often this spring are partly re-sponsible for the large number of sponsible for the large number of plant disease problems. One problem that I hear about several times each day is fire blight of pear and apple trees.

Damage occurs as blossom blight, twig blight, girdling of branches and in some cases, killing of the entire tree. Twig blight is the most compon form we see now.

entire tree. Twig blight is the most common form we see now. When the bacterial disease infects twigs, they became dark green and look oily. Bark sinks in and the wood underneath turns dark brown. Insects and rain spread the bacteria to new twigs and other trees. The disease is always worse when we have excessive

prune the infected portions four to six inches below the last vis-ible symptoms. Dip the pruning eqipment in ten percent house-hold bleach to prevent spreading the bacterium from one cut to another.

The trees should then be sprayed. A weak bordeaux mixture applied three or four times every seven days is the most effective. The bordeaux mixture is prepared by dissolving two pounds of copper sulfate in a non-metal container with a little water. Add this to 100 gallons of water, combined with six pounds of hydrated lime. Small amounts of bordeaux mixture are made by dissolving 2½ teaspoons of copper sulfate in 1 quant of water and then by mixing this with a gallon of water in which 4 teaspoons of lime are dissolved. The mixture is then brought up to three re is then brought up to thre

Another problem is powdery mildew on ornamental plants. This appears as a whitish or grayish, mold-like growth over lower and upper leaf, bud or young twig surfaces. They can be controlled with either Karathane, folpet (Phaltan), Wettable sulfur, or acti-dione. Begin weekly spray applications and continue as needed.
