Beat on high speed until foamy
$11 / 2$ cups egg whites (room temperature)
$11 / 2$ teaspoons cream of tartar
$1 / 4$ teaspoon salt
Gradually add:
$3 / 4$ cup sugar. Beat until holds stiff peaks.
DO NOT under beat
Fold in:
$1 / 2$ teaspoon coconut flavoring
Fold in flour mixture, a little at a time, until it dissappears.
Push Batter into ungreased tube pan and gently cut through batter for air bubbles.
Bake 30 to 35 minutes at 375 degrees. Invert pan until cake is cold. Remove from pan.

Melt over hot water:
1/3 cup powdered sugar
$2 / 3$ arpoons margarine 1 teaspoon vanilla
Beat until smooth. Drizzle over cake and sprinkle with chopped roasted peanuts.
