### **City Of Gorman**

An ordinance fixing the water ates and other matters relative o rendering water service to the City of Gorman set by the City Commission is as follows:

1. That water rates per month to be charged and collected by the City of Gorman, Texas from all customers obtaining service from its Water System shall be and are hereby fixed as set forth below:

# First 2,000 gals. - \$3.50 (Minimum)

(Minimum) Next 5,000 gallonss -90c per 1,000 gallons All over 7,000 gallons -50c per 1,000 gallons

2. That all bills for service 2. That all bills for service rendered by said system shall be paid monthly on the 10th day of each month after bill-ing date. If not paid within thirty (30) days after the due date, service shall be discon-tinued. In the event of discon-tinuance of service an addition-al sum of \$1.00 shall be charg-ed for reconnection to the sysed for reconnection to the system.
