GORMAN IS NOW USING WATER FROM LAKE PROCTOR RESERVOIR

By the time you read this, you should have been using water from the new facilities at Lake Proctor for several days. Water put through this filter plant has been tested for purity, both before it enters the lines to your city and at some six or seven places on each section of line. The tests all have shown freedom from bacteria which causes any of the water borne diseases. This water will be delivered to the storage facilities by the Upper Leon River Municipal Water District pumps and from that point, will be handled by the regular distribution system operated by city personnel.

Water produced in this plant is proving of good quality already and should improve as the plant is tuned and settled into a regular routine of service. There is a fully equipped laboratory in connection with this facility, and competent people in charge to see that the best quality water possible is sent out to you.

At a later date, an open house

is planned so that all may see your water treatment plant in actual operation. Some details of construction are not fully complete but the plant is operative and functional at the present time. The automatic control system is still being tuned and adjusted until this is complete. Some cleanup and finish work is still to be done on lines and plant sites before the project is pronounced finished and accepted.

You are welcome at any time to come and see the plant and its operation but you can get a better idea of things when the plant is complete.

Ordinance Fixing Water Rates For City Of Gorman

An ordinance fixing the water rates and other matters relative to rendering water service to the City of Gorman set by the City Commission is as follows:

1. That water rates per month to be charged and collected by the City of Gorman, Texas from all customers obtaining service from its Water System shall be and are hereby fixed as set forth below:

- First 2,000 gals. - \$3.50 (Minimum)
Next 500 gallons - 90c per 1,000 gallons
All over 7,000 gallons - 50c per 1,000 gallons

2. That all bills for service rendered by said system shall be paid monthly on the 10th day of each month after billing date. If not paid within thirty (30) days after the due date, service shall be discontinued. In the event of discontinuance of service an additional sum of \$1.00 shall be charged for reconnection to the system.

Applications Open For Girl Scout Camp Staffers

"Applications for staff to operate the Heart of Texas Girl Scout Camp are now being taken," it was announced today by Mrs. Ray A. Hoyle, council executive.

"We are looking for young teachers or college women who have had experience in working with children, who are in sympathy with the objectives and philosophy of Girl Scouting, who have outgoing personalities, and have a real love for the out-of-doors.

"A staff of 18-20 will be required to operate the camp," Mrs. Hoyle stated. "While previous Girl Scout experience is helpful, it is not essential. Salaries vary with the assignment and with the candidate's experience, qualifications, and training. Positions open at this time include: unit leaders, unit counselors, waterfront and small craft instructors, nurses, cooks, and office aide.

"Pre-camp training for staff is scheduled from June 8-13. Three 12-day sessions and one six day session are scheduled from June 15 to August 2. All 12-day sessions start on Sunday and close on Fridays. The final Brownie session starts on Sunday and ends on Saturday.

"Those interested in making application should visit or write the Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council, 700 East Baker, Brownwood, Texas," Mrs. Hoyle concluded.

Statement to Residents Proposed Hospital Dist.

The South Eastland County Hospital Steering Committee solicits your support and believes that your support is justified based on the following facts:

1. Through your elected representatives on the hospital board you will be an active participant in the operation of a modern, well equipped hospital and accompanying medical facilities.

2. The lay hospital board elected by you will formulate policies, employ personnel and generally prescribe the rules for the hospital.

3. You will have the right as a resident of the district to receive preferential treatment with respect to use of the hospital facilities.

4. You will have a voice thru your board representative in establishing hospital and medical costs and in providing future additional hospital space as may be required. The proposed hospital would be constructed wholly at ground level and planned so as to be staffed and operated in the most economical manner.

5. Taxes, if any, necessary in paying construction debts, will be assessed at the least possible figures, hopefully based on current county property evaluations.

For Example: On 100 acres of farm land valued at \$7.00 per acre (Eastland County valuation on tillable land is \$9.00 per acre and on pasture land is \$4.50 per acre) the total 100 acres would

be valued at \$700.00. By law the maximum tax that can be levied by a hospital district is .75c per \$100.00 valuation. Therefore, the annual maximum tax on the 100 acres would be \$5.25 if county evaluation can be used.

On a residence valued at \$800. (approximate Eastland County residence evaluation in proposed district) a tax of .75c by the hospital district would result in a total annual tax of \$6.00. Where else can you invest a few cents a day and receive the assurance of having available medical and hospital care for yourself and your family 24 hours per day, 365 days per year.

You only have to look around you to observe sky rocketing medical costs and ever increasing numbers of over crowded hospitals. The opportunity is ours. \$300,000.00 in federal funds and \$100,000.00 cash to be donated by the people of this area can be available to us in constituting two-thirds on the total estimated construction cost of \$600,000.00 for the new facility.

It is anticipated that you will vote on this issue in the near future. If the proposal is accepted by the voters, a hospital district will be established. The maximum indebtedness for the district would be around \$200,000.00.

