Improvements On Winkler Street To Begin This Week

City Manager Ben R. Townley told the Progress Wednesday afternoon that preparatory work would begin this week on Winkler Street just south of the railroad to West Roberts Street for paving in case that plans are completed so that the paving contractor can begin work.

The City has agreed to do the shaping, grading, and applying of crushed rock base for the streets to be paved, so that the streets will be ready for paving if and when the paving contractor comes. Property owners on the block of Winkler Street described above have all deposited their money at the City Office to pay for the paving. However, the paving contractor will not begin work on any block of a street until 5 blocks of paving can be contracted. It would be unprofitable for the contractor to move his equipment and machinery to Gorman for less than 5 blocks of paving. The paving contractor is W. H. McGee of Bridgeport, Texas. He has done paving work in several towns in this area. All of the towns are well satisfied with the paving work he has done for them.

City Manager Townley said that property owners interested in having their streets paved should make arrangements to have the money to pay for the paving in the City Office by next week, so that the work can be begun. If it is not possible to obtain 5 blocks to be paved, the money will be refunded to the property owners who have deposited their money at the City Office.

Work Underway On New Warehouse At Gorman Peanut

Construction was started August 27 on a new peanut storage warehouse for Gorman Peanut Company. The warehouse will be located across the railroad from the old fertilizer building. Ross and Sons Construction Co. of Brownwood is laying the cement and steel foundation and floor. Ross and Sons is the company of Rueben Ross and sons, Bob and Charles. Rueben is the son of the late Tip Ross of Gorman. Bob and Charles attended school in Gorman.

The building will be an all-steel construction with concrete floor. The steel work will be done by Braden Steel Co. of Tulsa, Okla. The warehouse will not be completed until about the latter part of November. It will have a 5,000 ton capacity for peanuts, and will be 272 feet long, 60 feet wide, and 20 feet high.

A new feature of the building that has not been possible before will be an easier way of transferring the peanuts from railroad cars to the new warehouse. The sacks of peanuts will be cut open in the railroad cars, and the peanuts will be poured onto a conveyor belt. The conveyor belt will carry the peanuts to the new warehouse for storage in bulk.

Work To Begin On Farm Road 2214

County Commissioner B. M. Bennett informed the Progress on Tuesday morning that he and his men will begin fencing land this week for the right-of-way of Farm Road 2214, which will be from Staff to Alameda.

The State Highway Department will start accepting bids in the next few weeks for construction companies to obtain the lowest bidding company for the job of constructing the road.

CLASS AA DE LEON OVERPOWERS PANTHERS 25-0 IN OPENING GAME

The Class AA De Leon Bearcats proved to be too much for the Class B Gorman Panthers last Friday night as they pounded out a 25-0 victory at Gorman. It was the first game of the season for both teams. De Leon gained its victory by using mostly ground plays through the tackles and on end sweeps. The Bearcats also took advantage of mistakes made by the Panthers. Gorman had 7 five-yard penalties, mostly off-sides, which cut down on their yardage gained.

Big guns for the Bearcats were halfbacks Brownlee and Lamb. Brownlee had 105 yards on 11 carries, while Lamb, who was any thing but a "lamb", had 85 yards on 15 tries. These two boys alternated at carrying the ball for most of the game.

The Bearcats scored one touchdown in each quarter. Quarterback C. M. Caraway scored the first tally on a keeper play for 1 yard, after Brownlee and Lamb had alternated at carrying the ball for 42 yards. Halfback Bruce McGinnis booted the extra point, his only success in 4 attempts.

After recovering a fumble on the Gorman 38-yard line, De Leon required only two plays to score again. Lamb raced the final 28 yards around right end, after moving the ball 10 yards on the previous play. This score came in the second quarter.

In the third quarter a 48-yard drive by the Bearcats brought them to pay dirt again. Brownlee

made the last 6 yards and the score.

Reserve quarterback Whitehurst made the final touchdown for De Leon on a keeper play for 8 yards around left end. This score was made in the fourth quarter, when mostly reserves were playing for De Leon.

There were moments in the game when Gorman threatened to score. In the second quarter the Panthers recovered a De Leon fumble on the Gorman 32-yard line. On the first play Corky Brown got some good blocking and ran 28 yards before being pulled down from behind by the last De Leon player between him and the goal. The drive died on the De Leon 30-yard line, however.

In the fourth quarter the Panthers received an excellent scoring opportunity when a bad snapback from center went over the De Leon kicker's head on fourth down and Gorman was awarded the ball on the De Leon 10-yard line. But the Panthers could only reach the 4-yard line before losing the ball on downs. Late in the fourth quarter De Leon fumbled on their own 10-yard line with the Panthers recovering. Again the Panthers failed to reach the goal stripe.

Even in defeat, some of the Panthers were outstanding. Freshman Fullback John Brinegar, who moved here only a few weeks ago, showed great promise. He gained 31 yards in 10 carries, to rank second to Co-captain Corky Brown in rushing. Corky made 60 in 14 tries for an average of 4.28 yards per carry. Brinegar had an average of 3.1 yards per carry. Eddie Gregg had 8 yards on 6 tries. Quarterback Jerry Warren, who didn't get to play much because of a back injury, made 6 yards on 3 attempts. Co-captain Freddie Rodgers was another injured Panther who saw only limited action. His right leg was still ailing.

In the line, Tackle Jerry Overstreet set a good example in blocking and tackling.

Tonight, Thursday at 8 p. m. the Panthers travel to Early High located on the Comanche-Brownwood highway before entering Brownwood. The date of the game was changed from Friday, Sept. 14, to Thursday, Sept. 13, because Brownwood High School has their first home game on this Friday night and this would have lessened the crowd at the Early, High-Gorman game.

Early High is a Class B team as is Gorman, so the Panthers will be playing on more even terms tonight. Gorman won over Early last season 7-0, in a close game. Not much is known about Early's team this season, as this will be their first game. Early was the champion of its football district last season.



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
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FRESHMAN NEWS

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


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
