Vote "Yes" For Peanut Progress

The assessment program to be decided in the September referendum by Texas peanut growers, has been endorsed by officials of every local grower association in Texas. Grower leaders emphasize that Texas is the only major peanut producing state, which has not voted the "check-off" program.

"Texas produced peanuts ought to go into the stomachs of American people and not into storage warehouses," says J. O. Jackson, Jr. of Gorman, president of the West Cross Timbers Peanut Producers Association. Jackson believes that peanut promotion needs to be vastly expanded and accelerated to stay ahead of the fast growing peanut yields in the state. The dollar per ton assessment will not be a cost to the grower, he emphasizes, but rather it will be a fine investment which will be returned many fold to producers.

George Tolson of Pearsall says "we have seen the return on dollars invested in research here in Frio County. If all growers statewide pitch in on this important program, we can really be effective in finding the answer to our pressing peanut production problems, including diseases and insect control." Another grower, Chester Cunningham of Grape-land said, "I have wanted this program for Texas growers a long time. I have seen what a little help can do in research and education. With this program throughout the state, we can make great progress."

Ballots will be mailed to all growers on September 6 so they can vote from September 9-24, either For or Against the "check-off" program. If two-thirds of those voting vote For the proposition - up to \$1.00 per ton will be assessed on all peanuts marketed in Texas beginning about October 1, 1969. At the same time growers will vote to elect 9 growers to a producers board.

The board, once elected, will organize and employ an executive secretary to carry out its policies. Growers who contribute money to this program may obtain refunds if they so request within 60 days of the date of assessment. States already having similar plans on peanuts are Oklahoma, New Mexico, Georgia, Alabama, North Carolina, Virginia and Florida.

J. N. Pruitt, peanut grower from Palo Pinto County, summed up the feeling of grower association leaders recently by saying, "all peanut growers must get behind this program to show the critics of farm programs that peanut growers are willing to help themselves by providing resources to deal with their problems."

Ronnie Love Brings In First Load of 1969 Crop Peanuts

The first load of 1969 crop peanuts were harvested by Ronnie Love of the Cheaney Community. The 12,000 pound load was harvested from 8 acres of irrigated land and were planted on April 3rd. They were of the Argentine variety.

The peanuts were unloaded at the A. E. Smith Warehouse and Dryer in Gorman.

The peanuts were graded at the Texas Federal Inspection Service and graded 63 percent SMK, 10 percent other kernels, no damage, 27 percent hulls, 7 percent foreign material, 8 percent moisture and 1 percent LSK.

Love will continue harvesting of the 300 acres of peanuts he has in cultivation in approximately three weeks. The 150 acres he has under irrigation will be harvested earlier than the dry land peanuts.

Know Your School

School will begin on Monday, September 2 at 9:00 a. m. Until the change of time in October, classes will begin at 9:00 each day and dismiss at 4:20 each afternoon. Beginning on October 27, classes will begin at 8:05 and dismiss at 3:25.

High school students will complete registration on Tuesday, August 26 with seniors at 9:00, juniors at 9:45, sophomores at 10:30 and freshmen at 11:15. All students who will be enrolling in high school here for the first time should have transcripts sent to Mr. Bettis by the date of registration.

Schedule of registration for elementary grades 1 through 8 will wait and register on September 2nd.

There will be a faculty meeting on Thursday, August 28 at 8:30 in the study hall. After a general meeting, the faculty of each building will meet in separate meetings for instructions from their principals. The faculty is complete except for a band director and a Title I teacher. It is hoped that these will be filled this week and a complete list of faculty and assignments will be given in next week's paper.

The pre-school has been in session each day since August 4th and is doing real well. There are 18 enrolled, which is an increase over what was expected. There are possible others who have or will be moving into the community who will be beginners.

Application has been made for Federal Funds under Public Law 815, which is funds that the federal government pays to schools on students whose parents are working on bases or federally connected contract jobs and men in uniform serving away from home. I have a list of some who are working in Mineral Wells whose children will help to qualify us for these funds, but I am sure that there are others. I would appreciate it very much if those who are working or if you know of someone working there who have or will have children in school, would call and give me the information. Forms will be distributed to these parents soon after school begins. Application has been completed for other Federal Funds, but many of these may not be approved by Congress. There has been a cut each year in the amount of funds that Gorman has received from Federal sources since the Federal Program started.

In keeping with a suggestion from the Agency, the Gorman School Board adopted a policy on the possession of or the use of drugs and alcohol in school, on school property, and on any school sponsored activity, or by any student who is representing the Gorman Schools in any manner at any meeting. The policy on proper dress and grooming for all students was revised. These policies will be published in the paper before school begins and copies distributed to students when school begins. It is hoped that all students and parents will cooperate with us in these, as well as other policies, that are necessary so that it will not become necessary to suspend or expel students from school.

At the last Board meeting the budget for 1968-69 was amended and the budget for 1969-70 was presented. The new budget will be studied and action will be taken at the next meeting. A complete summary of finances will be given at a later date.
