Guess I'd better tell you I was Jeanette Poyner, daughter of Ira Poyner, and granddaughter of Mrs. Ora Poyner.


Even tho I was not fortunate enough to live in Gorman, now I consider it as my home as most all of my relatives are there.

## Good News For Folks In Duster Community

The following item was clipped from the November 30th issue of the Comanche Chief.

The Texas Highway Commission has taken the first step to inaugurate a new two-year Farm-to-Market Road program for Texas. E. H. Thornton, Jr., chairman of the Highway Commission, stated that the funds for this 1957 and 1958 program are derived from federal-aid highway funds, matched with state highway funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

Robert J. Milligan, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Brownwood, has stated that the following farm-to-market roads in this area are scheduled for work under this program:

- Comanche County: From: F.M. 587 at Duster, North to Eastland County Line, a distance of approximately 6.4 miles.
- From: F.M. 591 at Hazeldell North to Erath County Line, a distance of approximately 5.4 miles.
- From: End of F.M. 1689 in Sidney, South to Road Intersection, a distance of approximately 0.6 mile.
- At an estimated cost of \$271,000.

Mr. Milligan stated that the Commission has authorized the development of some area roads which will serve the dual purpose of providing service to the adjacent land as well as aiding in the development of the entire state.

It was announced that work will begin on these projects as soon as final planning is completed and necessary right of way secured. Resident Engineer Glenn G. Trotter will be in charge of the work in this area.

and give devout thanks for their 134-acre farm unit blessing.

They gave up their three-bedroom, two-bathroom home in California for a tent and have no regrets.

They came in April, in time for Jarrett to do some leveling and get in 30 acres of alfalfa and 36 acres of rye this year. The alfalfa was his cash crop - - \$187 worth.

Another thing for which the Jarretts are grateful is the "wonderful neighbors." By swapping his labor for the use of their equipment he has been able to work his farm with a minimum of machinery - - to date a wheel tractor.

"I never knew people could be so friendly as are the folks on the neighboring units," Mrs. Jarrett said.

The Block 19 family may be living in a tent but it isn't shivering and shaking these frosty mornings.

This autumn Jarrett took down the covering and completely insulated the home. The floor is 15 inches above ground so it also is warm. The tent is heated and lighted electrically.

"We have a stand-by lighting system, though," said Jarrett. He pointed to a lantern hanging from a rafter.

By the use of curtains and placement of chests of drawers, the Jarretts have in effect a three room home. Sleeping quarters are in the rear, partitioned by a curtain, and three chests of drawers "partition" the children's bedroom.

"The only thing I miss is the shower," Jarrett said. Asked what he used for a shower now, Jarrett pointed to the wash basin.

The family has a TV set only a tube is gone and its replacement isn't in the current budget. Jarrett built the TV set himself before moving to Block 19. The family also has a radio which he built. It works.

Mrs. Jarrett has an electric range and other appliances. They haul their water from Mesa.

Last spring Jarrett applied to the Farm Home Administration for a loan and was turned down. The other day an FHA representative called. He suggested Jarrett reapply.

"I don't know what I'll do," Jarrett said. I must admit I'm about broke. I may get a crop loan. I'll need something.

The Jarretts met in San Diego, her home, while he was in the Navy during World War II.

After the war he and a brother operated a dairy farm in Minnesota until Jarrett sold out five years ago. Since then he had been working in California as a plumber.

The picture looks rosy to the Jarretts, thanks in part to Uncle Sam. They'll get \$1,320 from the Agriculture Soil Conservation Service for land leveled. Jarrett leveled 30 acres himself and hired 36 acres leveled at a cost of \$2,000. He has a 33-acre wheat allotment so will receive \$957 under the soil bank program.

By next year Jarrett hopes to have a paying operation. He intends to plow under his rye crop in the spring to improve the soil and put the land in alfalfa and pasture. His goal is a livestock operation eventually.

His livestock at present consists of a milk cow. Unless you want to count a second litter of kittens with which the family housecat has presented the Jarretts since their arrival on Block 19.

"Don't get the idea that credit for getting this land into production goes to me. It's a family operation. My wife has picked up as many rocks as I, and Jimmy and Connie have worked right alongside her," Jarrett said.

He also is proud that their accomplishments have been achieved on a six-day week.

"I don't think you can get ahead by working on Sundays," he said. The Jarretts worship in Connell's Gideon Lutheran Church.

