Also in the second period the Cub quarterback, Kenny Welch, sneaked 2 yards for a touchdown and added the point the same way to give the Cubs a 28-0 lead at the half.

After the third period started it was Welch again on a 1-yard sneak for the touchdown and he again added the extra point to make the final score 28-0.

The Cub reserves took over at this point and played on even terms with the Dublin team for remainder of the game.

The line play of the Cubs was sharp both on defense and offense. It was led by Dick Townley, Center, Ryan Preston and Don Everton, Guards, Max Grice and Alfred Grice, Tackles and Jerry Yates, Benny Frasier and Thomas Snider at ends. Backs, Anderson, Welch, Overstreet, and James Whitlock handled the ball carrying chores.

Panthers Lose To Baird; Meet Wylie For First District Battle Friday

Plagued by fumbles and a leaky defense, the Gorman Panthers were soundly beaten by the Baird Bears in the Bear's Den last Friday night at Baird. The Panthers fumbled 10 times and lost the ball 6 times due to these fumbles. Since they lost the ball six times on fumbles, the Panthers had to punt only once and that punt was blocked. The final score was Baird 33, Gorman 6.

Since Co-Captain "Buck" Welch was unable to play because of a leg injury, a slight change-up in the backfield was necessary. Max Pierce, who usually plays quarterback, was shifted to fullback. Jerry Warren, substitute for Max Pierce, played his first full game at quarterback. Jerry played a good game, considering that this was his first full game at quarterback. Starting center Johnny Rodgers was also unable to play due to injury.

The Bears received the kickoff and, sparked by the running of Paul Jones and Jimmy Barnes, marched 59 yards for their first touchdown. Paul Jones scooted over for the score from the 6 yard line, and then passed to Bobby Joy for the extra point. A few minutes later the Panthers were forced to punt from their 23-yard line. The punt was blocked and recovered by the Bears on the 13-yard line. From there, the Bears ran two plays, and Donald Jones ran 6 yards for the score. The extra point try was unsuccessful, and the score stood, Baird 13, Gorman 0, at the end of the first half. The Bears were threatening to score from the 17 yard line as the half ended.

To begin the second half, the Panthers received the kickoff and ran three plays before fumbling on the Baird 48-yard line. The Bears recovered the ball, and drove the distance to the goal in six plays. Paul Jones scampered 26 yards for the score. The extra

point attempt was blocked by Pierce.

The Panthers received the kickoff and began a march toward the promise land. The Panthers moved 71 yards in 12 plays and were on the 2-yard line when bad luck knocked again. The Panthers fumbled, and the Bears recovered to end the scoring threat. The march featured 12 and 10 yard gains by Brown, and gains of 7, 13, and 5 yards by Pierce. Warren made a fine 10 yard gain also. The score at the end of the third quarter, 19-0 in Baird's favor.

In the fourth quarter, the Bears recovered another Panther fumble. The Bears ran a few plays, and then Jimmy Barnes dashed 58 yards for a touchdown. The extra point try was good. Score 26-0.

The Panthers took the kickoff, ran a few plays, and then Pierce scooted 60 yards around left end for the lone Gorman score. The extra point kick was wide. Score 26-6.

The Bears received the kick after the score and went for another touchdown. The Bears ran a few plays and then Jimmy Barnes broke loose again and raced 52 yards for paydirt. The extra point was good. That ended the scoring. Final score, Baird 33, Gorman 6.

Jimmy Barnes was the leader in offense for the Bears. He made 125 yards in 9 carries, which included his touchdown runs of 58 and 52 yards. Paul Jones was the other workhorse for Baird, making 115 yards in 19 carries.

Pierce was again the offensive leader for Gorman. He made 163 yards in 17 carries for almost 9.6 yards per carry. Brown made 51 yards in 9 carries for an average of 5.6 per carry. Snider made 26 yards in 7 carries for a 3.7 average. Warren made 20 yards in 7 carries for almost 3 yards per carry.

Friday night the Panthers go to Wylie High of Abilene for their first district game. Wylie has not won a game this season. They lost their first three games and then tied Aspermont, 0-0, last Friday night. Merkel beat them 40-6 in their first game. For a comparison, Merkel routed East land, 33-7, last Friday night.

