

### RULES FOR TURNING IN A FIRE ALARM

FIRST - Ring for the telephone operator. When you are talking to the operator, you have the Fire Dept. It is not necessary to ask for the Fire Dept.; the operator turns in the fire alam.

SECOND - The telephone operator needs to know two facts: 1. Location of fire. 2. Type of fire. (Such as grass fire or house

Also remember that the telephone company is declared on an emergency basis when there is a fire, so please limit calls to one minute for at least 10 or 15 minutes after a fire alarm. This allows the telephone lines to remain open for emergency calls from firemen or others regarding assistance such as more help needed, doctors needed, ambulance service needed, etc. Never call the operator to ask where
