Gorman Insurance Agency Sponsors Fire Prevention Program

Gorman school children in the third through 8th grades will join nearly 3,000,000 Junior Fire Marshals throughout the country next week in a nation-wide fire prevention and safety education program sponsored by the Hartford Fire Insurance Company.

Participation in the program was announced jointly today by the Gorman Insurance Agency local Hartford Fire representative; School Superintendent Baze, and Fire Chief J. O. Thompson.

"This new, year-round Junior Fire Marshal program is an expanded version of the popular public service campaign which the Hartford Fire has sponsored through its 15,000 agents since 1947," the Gorman Insurance Agency said. "Ever increasing interest by parents, teachers and fire officials prompted expansion of the program which now is on a year-round basis for the first time in nine years," they added.

Scheduled to open throughout the country in conjunction with National Fire Prevention Week, October 7-13, the new program gets under way locally on October 8th. At that time, Gorman Insurance Agency said, a new 12-page Junior Fire Marshal Magazine will be distributed to boys and girls in participating schools.

The Magazine, first of four to

be published throughout the year contains stories, pictures, and suggested Fire Prevention activities and fames for children. The Magazine's feature is a home inspection report for boys and girls to use in locating and eliminating fire hazards in their homes.

Completed home reports, signed by parents, are returned to teachers. Gorman Insurance Agency said schools with satisfactory records of participation will receive School Achievement Banners, Honor Roll posters, and Junior Fire Marshal badges and firemen's helmets for children.

"In addition," Gorman Insurance Agency stated, "elementary school teachers both here and throughout the country are receiving special teaching units, complete with suggested classroom activities, for instructing fire prevention and safety."

Early Edges Panthers 14-7 In Close Game Thursday

covered about 25 yards of the play, and the receiver, End Bryan Boyd, simply outran the Panther secondary to the goal. This demoralizing blow failed to hold the Panthers back very long. They took the second-half kickoff and marched 44 yards straight to a touchdown. The drive required only 7 plays, with Eddie Gregg going the final 13 yards for the score. Two first downs were made in advancing the ball to pay dirt. Co-Captain Corky Brown carried the ball over for the extra point, and the score was tied at 7-7.

Lady Luck slammed the door in the face of the Gorman Panthers again last Thursday night at Early as the Early Longhorns slipped by them in a close game 14-7. But the Panthers showed good improvement, and most of the fans from Gorman were all pleased with the way the boys played. Early scored first on a long pass and run play that covered all of the 68 yards that Early made in passing. The pass

But the Panthers weren't whipped yet. They received the kick-off after Early's second touchdown in the fourth quarter and started from the Gorman 42-yard line. From there they drove 52 yards before bogging down on the 6-yard line. In the process they made 4 first downs. But they lost 6 yards on a fourth down attempt for a touchdown, and the ball was awarded to Early on about their own 12-yard line.

Still the Panthers weren't licked. They got another break when Johnny Rodgers recovered an Early fumble on the Early 32-yard line late in the fourth quarter. But the Panthers were unable to gain after two plays, and on the third down fumbled the ball with Early recovering on about the Early 25-yard line. From there Early ran out the clock and the game was over.

Halfback David Palmer, who was Early's top ground gainer with 77 yards on 12 carries, hurt the Gorman cause with his end runs. He ran 32 yards around right end in the second quarter to the end zone, but the touch-down run was nullified because of an off-side penalty.

Many of the Panthers showed good improvement. Most improved in the backfield was Eddie Gregg, who made only 8 yards against De Leon. Against Early he made 81 yards in 13 carries for an average of 6.23 yards per carry to be the top Panther ground gainer. Corky Brown was the second highest in rushing with 50 yards in 16 tries for 3.12 yards per carry. Freshman Fullback Neil Overstreet had 13 yards in 10 carries. The two freshmen fullbacks, Neil Overstreet and John Brinegar, played a good game on both offense and defense.

On defense Larry Grice was the leader. He made 6 tackles unassisted and helped on 3 other tackles. Johnny Rodgers made 5 tackles without help and helped on 1 other. David Revels, Jerry Overstreet, and Ed Rodgers each made 3 tackles unassisted and helped on 2 other tackles. Jerry Warren, Brinegar, and Brown each made 3 tackles without help.

Co-Captain Freddie Rodgers did not play in the Early game because his right leg was still ailing. He was not even in a football uniform. He should be ready to go by the time of the Dublin game.

This Friday night Gorman has no game scheduled. The next game will be here at Gorman on Friday night, September 28, when the Panthers will take on the Class AA Dublin Lions. Dublin is winless so far, having lost to Alvarado 20-6, and being walloped by Eastland 39-0. However, Dublin has a good team and will be tough for the Panthers. Halfback Tommy Hooks is their star player.
