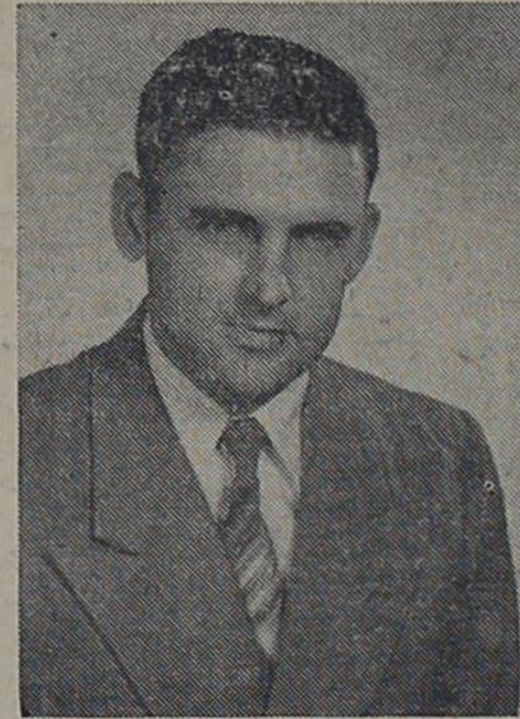

The honoree enjoyed the many nice and beautiful gifts.