Miracle of Color TV To Be Seen at Fair

Thousands of Texans will see the electronic miracle of color television for the first time at the 1955 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 7-23. A number of "live" programs will be produced each day in the color TV studios in the Agriculture Building, adding up to a total of almost 100 hours of programming. In addition to local programs presented by the two Dallas TV stations, the State Fair will present the daily program, "Color Kaleidoscope," over a "closed circuit," which can be picked up only on the giant movie-size screen in the International Theater in the General Exhibits Building, and on all the dozens of color TV sets around the fairgrounds.

New 1956 Model Cars To Be Shown at Fair

Many of the brand new 1956 model cars will be unveiled for the first time in Texas during the 39th Southwestern Automotive Exposition at the 1955 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 7-23. 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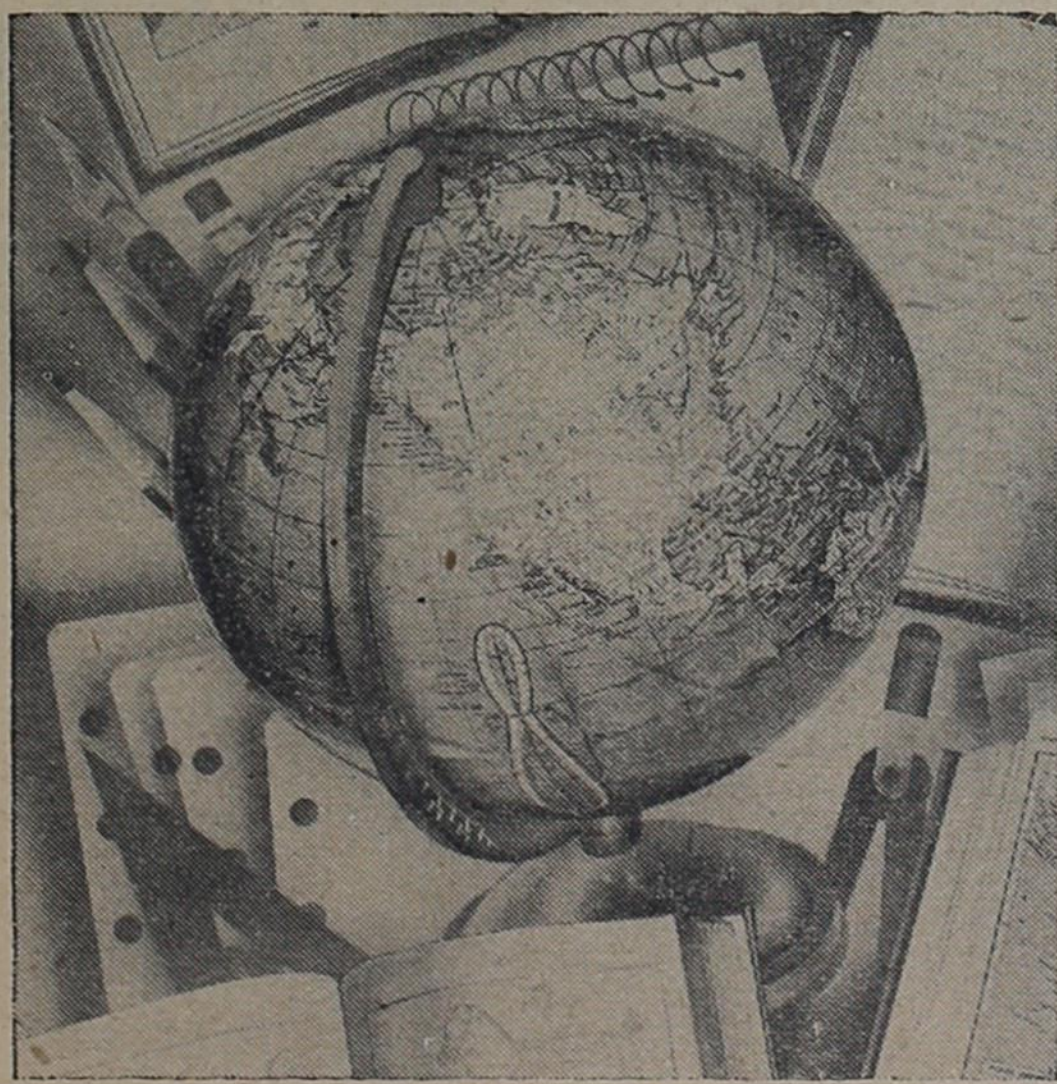

