Official Report Released On **Poynor Shooting Incident**

On Monday, June 22, 1998 Texas Ranger Bob Grubbs presented his initial report of the shooting incident near Gorman on May 29, 1998 to Eastland County District Attorney Mike Siebert. Ranger Grubbs also review his report with Eastland County Sheriff Wayne Bradford. Grubbs stated he still had a few loose ends to tie up but the majority of the report is complete. The following is a summary of Ranger Grubbs report.

Eastland County officers responded to a call of a domestic dispute involving a man with a gun at a rural resident near Gorman on Friday night, 05-29-98, at approximately 10:38 p.m. The call was given to an Eastland County Sheriff's Office Deputy. Gorman P.D. Officers were requested to provide back up for the call and arrived at the scene prior to the Sheriff's unit that was coming out of Eastland. Instructions were given to remove the complainant, an elderly woman from the residence, if possible and to provide for he safety until the Sheriff's unit arrived at the scene. A determination was made of how to best handle the call. One Gorman Officer had pulled his vehicle onto a county road near the residence with his headlights on in order to observe the rear area and back door of the residence. While Gorman Officers were awaiting the arrival of the the Sheriff's unit, the lights inside the residence were turned off causing the area to be darkened. The Sheriff's Department office arrived at the location and met with a Gorman P.D. Officer and the complainant in front of the residence. The deputy was attempting to obtain additional information in relation to the call, when the Gorman Officer at the rear of the residence advised the subject was coming out the back door of the residence into a carport and was carrying a rifle or shotgun. The officers in front of the residence moved on foot around to the rear of the residence where they were confronted by a male subject coming through the carport carrying a shotgun and moving toward officers. The officers called out to the subject and identified themselves and advised him to put the gun down numerous times. One of the Gorman officers recognized the subject and related that he was nearly deaf. The Sheriff's officer moved closer to the residence and carport attempting to establish contact with the subject, continuing to call out to the subject to advising him that they were police officers and for him to put the gun down. The subject didn't respond or reply to any of the commands, but finally stated, "What?" to the officer closest to him and raised the shotgun to his shoulder in a firing position pointing it toward the officer. At this time, the officer fired several shots at the subject while attempting to back away from him. The subject spun around appearing to have been hit and then turned back around facing the officer and again started raising the shotgun toward the officer. At this time the officer fired at the subject again and one of the other officers on the scene also fired at the subject, resulting in his death. The subject was identified as William Euell Poynor W/M 96.

This report along with all associated statements have been submitted to the Eastland County District Attorney's Office. Sheriff Bradford has requested that this entire matter be taken before the next Grand Jury for their determination.

Most of the adults took the train ride to or from Silverton, and said ti was the most beautiful thing they had ever seen. While the adults were riding the train, the youth (and Glenn and Gloria Glasson) went white water rafting in the 38 degree Animas River. It was rather enjoyable, but boy howdy it was very wet and very


Pauline Marshall McCullough, 82, of De Leon, passed away Saturday, June 20, 1998 in the De Leon Hospi- High School, is scheduled for


He will be earning credits toward an Associate Degree in Applied Sciences through the Community College of the Air Force while attending basic and technical training schools.