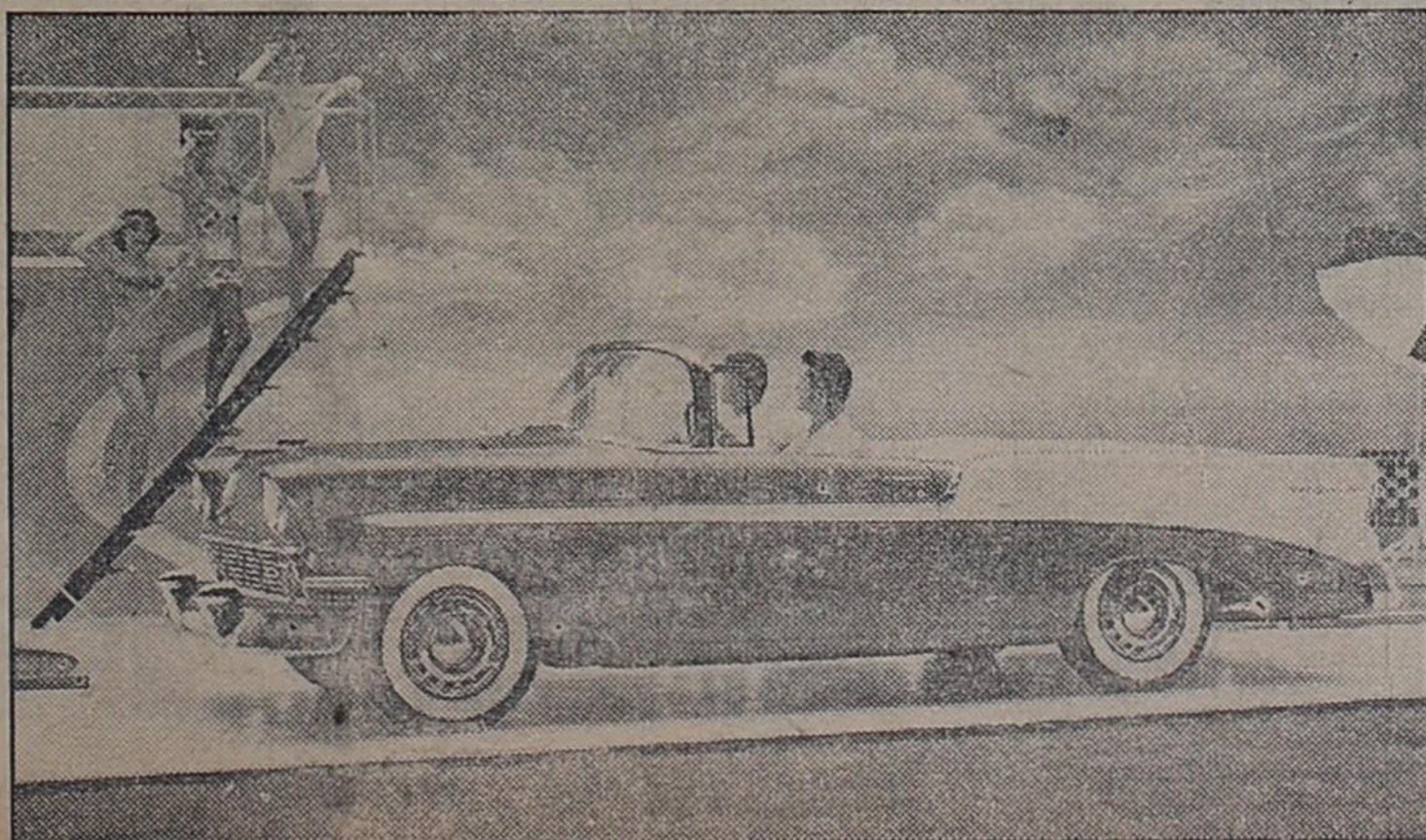

AUSTIN, TEX. - Texas, and possibly the nation, may have a new political group - the "moderates."

Sen. Johnson started it when he commented that he was neither a liberal nor a conservative, but that he was a "moderate."

Since then the term has cropped up with increasing frequency in comments by leading figures over the state.

Governor Shivers has announced that he plans a tour into other

With a Johnson-for-president move gaining momentum, Shivers commented, when asked if Sen. Johnson fitted the middle of-the-road- pattern, that he seemed "more moderate than extreme."

The Governor emphasized that he will not be working for any specific candidate on his tour. He also has no view, he said, of trying to form a "coalition" of South erns, as has been suggested. "I hope to get into the West, the Middle West and possibly the East," he said.

### Creeping Harmony

Harmony in the Texas Democratic Party moved slowly. Speaker Sam Raybourn, leader of the liberals, has demanded a state delegate pledged to support the party nominee.

Governor Shivers, conservative leader, has opposed an advance pledge to support "any nominee."

Raybourn, however, has spoken approvingly of Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey, recently named national committeeman with the hope of bringing the two factions together.

Meanwhile the conservation Democratic State Executive Committee has launched a drive to get 3,500,00 persons to pay poll taxes or secure exemptions, for a big turnout next year. It expressed hope for 30,000 delegates at the convention set for May 26 in Dallas.

Rival liberalist have charged that the State Committee has "frozen" hotel space in Dallas with the design of keeping the liberals away.

### Committee Clears Shepperd

In a closed session, a Texas Bar Association grievance committee voted to take no action on remarks Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd made about the Court of Criminal Appeals and Judge Lloyd W. Davidson.

Shepperd frequently has expressed himself as being opposed to closed sessions. He went to the meeting with a marked rule book containing passages on open and closed sessions of grievance committee, and requested that the hearing be open. The committee overrode the request.

Newsman, sent by their respective newspapers to report the committee meeting, were told to leave the room before the committee convened. No previous announcement of the session's being closed was made.

The hearing resulted after the election of Judge Davidson brought an about face in 104 indictments in turbulent Duval Co. Shepperd commented that Davidson had expressed an opinion on the cases before they were presented to the court.

Following their four-hour session, the grievance committee said they had considered the matter and found that "no action should be taken. The matter is closed."

### Highway Become Laboratories

Research to determine specific causes of injuries in passenger automobile accidents begins on Texas rural highways this week.

Sponsoring the cooperative program are the Texas Highway Patrol, Texas State Department of Health, and Cornell University Medical College.

Purpose of the project is to discover exactly what kills persons in traffic accidents. The inquiry may lead to a major revolution of car design.

### Centex Chief's Meet

Police chiefs from seven cities and patrolmen from Central Texas counties met in Austin to discuss measures for slowing an area traffic toll which now nears an all time record.

Safe Driving Day, set by President Eisenhower for Dec. 1, will begin this year ten days before that date and extend 10 days after, according to an announcement by Capt. Jim Musick, at the meeting. Musick is manager of the Texas Safety Association.

He called on policeman and patrolman to be particularly alert and much more severe on traffic violations during the period.

### New Secretary of State

Texas' third secretary in nine months has been appointed by Governor Shivers, effective Nov. 1. He is 34-year-old Tom Reavley, Jasper attorney.