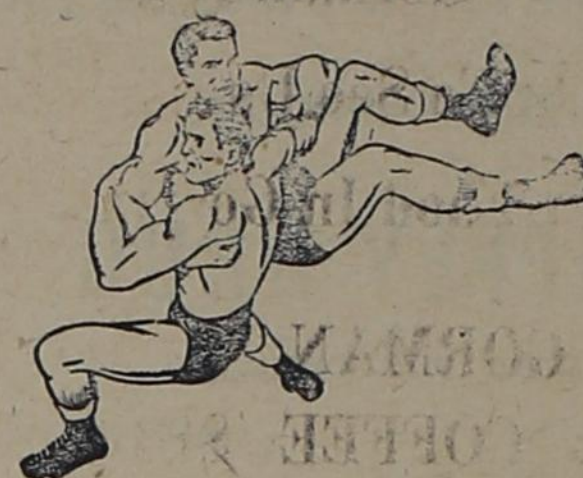

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All the Way My Saviour Leads Me

A prayer is answered . . . and Fanny Crosby writes another hymn

Among many characteristics of the blind poetess Fanny Crosby, three stand out. She always carried a little American flag. She either held it in her hand or kept it in her bag and it was buried with her when she died in 1915 at the age of 95. Though blinded in infancy, the petite "Aunt Fanny" (she was Mrs. Alexander Van Alstyne in private life) greeted friends and strangers alike with a cheerful "God bless your dear soul!" And she never attempted to write a hymn without first kneeling in prayer. So Fanny Crosby spent considerable time on her knees. She wrote no less than 8,000 songs. So many that critics have said the chief fault with her work lies in that she was too prolific. But none can deny that many "pearls are found among the oyster shells."

Under contract for three hymns a week, Miss Crosby was often under pressure to meet deadlines. It was under such circumstances in 1869 that

she tried to write words for a tune composer W. H. Doane had sent her. But she couldn't write. Then she remembered she had forgotten her prayer. Rising from her knees, she dictated as fast as her assistant could write, words for the famous hymn, "Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross."

But one day in 1874 Fanny Crosby prayed for more material things. She had run short of money and needed \$5 even change. There was no time to draw on her publishers, so she simply prayed for the money. Her prayer ended, she was walking to and fro in her room trying to "get into mood" for another hymn when an admirer called. Greeting the stranger with "God bless your dear soul," the two chatted briefly.

In the parting handshake the admirer left something in the hymn-writer's hand. It was \$5 . . . even change. Rising from a prayer of thanks, the blind poetess wrote

All the way my Saviour leads me;
 What have I to ask beside?
 Can I doubt His tender mercy,
 Who through life has been my Guide?
 Heavenly peace, divinest comfort,
 Here by faith in Him to dwell!
 For I know, whate'er befell me,
 Jesus doeth all things well.