Some folks might regard the life of the Jarretts as rather primitive. Even drab. But these trans-

# Sports

Jerry Clark

Last week I wrote a letter to Mr. Fred Sanner, high school sports specialists of the Abilene Reporter-News, and nominated the following boys for the Class B All-Abilene Area teams. These teams are chosen each year by the Abilene paper, and is the highest honor given to boys who play Class B football in this area. All-State teams are not chosen in Class B football, so the All-Abilene area teams are the highest honors for Class B teams in this area. I told Mr. Sanner that I realized that all of these boys could not be placed upon the teams, but that I wanted to nominate these boys. Following are the sketches of the boys that I nominated.

**CORKY BROWN** — Halfback - 140 lbs., Junior 2 year letterman, Co-captain. Corky was the only unanimous choice for the All-District Team. He was the leading ground gainer for Gorman with 844 yards in 146 carries for an average of 5.78 yards per carry. He played almost every minute of Gorman's ten regular season games. He also tied John Brinegar for scoring honors with 50 points, made on 8 touchdowns and 2 extra points. He was good on defense, making many saving tackles in the secondary, knocking down many intended passes and intercepting two passes.

**TED SNIDER** — End - 155 lbs., Senior 2 year letterman. Ted did all of the punting for Gorman this season and kicked 33 times for the very good average of 28 yards per kick. None of Ted's punts were blocked. He also caught 4 passes for 55 yards, and was the leading pass receiver. His blocking and tackling were examples for the other Gorman boys to follow. He took the fight out of many opponents with his vicious blocking and tackling. He was the leader in pass interceptions with a total of 3 to his credit. He recovered 3 opponents fumbles. He was chosen for the All-District Second Team.

**JERRY OVERSTREET** - Tackle - 175 lbs., Senior 1 year letterman. Jerry was chosen as a first team tackle on the All-

District Team. He was one of the main stays of the Panther line all season. He was always one of the leaders in number of tackles each game, and played both on defense and offense. He recovered 4 opponents fumbles. He was one of the fastest line men, and charged through opponents lines many times to throw backs for losses.

**BOBBY STANDRIDGE** — 155 lbs., Junior 1 year letterman. Bobby was chosen as a first team guard on the All-District Team. He was one of the most versatile line men, intercepting two passes and recovering 3 opponents fumbles. He was one of the linebackers on defense and very few gains were made over his position. On offense his down-field blocking was very efficient.

**EDDIE GREGG** — Halfback - 140 lbs., Junior (no letters). This was the first season for Eddie to try his hand at football, and he set one of the best offensive records of any halfback that has ever played for Gorman High. He was unable to play in the Clyde and Baird games due to injuries, and played in only 8 games this season. Nevertheless, he was second in rushing with a total of 710 yards on 89 carries for an average of 7.97 yards per carry. His average was the best of any back on the team. In the last three games he played, he had the amazing average of 12.4 yards per carry. In the Moran game he had 111 yards on 7 carries for 15.8, in the Strawn game 148 yards on 16 tries for 9.25, and in the Rising Star game he had 177 yards on 12 totes for an average of 14.7 yards. These were the last three games he played. He was third in scoring with 36 points on 6 touchdowns.

**JOHN BRINEGAR** - Fullback - 170 lbs., Freshman (no letters). John was the only Freshman to play regularly this season. He played almost every minute of the last eight games. A very rugged boy, he was never unable to play because of an injury. He was third in rushing with 617 on 143 carries for an average of 4.31 yards per carry. He shared scoring honors with Corky Brown at 50 points each. He made 7 touchdowns and 8 extra points. He did all of the extra point kicking from placement, and kick 8 out of 22 attempts. He was a standout at his defensive end position, and very few yong gains were made around his end. His down-field blocking was a major factor in the good gains made by his teammates, Brown and Gregg.







**Peanut Treats For  
 The Christmas Holiday Festivities**

**APPLE PEANUT  
 CAKE SQUARES**

1 1/2 cup sliced apples  
 3/4 cup cane syrup or molasses  
 1/3 cup shortening  
 1/2 cup hot water  
 2 1/2 cups sifted flour  
 1/4 tablespoon salt  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/2 teaspoon cloves  
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
 1 1/2 teaspoons soda  
 1/2 cup chopped roasted peanuts  
 Peel and slice apples and cook slowly in molasses until tender; cool. Melt shortening in hot water. Add sifted dry ingredients to make a smooth batter. Stir in molasses, apples and chopped nuts that have been floured with 1 tablespoon flour. Turn into a greased and floured pan and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 to 45 minutes. Serve warm either plain or with creole fluff.

