Keeping Home Health Healthy By Charles Stenholm

You don't have to be a certified expert to recognize that our health care system in the United States is manyfaceted and sometimes confusing. Every consumer, provider, supplier and believe it or not, Congressman, wishes that our system was less complicated and more "user friendly."

The good news is that we have far more complete and better health care than virtually any other nation. The bad news is that whenever policy makers try to deal with one issue in one segment of the health system, say containing costs or covering more individuals with health insurance, it impacts all other parts. The effect is like squeezing the air out of a balloon at one end just to see it pop out at the other end. This is precisely what happened with home health care over the past few decades. Back in the early '80's Congress tried to get a handle on the costs of hospital care. We created a system of saying up front how much the government would pay a hospital for every kind of treatment for Medicare patients. The result was, indeed, cost containment, in part through shorter hospital stays. It was at this point that a fairly young and relatively small home health industry stepped up to the plate to care for patients coming home from the hospital sooner and in need of more care. The industry's contributions have been considerable through the care provided in a relatively less expensive environment. In most cases, home health is less expensive than institutional care, and it has been shown that patients respond better to treatment when they are happier and more comfortable in their But with this change, the balloon once again started bulging at another point. In 1990, Medicare home health costs totaled about \$4.7 billion, when translated into 1997 dollars. In 1997 those costs had grown to \$17.2 billion, nearly four times as much in just seven



years. The average number of visits, usual!- from a home health aide as opposed to skilled nursing visits, increased from 33 to 78 in the same time period.

A significant portion of that increase was legitimate, expected and positive. But a careful review of the records also reveals that a significant portion of that increase can only be attributed to waste or fraud.

That's when Congress stepped back into the picture. Included in the massive Balanced Budget Agreement signed into law last year were provisions to change the delivery of home health care services. Those efforts were meant to preserve the program in a way that ensured the integrity of the taxpayers' dollars paying for the program.

Swoosh--there went another bulge in the balloon. Now we are hearing from home health agencies worried about a reduced work load and from some patients concerned that they will not receive the health care they need. We in Congress will keep working on this problem with the goal of balancing the needs of Medicare patients with the imperative to be good stewards of federal dollars. I personally have contacted the chairman of the House Committee responsible for this issue and asked that he re-open the issue by conducting hearings to make sure we hear the full story from our constituents. I've also contacted the Department of Health and Human Services asking them to delay implementation of certain regulations. Clearly, this issue needs more attention and I am dedicated to trying to keep the home health industry, and most importantly, its patients, as healthy as possible.

I think there is an answer to happiness. It is simple, straight-forward, and highly successful. It is love. It is not just love through writing a few choice words or saying just the right things. Love is commitment. Love is going behind the scenes and doing all the little things that bring a smile to people's faces. 

Following are some tips gleaned from our discussion: Mark the rows with string before planting, use cow manure for fertilizer, grow tomatoes in a tub and plant using a stick to poke holes in the ground, leave plenty of room around potatoes and maybe you too will get 24 potatoes off one vine, soak okra seeds in water 24 hours before planting and plant green beans on March 7th.

To harvest: hang up onions in clumps to dry, string peppers, shell and can peas and beans, can or freeze corn, tomatoes, okra etc ..., make crout with cabbage.

Always plant radishes. They grow and mature fast and help keep you interested in the garden. There are only two ways to control squash bugs. One is to smash them between to bricks. The other is to not plant squash, melons or cucumbers.

SAN ANGELO--Carolyn Gilbert, long-time District Extension Director, will retired on March 31, 1998 with 33 years of service with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Gilbert has been DED for the West Central (District 7) District since 1981. She is headquartered in the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in San Angelo.

As DED, Gilbert supervised the Family and Consumer Science Extension agents in the District's 23 counties.

Prior to her employment in San Angelo, Gilbert was an Extension 4-H and Youth Specialist headquartered at the Texas 4-H Center near Brownwood. She began that position in 1977. From 1972 to 1977 she was a home economics Extension agent in Brown County. She began her Extension career in 1965 first as an assistant Extension home demonstration agent in Taylor County and later as an associate agent in Wichita County. A much more conservative preparation can be accomplished since no removal of good tooth structure is necessary as it usually is when the drill is used.


The fillings being smaller, with less removal of tooth structure, stronger bond strength and resultant reduced reoccurring decay, patient comfort and reduced fear are reasons the impact for patients is going to be very important.

Will this technique make the drill obsolete? Though this technique will dramatically reduce reliance on the drill, some procedures are still better accomplished with the drill. It is not appropriate for every part of every procedure. This airbrasion technique is tremendously important since a dental filling is probably the most common treatment needed and our need for fillings usually begins when we are quite young and our fear level is very high. With this process we should see our children growing up with no fear of dentistry, also the significant percentage of adults who avoid dentistry due to fear can enjoy the benefits of airbrasion.




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