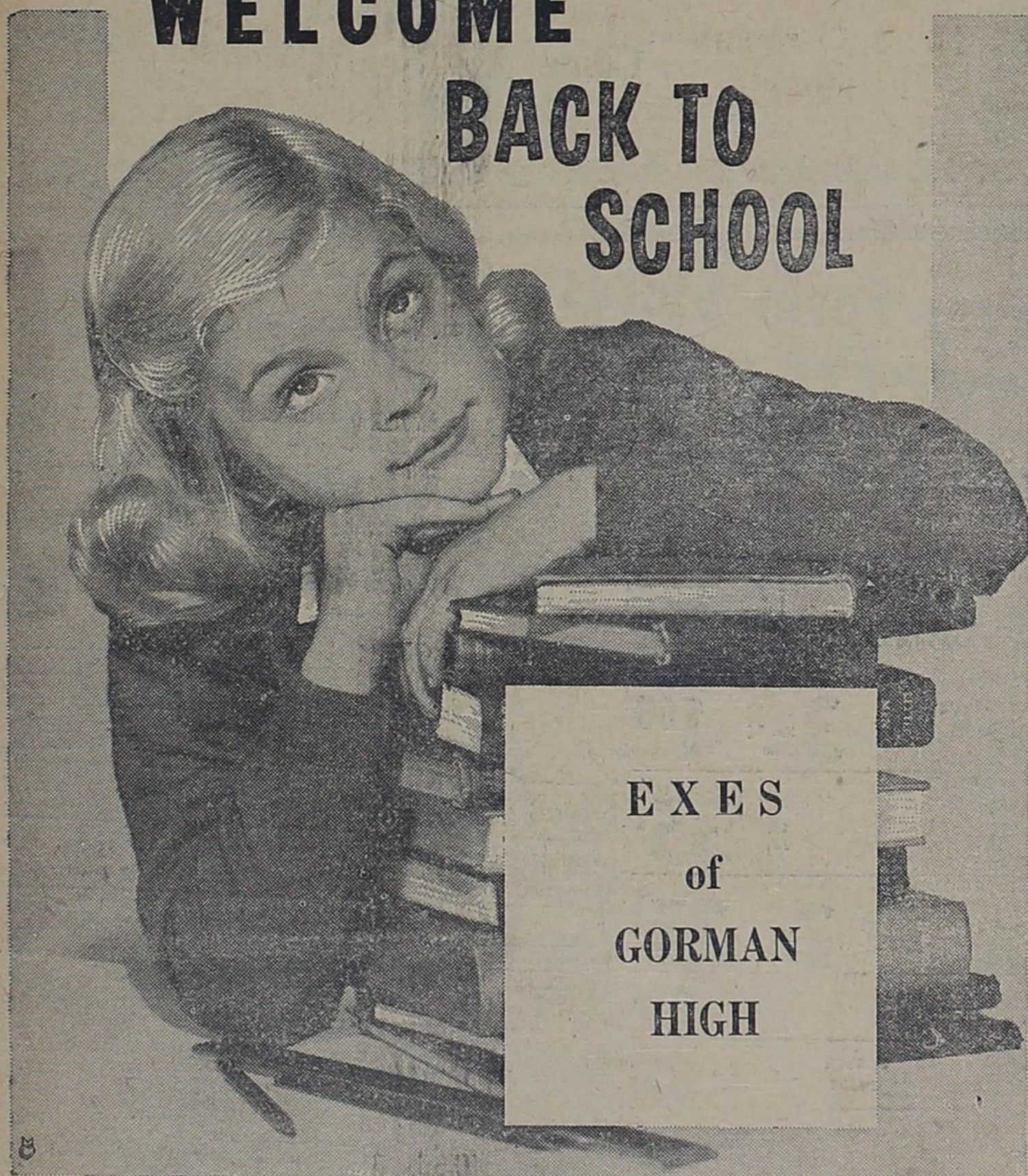

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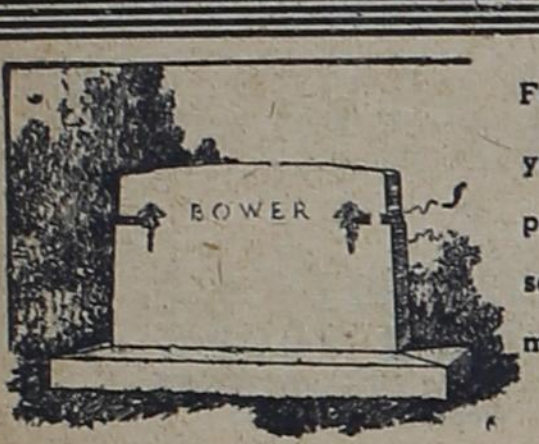

There are 1,057 different judging events in the Pan-American Livestock Exposition, the Junior Livestock Show and the Poultry Shows. Pan-American runs Oct. 8-16, the junior show Oct. 17-22. There are horse shows each of the fair's three weekends. A total of \$88,528 in premiums will be awarded.

Livestock classes include Hereford, Aberdeen-Angus, Brahm, Santa Gertrudis and Shorthorn beef cattle; Jersey, Guernsey, Ayrshire, Holstein-Friesian and Milking Shorthorn dairy cattle; eight breeds of swine, six of sheep and one of goats; plus Quarter horses, Palominos and Shetland ponies.