Reavley succeeds A. M. Muldrow of Brownfield who took the office last February after C. E. Fulgham of Lubbock resigned. Muldrow will return to business interests.

Reavley is a World War II Navy veteran, graduate of the University of Texas and a Harvard law graduate.

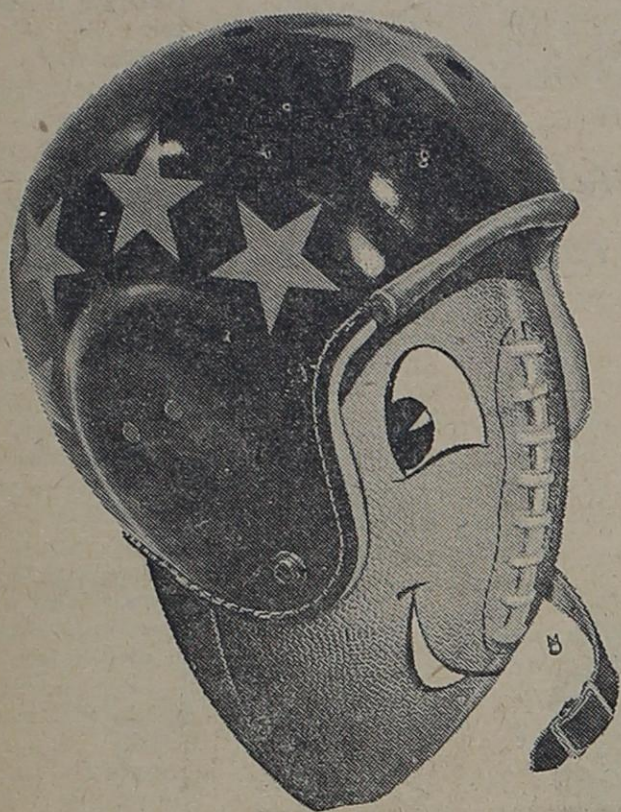

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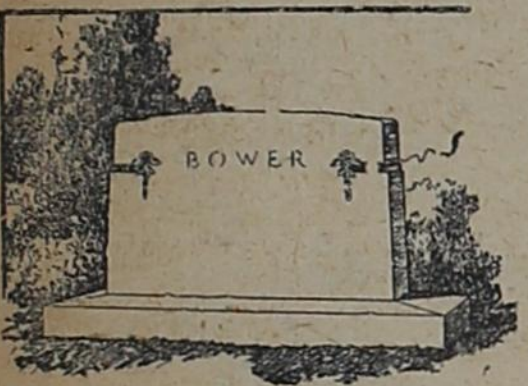

Port Elizabeth,  
South Africa  
October 15, 1955

Dear Folks,

Just a note to let you hear from us. On Sept. 9, we received word from our travel agency in New York that they had been able to secure passage on the S. S. African Endeavor sailing Sept. 10. That was the ship we had previously been scheduled to leave on - also the one the Bowlins were sailing on. The word came one week before we had to be in New York, so we were quite busy getting our

things packed and ready to go. We were in New York four days and enjoyed it very much. One night we went to Madison Square Garden to the Ice Capades of 1956. Enjoyed that very much. Esther thoroughly enjoyed it and tried for several days to ice skate.