In order that our state representative, Mr. Burke Musgrove, may know the sentiment of folks residing in the proposed South Eastland County Hospital District, a ballot for your use in signifying your wishes is attached to this article. You are urged to check your preference relative to the creation of a hospital district, detach the ballot and mail it to: Chamber of Commerce, Box 266, Gorman. The hospital district, as proposed, will include that part of the Gorman Independent School District in Eastland County, that part of the Desdemona Independent School District in Eastland County west of Highway 16 (including the town of Desdemona), and that part of the Carbon Independent School District south of a line east to west parallel to the Farm-to-Market Road which crosses Highway 6 near the Flatwood Community.

It is believed by the Hospital Steering Committee that the creation of the hospital district is essential to the success of the entire hospital project. For detailed information please refer to the statement on the hospital project published on this same page. Therefore, in effect, when you vote for the hospital district on the attached ballot, you are voting for a hospital and continued medical services in this area. When you vote against the hospital district, you are voting against these services.

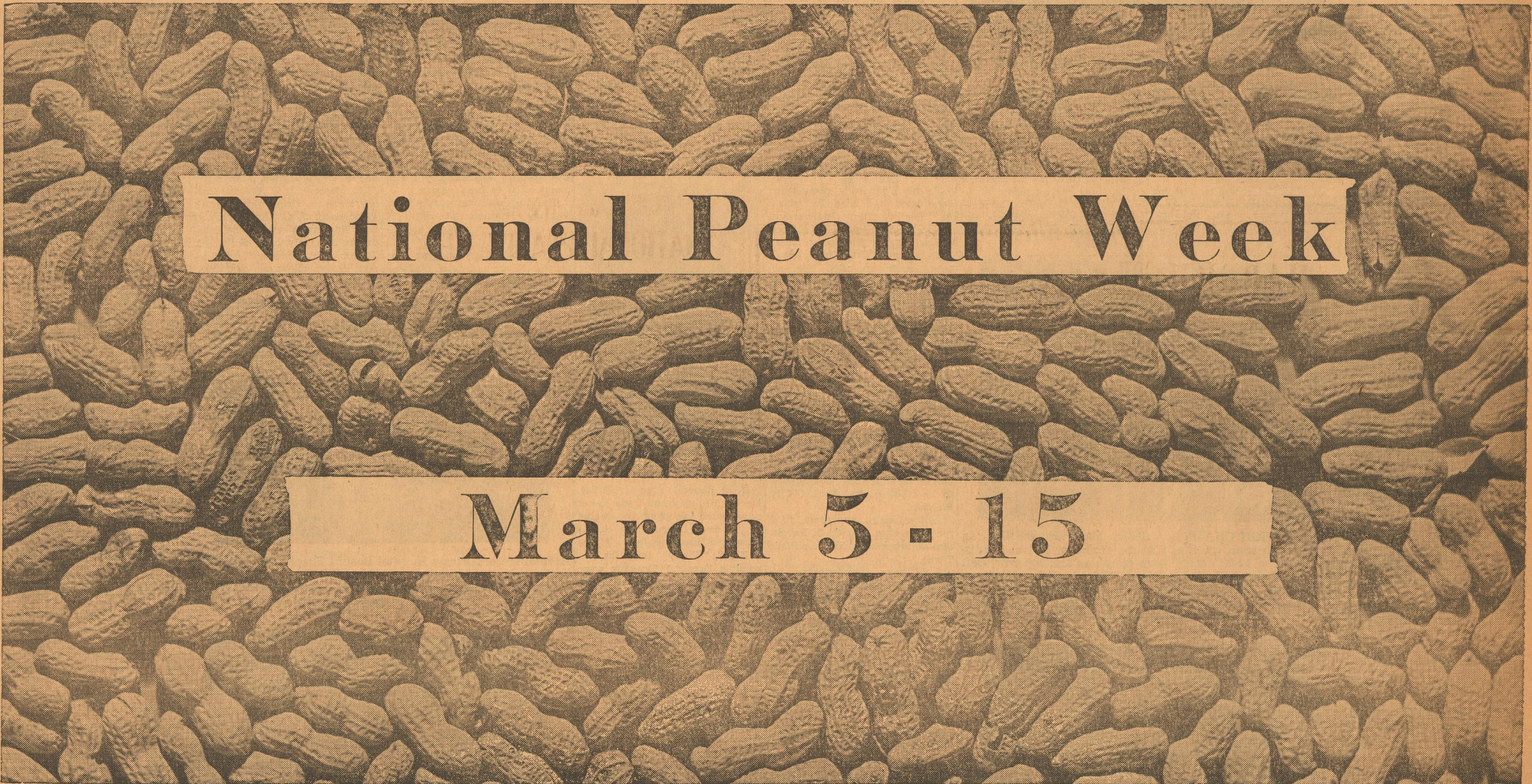

who have visited a class during the week. If you have not visited a class, you are urged to attend Open House Thursday from 7:00 to 8:30 p. m. Come up and visit classrooms and go by the unchroom for light refreshments.

