved include Ray and

Debbie's daughters RaeAnn and Ruth.

The dairy is located north of Comanche. From Highway 377 in Comanche, go north on Highway 36 1.5 miles to the first gravel road and turn left to the dairy. Signs will mark the route. The Southwest Dairy Field Day is co-sponsored by Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Production Credit Association, and Monsanto. Lunch will be provided to all attendees, courtesy of the industry sponsor.

HMC Announces Affiliation With M.D. Anderson

Officials at Hendrick Medical Center announced today an affiliation agreement with M.D. Anderson Cancer Center Outreach Corp. and plans to construct an outpatient cancer center on the Hendrick campus.

All of these efforts are designed to expand and improve cancer services in the Texas Midwest, said Michael C. Waters, president of Hendrick Medical Center.

The expansion of Hendrick Medical Center's Ambulatory Surgery building and conversion of that resource to an outpatient cancer center will provide the people of the Texas Midwest with facilities to receive high-tech treatments for cancer.

The facility will include enhanced chemotherapy rooms, exam rooms, educational facilities for cancer prevention and diagnosis, and community rooms.

The expansion will be a \$5 million project funded through philanthropic means. The Hendrick Medical Center Auxiliary has pledged \$600,000 to the effort, and the Hendrick Medical Center Foundation has secured a matching grant from a foundation for \$1.2 million.

Other foundations and individuals are being approached because the need is evident for a facility for people of this region to be treated for cancer at home with the type of guarantee for high quality care that an alliance would afford.

"And partnering with M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, one of the country's original three federally-designated Comprehensive Cancer Centers, will assure residents of this area they will receive the most technologically advanced care possible right here in Abilene," Waters said.

Hendrick and M.D. Anderson, located in Houston, have agreed to collaborate in developing a coordinated, comprehensive program for cancer services to serve the people of the Texas Midwest under the name M.D. Anderson Outreach Corporation -- Hendrick. The two groups will work jointly to develop a community-based cancer program that will enhance cancer care in Abilene and the surrounding counties.

We enhance this opportunity to work (collaboratively with Hendrick to jointly create a program that provides better coordinated cancer services in the patient's home community," said Robert N. Shaw, president and CEO of the M.D. Anderson Outreach Corp., a not-for-profit entity created in 1989 to extend M.D. Anderson's multidisciplinary approach to cancer care.

Waters said a Hendrick Medical Center committee appointed by the Hendrick Board of Trustees has visited cancer centers across the state, and "we are committed to bringing high quality, cost efficient care to the people of the Texas Midwest, and we think the relationship we are establishing with M.D. Anderson is a natural bond to do this."

Dr. Jack Ramsey, one of Hendrick Medical Center's radiology oncologists, said the relationship developing between Hendrick and M.D. Anderson will allow the level of care for cancer patients to increase at Hendrick. "This affiliation will serve our patients well because Hendrick and M.D. Anderson have parallel missions that put the patient first."

Dr. Charles M. Balch, M.D. Anderson's executive vice president for health affairs, said, "Community-based collaborative efforts like the one between M.D. Anderson and Hendrick will serve as a model for community innovation and collaboration to make comprehensive quality cancer care

available in the most accessible form possible."

M.D. Anderson is Texas' only federally-designated Comprehensive Cancer Center specializing in cancer treatment, research, education and prevention.

These kinds of unique alignments are important to the future of healthcare, delivery, especially when healthcare resources may shrink, Waters said, "With this affiliation, we can assure that all patients in Abilene will have access to those components necessary to treat all stages and all forms of cancer."

The relationship with M.D. Anderson opens as many doors for Abilene physicians as it does for patients, said Dr. JOe Hall chief of the medical staff at Hendrick Medical Center. "We are excited about the educational opportunities for our physicians. They will have direct links to M.D. Anderson physicians for conferencing, discussing issues of protocol and accessing new telemedicine opportunities."

"Efforts such as this will not only position Hendrick to better serve the people within our 22-county service area, but it will make obvious the fact that Hendrick will do whatever necessary to ensure high-quality healthcare for people of the Texas Midwest. We are here for life," Waters said.

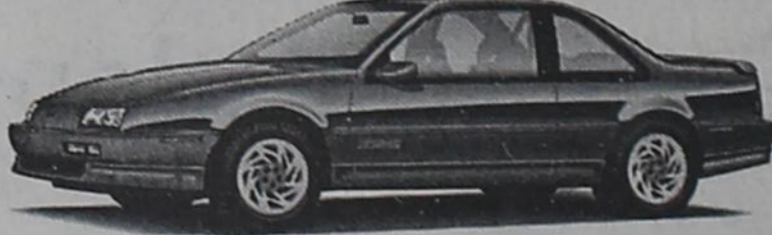