**CREOLE FLUFF**

1 cup whipping cream  
 1/4 cup cane syrup  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/4 teaspoon cloves  
 Whip cream stiff - gradually stir in syrup to which has been added salt, cinnamon and cloves.

**SPICED CANDIED PEANUTS**

2 cups granulated sugar  
 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar  
 2/3 cup water  
 Dash of salt  
 3-inch stick of cinnamon  
 3 cups peanuts  
 Combine sugar, cream of tartar, water, salt and cinnamon in large heavy kettle. Cook, stirring only until sugar is dissolved and mixture comes to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer until mixture reaches 310 degrees F. on candy thermometer or makes a clear, brittle thread when tested in cold water. Turn heat so low that mixture does not boil and quickly dip nuts with fork into mixture to coat. Place dipped nuts on greased cookie sheet to harden. Makes about 3 1/2 cups.

**PEANUT  
 BUTTERSCOTCH PIE**

1 1/2 cups brown sugar  
 6 tablespoons flour  
 1 1/2 cups milk  
 2 egg yolks  
 4 tablespoons peanut butter  
 1/2 tablespoon vanilla  
 Mix sugar and flour in top of double boiler. Add milk slowly. Cook in double boiler stirring until thickened. Add slightly beaten egg yolks, and cook 3 minutes longer. Remove from fire, add peanut butter and vanilla. When cool, pour into baked crust, cover with meringue or whipped cream.

**PEANUT DROP COOKIES**

1/2 cup fat  
 1 cup cane, corn or maple syrup  
 2 eggs, beaten  
 2 cups sifted flour  
 3 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1 cup roasted peanuts, finely chopped  
 Add syrup to thoroughly creamed fat. Add well beaten eggs and mix thoroughly. Sift dry ingredients, add peanuts, and combine with fat mixture. Mix until well blended. Drop by teaspoon onto greased baking sheet 350 degrees F. for 20 minutes. Makes 60 small cookies.

**PEANUT DAINITIES**

2 level tablespoons gelatine  
 1/2 cup cold water  
 2 cups brown sugar  
 2 cups chopped roasted peanuts  
 1 tablespoon lemon juice  
 3/4 cup boiling water  
 Soak gelatine in cold water about 5 minutes. Put sugar and boiling water in saucepan, and when sugar is dissolved add gelatine. Bring to boiling point and let boil 15 minutes. Remove from fire and add 1 cup peanuts and 1 tablespoon lemon juice or 1/2 teaspoon lemon flavoring, soaked in 1 tablespoon cold water. Turn into pan, first dipped in cold water, having mixture 3/4 inch in depth. Let stand over night, cut in squares and roll in ground peanuts.

**PEANUT CLUSTERS**

1/2 lb. sweet chocolate  
 1/2 cup condensed milk  
 1 cup unsalted peanuts  
 Melt chocolate, stir in milk and peanuts, stirring until thick. Drop by spoonful.

**ORANGE - NUT DOUGHNUTS**

4 cups flour all-purpose  
 4 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 cup butter or margarine  
 1 cup sugar  
 2 eggs  
 3/4 cup milk  
 2 tablespoons orange rind  
 1 cup chopped peanuts  
 Sift flour, measure, add baking powder and salt; sift again. Cream butter; blend in sugar. Beat in eggs one at a time, and flour alternately with milk. Add grated orange rind and chopped peanuts. Chill about 2 hours. On floured board roll dough 1/3 inch thick - cut with floured cutter. Drop into deep hot fat (365 degrees to 375 degrees, bread cube browns in 40 seconds); fry until golden, turning often after they rise. Drain on paper. Makes two dozen.

**PEANUT BRITTLE PIE**

1 cup milk, scalded  
 2 egg yolks and whites  
 1-4 cup brown sugar  
 1 envelope of gelatin  
 2 tbsp. sugar  
 1 cup whipping cream  
 3-4 cup peanut brittle, crushed  
 1 tsp. vanilla  
 Beat egg yolks with brown sugar and add to scalded milk. Cook until thick. Dissolve gelatin in cup of water. Add to above mixture while hot. Cool until starting to set and add beaten egg whites of eggs which have 2 tablespoons of sugar. Add cup of cream whipped, crushed peanut brittle and vanilla. Pour into baked pie shell and serve with whipped cream with brittle in it.
