New, Leading Specialty Acts Booked For '56 Dublin Rodeo, Opening 29th

Dublin, (Spl) - It's rodeo time in Dublin, home of the Dublin Pre-Madison Square Garden World Championship Rodeo.

Final preparations are underway in Dublin for raising the curtain on the 17th annual Dublin World Championship Rodeo, to open for a four-day stand on Wednesday, August 29.

Everett Colborn, nationally known rodeo producer who annually produces the Dublin Rodeo, has promised some of the wildest and toughest animals will be on hand to match wits and brawn with those of the leading rodeo performers throughout the United States.

The Dublin Rodeo annually attracts scores of contestants in the various events, many of them leading contenders for Rodeo Cowboy Association championships, a fact which has won wide acclaim for this world championship event.

Immediately following completion of the local rodeo, which runs through Saturday, September 1, rodeo stock and equipment from Colborn's Lightning C Ranch, together with many of the contestants, is loaded on a special train en route to New York and the annual Madison Square Garden rodeo performance.

Colborn also produces rodeos at Boston, Houston, San Antonio, Fort Madison, Iowa, and several other major cities throughout the United States and Texas.

In addition to top ranking rodeo performers, Colborn has booked leading specialty acts for entertainment of visitors to the 17th Dublin Rodeo. Among the acts engaged for this year's performances are Fay Kirkwood, appearing for the first time here, with her high-stepping Crown Jewel, rated as the "princess of horsedom" and one of the finest dressage thoroughbreds performing at major events.

Miss Kirkwood's unchallenged ability complements her handsome animal's performance as she

whirls, waltzes, cakewalks and rhumbas to perfect tempo in the best tradition. She also boasts a fabulous wardrobe, valued at \$50,000.

Another all-star performer to be seen at Dublin this year is Buff Douthitt, trick roper extraordinary, who performs his roping tricks the hard way - while balanced on a slack rope. Douthitt, who hails from Artesia, New Mexico, is an accomplished slack rope artist who pleases his audiences wherever he appears.

One of the most unusual specialty acts playing in leading rodeo arenas is George Haylor, Seminoe, Okla., who amazes crowds with his trained brahma bull. A natural enemy of man, the brahma bull is rarely tamed, much less trained to perform perfectly to commands of his trainer.

Taylor purchased this animal, Rubin, when he was a six-month-old calf and worked with him daily to bring him to his present perfection. Among his repertoire is leaping through a hoop of fire leaping over an automobile and many other breath-taking feats.

Miss Carolyn Colborn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Colborn and a well known performer at rodeos throughout the country, also will appear at the 1956 Dublin Rodeo with her new horse, Dixie, in a liberty horse act. Miss Colborn has been training and showing horses for the past six years.

Another new face to be seen at this year's rodeo is Glen Wood, Ardmore, Okla., rodeo announcer who will take over the microphone at the Dublin Rodeo for the first time. Wood is a Navy veteran of World War II, and has a good voice and pleasing personality, plus a thorough knowledge of rodeo.

As is the custom at each year's rodeo performance here, downtown parades will precede each night's performance. Parades will start moving at 6 p. m. and are to be followed by rodeo performances at 8 p. m.

Monday, August 27, the Gorman Panthers will begin two weeks of football training and practice. Ahead of them is a tough schedule for a Class B team. Their schedule includes 2 Class AA teams (De Leon and Dublin), two Class A teams (Eastland and Clyde), and one Class B team (Early High). All of these will be non-district games, and all of them will be played before the Panthers enter their Class B district competition. Gorman will have only four district foes this season, South Taylor, Moran, Strawn, and Baird. Before the Baird game, which will be the last one of the regular season, will be a non-district game with Class A Rising Star.

However, the Panthers should have a good football team, and should be a definite threat for the district title. Baird will probably be tough as usual, but the other three teams in the district shouldn't give the Panthers much trouble. Of course, many things can arise in the course of a season, but right now things look bright.

The Panthers will have a more experienced, better balanced team than last season. Twelve lettermen will be returning, as compared to ten returnees last season. Last season there were only two boys, Max Pierce and Joe Mehaffey, who had more than one letter. This season there will be five two-letter returnees. Last season there were eight boys who had only one letter. This season there are seven. Last season there were only two seniors in the returning lettermen. This season there are five. Last season there were two sophomores in the lineup of returning lettermen. This season there are no sophomores who won letters. There are however, some bright prospects among the sophomores, such as David Revels, Jimmy Brightwell, Tommy Welch, and Bobby Shugart.

There is a good crop of freshmen this season. There will probably be about nine of them, and some of them have promise of developing into good prospects. Among them are Dick Townley, Neil Overstreet, Jerry Yates, Alfred Grice, Jerry Anderson, and others.

Neil Overstreet was awarded the certificate as "The Outstanding Athlete in Grade School" last year. Leading the attack in the back field this year will be Halfback Corky Brown, who was the second highest ground gainer last season. He had 317 yards on 99 carries for an average of 3.20 yards per carry.

I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord. (Psalm 122).



PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in and revision of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 43 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by the Legislature of the State of Texas, passed pursuant to the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:


Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Amendment Seeks Better Aid For The Mentally Ill

Austin, Aug. 18 - Constitutional amendment No. 7 which goes to Texas voters in the November general election drew strong support today from Durwood Manford of Smiley, Chairman of the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools.

"By approving this amendment," Mr. Manford said, "Texans can correct the injustice of our present mandatory jury trial for mentally ill persons seeking treatment in our state hospitals."

"The proposed amendment in no way interferes with the constitutional right to a trial by jury, but simply permits a person asking admission to a state hospital to waive this court procedure." Present Texas laws require a jury trial for any person receiving treatment in a state mental hospital for a period of more than 90 days.

Provision for the constitutional change was enacted by the 54th Texas Legislature in 1955 through passage of House Joint Resolution 11. The amendment would require "competent medical or psychiatric testimony" in determining the commitment of persons to mental hospitals.


Mr. Manford, a former member of the legislature and Speaker of the House, said the present commitment law is the only civil procedure in the state in which the persons involved cannot waive a jury trial.

"This has inflicted needless embarrassment and suffering on families of patients as well as individuals needing treatment," Mr. Manford said.

Passage of the amendment should relieve some of the anguish mental illness imposes, but will by no means deny a jury trial to any person requesting it, the hospital board chairman said.





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


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