Our ship left the New York harbor about 3:00 p. m. Tuesday, Sept. 20. Shortly after boarding the ship we met a Methodist missionary couple and their 20 month old daughter who were going to So. 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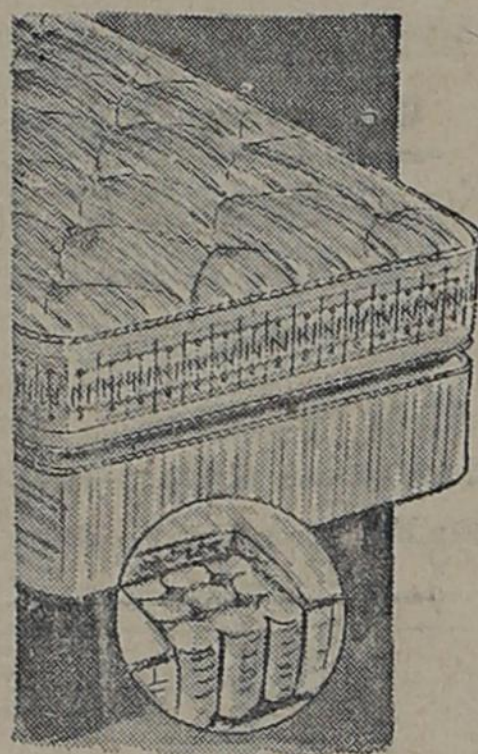
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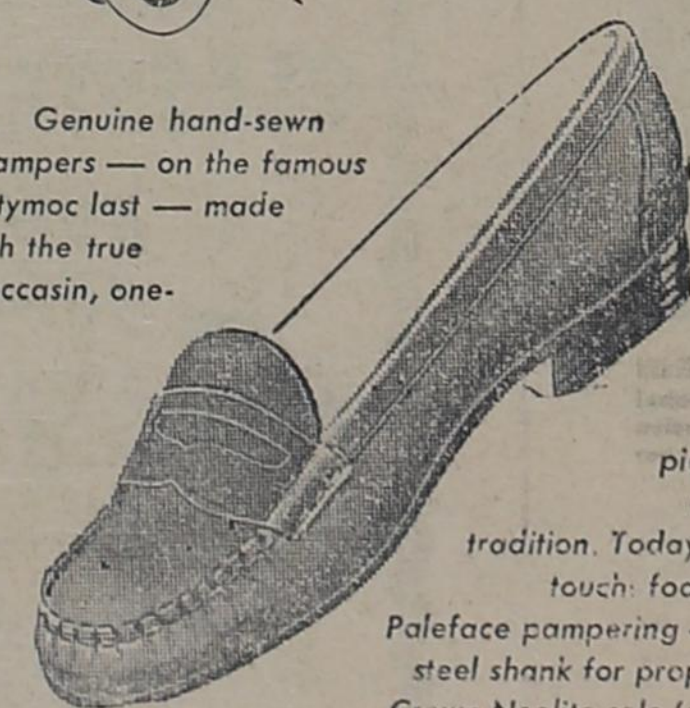

## A Hymn Is Born

## Alas! And Did My Saviour Bleed

A preacher's visit lasts 36 years

The Lord Mayor was there. Like other elite members of London's Mark Lane Church, his honor rarely missed a sermon by the renowned Dr. Watts.

Isaac Watts was young for the pulpit at Mark Lane. Thirty-two he was now, but he had been at the big church ever since he was 26. He was small, just five feet—and his big head made his small body look even smaller and his long hook nose made his homely face even uglier. He was sickly, too. Hardly had he seen a well day since smallpox nearly killed him when he was 15. At Mark Lane he rarely preached two Sundays in succession, but the congregation wouldn't let him quit. They hired an assistant and told Dr. Watts to preach when he felt like it.

A few years after his illness Watts was sought out by a beautiful lady who fell in love with him through his poetry. Her name was Elizabeth Singer and Watts fell hand over heels in love with her. He proposed marriage, but Miss Singer shied away in disappointment and said she "admired the jewel but could never love the casket." Abandoning hope of marriage, the little man wrote, "How vain are

all things here below . . . How false and yet how fair." Isaac Watts preached that Sunday in 1712, but he didn't feel like it. So the Lord Mayor and Lady Abney carried him out to their mansion in the country. A week's rest, they said, would do him good.

At the Abney home Watts fell in love again—with the three little daughters of his hosts. He wrote verses for them about "the busy little bee" and dogs that "delight to bark and bite" and a cradle song that began, "Hush, my dear, lie still and slumber; Holy angels guard thy bed." The Abneys became so attached to their guest that they wouldn't let him leave. In 1720 Watts collected his juvenile verse into his classic "Divine and Moral Songs for Children." The book sold 80,000 copies a year and six generations were raised on it. Watts died, still a bachelor, at the Abney home in 1748—36 years after going there for a week's rest.

Perhaps the little man was thinking of his pocket-marked face and dwarf body when he wrote one of the greatest hymns that has ever been written . . .

Alas, and did my Saviour bleed?  
And did my Sovereign die?  
Would He devote that sacred head  
For such a worm as I?

Was it for crimes that I have done,  
He groined upon the tree?  
Amazing pity! Grace unknown!  
And love beyond degree!

Well might the sun in darkness hide,
