

**WHO GETS WHAT?**

Luther Cunningham has spent a lifetime farming. He has enjoyed the independence and freedom of a good farmer; is a good citizen and is active in community affairs.

Visiting the Progress Office on Wednesday he opened a discussion on the Soil Bank Program.

Luther said, "I understand one and one-half billion dollars has been allocated for the Soil Bank Program. The population of the United States is around 160 million. This means each person will be taxed 9.37 plus interest to pay for this allocation."

"500 farmers in Eastland County have joined the Soil Bank and will receive approximately \$80,000. If prorated equally each one will receive approximately \$160. In so many words Eastland County will receive \$80,000. Our population is approximately 24,000. According to this - not counting interest - it will cost Eastland County taxpayers approximately \$218,400."

Emmett Powell, head of the ASC office in Eastland said approximately 2200 acres of peanuts, 1500 acres of wheat and 2000 acres of cotton had been placed in the Soil Bank.

Soil Bank checks will be mailed in the near future.

**Resolutions To Be Voted On At Farm Bureau Convention**

This is a copy of a resolution to be voted on at Eastland Farm Bureau Convention in October at Eastland, Texas:

We believe that rigid price supports and the Soil Bank are both basically and fundamentally wrong; therefore be it resolved by the Eastland County Farm Bureau that we recommend that both be nullified and crucified and in their place that each farm have its allotted acres of basic crops, never to be changed except and when it is nationally necessary to raise or lower production on a national base, and that no farm or farmer shall be penalized for not planting any part or all of his or her allotment any year. And no agency of the county or National Government shall take

**Breakfast To Open Fund Campaign For Boy Scouts**

The annual Boy Scout Finance Campaign will be conducted here on October 9. Joe Collins is Campaign Chairman for this year's drive. The local committee is composed of Glynn Kirk, Tom Hallmark, Gene Baker, Ben R. Townley, and Ernie Todd. Workers are being recruited to solicit money beginning with special gifts which began October 2 and general solicitation on October 9.

Captains: Bill Parr, Speedy Clark, Oda Monroe, and W. C. Browning, with two more men to be appointed by Joe Collins, are heading the Boy Scout Drive.

All money received through the campaign will be used to continue the service to communities in an eight-county area served by Comanche Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America. The services include professional guidance, maintenance of a Scout Office and Camp Billy Gibbons, issuance of badges to boys conducting camping, activities, training, organization of new units and other phases of services vital to the continuance of the Scouting movement.

There are 89 Cub Packs, Scout Troops and Explorer Posts with some 1900 boys and 600 leaders in the scouting movement in the eight-county area. This represents 15% increase in membership and units. More boys are anxious to join and the need is for more sponsoring organizations and leaders.

**Cisco Midgets Defeat Cubs 21-13**

The Cisco Midgets defeated the Gorman Grade School Cubs Monday night at Brogdon Field by a score of 21-13.

The Cisco team recovered the opening kickoff from the Cubs and drove to their first and only score of the first half.

In the third quarter Cisco increased their lead to 14-0. Early in the fourth quarter the Cubs scored on a 21-yard run by Larry Rodgers.

The Midgets tallied immediately after the kickoff with mostly reserves on the field for Gorman to make the score 21-6. With a number of Cisco substitutes in the game Larry Rodgers broke loose on a 67 yard dash for a touchdown with Joe Bob Rodgers adding the extra point to make the final score read 21-13.

Larry Rodgers showed good running form for the Cubs and was outstanding on defense. Joe Bob Rodgers made several good gains during the game with Jackie Don Simpson also giving a good account of himself on defense.

Next Tuesday night the Cubs will engage the Stephenville Jr. High at Brogdon Field at 7:30 p. m. This is a district game for the Cubs. The Stephenville team is coached by Jack Deavenport and will be out to get even for a 12 to 7 defeat given them by the Cubs of last year.

Praise to the Panthers! Praise to Coaches Byrd and Goodwin! Praise to the Gorman fans who supported the Panthers at the bon-fire pep rally and the Booster Line at the game! And a word of sympathy for the poor old Dublin Lions. They lost the one game they thought surely they would win. Gorman was the only Class B team they were to play this season, and the Dublin coach said that by right the Lions should win. But the Panthers wouldn't give in to the Class AA Lions, and handed them their fourth loss in as many outings this season.

All this took place last Friday night at Gorman, and the final score was 12-0, in case you have not heard. The Panthers were plagued by fumbles in the first half and couldn't get going on their offense. But the Panther defense held firm, and Dublin made only 41 yards rushing in the first half, while Gorman made 70. The Lions had only 2 first downs in the first half, while the Panthers made 6. The score at half-time was 0-0.

In the second half it was a different story. The Panthers out-gained Dublin 122 yards rushing to 35 yards. Early in the third quarter the Panthers recovered a Lion fumble on the Dublin 46-yard line. On the very first play Corky Brown got good blocking on the right side of the line and went all the way for the first Gorman touchdown. The run for extra point was fumbled.

Late in the third quarter the Panthers started a drive from the Dublin 47-yard line after Dublin lost the ball on downs. From there they moved the ball to the 20-yard line as the third quarter ended. After changing ends of the field between quarters, the Panthers finished the touchdown march by moving the remaining 20 yards in 4 plays just after the fourth quarter started. Quarterback Jerry Warren made the score on a 1-yard surge through the middle. Corky Brown was stopped shy of the goal as he tried to run for the extra point.

**The Gorman Progress**  
Entered as Second Class Mail at the Postoffice in Gorman, Texas, under the Act of March 3, 1879.  
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Dublin made their only serious threats of the game. Halfback Luther Allen took a backward handoff from Quarterback Jerry Pair on the old "Statue-of-Liberty" play and ran about 40 yards before being hauled in. The play was nullified, however, by a clipping penalty. A little later Allen ran back a Panther punt for 34 yards before being clobbered by the last defender, John Brinegar. A few plays later Bobby Standridge intercepted a Dublin pass on about the Gorman 28-yard line to stop the threat. Fullback Billy Moore was the leading ground gainer for Dublin as he picked up 50 yards on 15 carries.

Co-captain Corky Brown was the leading ground gainer for the Panthers as he picked up 74 yards including his 46 yarder, on 10 carries for the healthy average of 7.4 yards per try. Eddie Gregg gained nearly as much yardage without the help of a long run as he made 70 yards on 15 tries for an average of 4.66 yards per carry. Jerry Warren made 24 yards on 7 surges, while the two freshmen fullbacks, Neil Overstreet and John Brinegar, did their usual good chores. Overstreet had 17 yards on 9 totes and Brinegar had 10 valuable yards on 8 tries. Brinegar helped to make the second TD and made several saving tackles.

All of the Panthers looked good on defense. Co-captain Tackle Freddie Rodgers, Tackle Jerry Overstreet, End Ted Snider, Line backer-Guard Bobby Standridge, and Defensive Specialist Ed Rodgers led the tough defense that allowed Dublin few yards and no yards on 12 plays.

Friday night, Oct. 5, the Panthers journey to Clyde. This will be the fourth non-district game. Clyde is winless in four games this season. In fact, they haven't scored a touchdown yet. The Bulldogs tied Santa Anna, 0-0, were beaten by Rochester, 20-0, by Rule, 36-0, and by Baird, 21-0, in that order. However, Rochester, Rule, and Baird are three of the best Class B teams in this area, and are rated No. 1 or No. 2 in their districts. Rochester has been the regional champions for the past five years.

The Panthers tied Clyde 7-7 last season when the Bulldogs beat Baird for their Class B district title. This season Clyde is a Class A team, being in the same district with Eastland.