Your schools of today are far different from those that were established by a bill signed by Governor Pease on January 31, 1854. Since this time there has been a continual change in the educational system of Texas. The average annual salary of all teachers in Texas during the school year of 1872-73 was \$210 with the average annual salary in 1964-65 of \$5594. There were a total of 7,840 school districts in Texas in 1910 which compares with a total of 1218 at present. (The Governor's Committee Report calls for 353). Scholastic population has grown from 1,560,439 in 1934-35 to over 2,600,000 in 1967-68.

Along with changes in numbers has come a change in materials and methods of instruction. There have been more changes in these areas in the last fifteen to twenty years than at any time during the history of the system. Changes are coming with the turn of each year. Many who attended school as much as fifteen years ago would feel out of place in the modern classroom with all of the new visual aid materials that are in use now. We will see many more changes take place within the next few years as Texas strives to become a leader in the field of education. Many times parents do not understand why changes are made; therefore, it is necessary to keep in closer contact with your school. Any time that a parent has a question about the school program, I urge them to come and talk with the teacher and the administration so that they may get an answer to their question.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation and thanks to the men who serve on the School Board. At the present time Arnold Butler is president of the Board and is serving his fourth year as a member. Cecil Reeves is vice-president and is serving his fourth year. James Brown is secretary and is serving his third year. Other members are Orval Treadway in his third year, Cecil Self in his fourth year, J. O. Jackson, Jr. and Billy Earl Simpson, both in their second year. These men have given of their time to serve the Gorman School District in a very efficient way. The people of the community owe them a vote of thanks. Remember that these men have some major decisions to make and will not always make decisions that will please everyone, but they will always make an effort to make the proper decisions for the good of the school. Give your local board your support.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — A QUESTION OFTEN ASKED IS "What would happen to our economy should 'peace break out'." It is a good question and, of course, one to which thought and study has been devoted by responsible governmental agencies.

FROM THESE SOURCES, TOGETHER WITH SOME ECONOMISTS and political leaders, it is the general opinion that the demands on some programs such as urban renewal, housing, highway building and the like, would in a short time, about fill the gap if spending was provided for these purposes. More important, at least for the immediate years following cessation of hostilities in Southeast Asia, is the refurbishing of our military machinery.

IN MANY CATEGORIES WE HAVE DEPLETED SURPLUS military material which must be replaced. Supplies, training and equipment of our Armed Forces would likely continue at a high rate, even if at a slower pace, should hostilities suddenly end.

FROM THE ECONOMIC STANDPOINT THIS IS IMPORTANT to our State of Texas. Our State is the second largest recipient of Government spending in the Nation. According to Mr. Walter B. Moore, Editor of the Texas Almanac, U. S. spending in Texas totaled \$12,019,066,463 in the Fiscal Year ending last June 30th. It is the biggest business in our State.

DEFENSE SPENDING OF \$6,064,962,000 IN THE YEAR 1967-68 amounts to approximately one-half the total according to Mr. Moore's research. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare ranked next with an expenditure of \$1,751,000 (in round figures).

THERE IS NO COMPARISON THAT ANY INDUSTRY as a whole is near the Government when it comes to supporting our Texas economy.

BASED ON THIS ARITHMETIC, THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT is spending around \$1,000 per head in our State. Although accurate estimates are a little elusive, Texans pay something like \$6 billion to the Federal Government in taxes. The State's income actually depends more on grants from Washington than upon any single State tax. So, in the economy as a whole, twice as much is spent in the State by the Federal Government than is collected in taxes.

IN ROAD BUILDING, THE VARIOUS PROGRAMS OF AID AND WELFARE, in education and many other activities, Texas shares well in total expenditures by the Federal Government.

AS IS CLEAR, MILITARY EXPENDITURES is the large item. There is a reason for it, which

is not always as political as we are often accused by other areas of the Country. First, we have natural resources to support these activities. Second, we have a favorable climate, both weatherwise and in attitude influencing industry to locate in the State. Next but not least, we have comparative stability in the labor market.

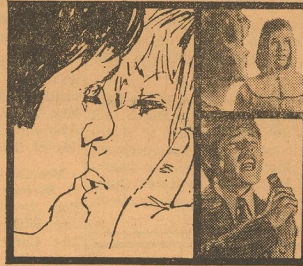
Lastly but not conclusive, there is "elbow room" and opportunity to expand.

THESE ARE NOT THE TOTAL ASSETS TO BE OFFERED BY OUR CITIZENS but enough to not only attract defense contracts and military installations but also private industry which must be looked to for the long range future.

THIS SITUATION IS ON THE MIND AND UNDER CONSIDERATION of not only officials of the Federal Government, but by our State leaders to maintain conditions conducive to continued expansion of our industrial base. A looming factor is the need for an adequate water supply which may be the key to the future of our States economy. In this balance of our economic needs, a careful look-see must be given to the major facets of our economy; namely, industry, agriculture, military and national defense activity. A stable labor situation will continue to be a great influence on the total outlook.
