

Gorman Cagers Begin District Play Friday Night At Desdemona

Gorman Girls Lose Second Game Of Season

Just the 2nd loss of the season! And it took one of the best girls teams in the state to do it! These two statements could be made after the Gorman High girls basketball team lost their second game of the season to the Goldthwaite girls, rated as one of the best teams in Texas. The Gorman girls were undefeated in 7 straight games, after losing an early season game to De Leon. Gorman's season record is now 2 wins and 2 losses, while Goldthwaite is undefeated.

Ten points was the margin of defeat, 67-57, and most of it was made by high-scoring Shirley Powlett of Goldthwaite with 41 points. This girl is one of the highest scorers in the state this season. Her tremendous scoring performance was too much for Gorman, even though Annys Kate Blair scored 30 points and Nelda Robertson netted 17 points.

The Goldthwaite girls team went to the State Tournament last year and lost their first game of the season there. Most of that team is back this season.

Gorman boys and girls basketball teams will begin their district campaigns on Friday night when they journey to Desdemona. Our boys and girls teams will be in District 23-B for basketball this season. District 23-B includes Carbon, Desdemona, Strawn, Olden, and Gorman. District games will be played in double round robin, which means that each team in the district will play each of the other teams twice during the season.

Boys and girls teams will play on each date scheduled. In addition to the district schedule given below our girls team will play in the Hardin-Simmons Tournament at Abilene on February 7 thru 9.

There will be no Acreage Reserve Program on peanuts for 1957.

New payment rates have been set up on cotton acreage placed in the Soil Bank Acreage Reserve. These new payment rates will be mailed to cotton growers in the next few days.

In so far as we know, land placed in the 1957 Soil Bank must not be grazed in 1957. If a producer intends to put land in the Soil Bank Program it should not be grazed after January 1, 1957.

The funds for the Conservation Reserve Program are limited to each County and producers signing up on the program will be signed up on "first come, first serve" basis. When the funds for this program are exhausted we will be unable to take any more contracts, but in no case after March 15, 1957.

SALARY INCREASES FOR COUNTY OFFICIALS TO BE DECIDED ON BY COURT JANUARY 14TH

Salary increases for elective and other employees of Eastland County will be considered at a meeting of the Commissioners' Court at 9:30 a. m. Monday, Jan. 14 at the courthouse, according to action taken Thursday at a special meeting of the court.

According to a legal notice published in the January 3 edition of the Cisco Press, the court proposes raises of 18 per cent for all employees of the county, including the following elective officials: county judge, county commissioner, county attorney, county clerk, tax assessor and collector, county treasurer and sheriff.

The notice said "also a similar salary increase of an amount equivalent to 18 per cent of the present annual salary for all official deputies and all other appointed employees of Eastland County; and be it further resolved that the salaries of jurors and

grand jurors, in both the county and district courts and in both civil and criminal cases, be increased 25 per cent so as to make such pay the maximum allowed by law of \$5.00 per day."

Elective officials, except the county attorney and the county commissioner, have been paid \$4250.00 per year since 1920. Commissioners draw \$3750.00 and the county attorney, who is paid in part by the state for looking after district court affairs, draws \$4672.50. Deputies and other employees earn from \$160 to about \$200 per month at the present.

Under state law, the maximum salary allowed for county officials is \$8500 per year. After the increases, Eastland officials will be making 60 per cent of the maximum allowed them by law. Elective officials will be raised to about \$5,000.00.

Salaries of Eastland County officials have not been raised in 37 years.

Turkey Growers Meeting To Be At Ranger On Jan. 17

Ranger, Texas, Jan. 10 - An invitation is extended to all turkey growers, county agents, vocational agricultural teachers, processors and feed men within traveling distance of Ranger to attend one of the most important turkey meetings of the year to be held in that city on Thursday, January 17th at 6 p. m.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association, the Texas Turkey Federation, and the Eastland County Extension Service, and will be held at Ranger Jr. College.

Dr. D. E. Davis, head of the virus department of the research laboratory at A&M College, will be the chief speaker and will deliver an illustrated address on the diseases of turkeys and how to control them.

The sponsoring organizations feel that the greatest problem facing the turkey grower today is flock diseases which can mean the difference in success or failure in turkey farming, and Dr. Davis has been secured for this special meeting to give all the growers of this section his experience and research on how to combat flock diseases.

The meeting will get under way at 6 o'clock with a free turkey barbecue sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and served by the business men of Ranger, and all turkey growers are invited to bring their families along and enjoy the event together.

The barbecue will be served in the new Ranger Junior College cafeteria building.

To Set Up

T. B. Sanatorium

The Southern Baptist Convention, which has 8 1/2 million members in America and missions and hospitals in 35 overseas countries, has decided to start mission work and set up a big tuberculosis sanatorium in Tanganyika.

Already the Rev. W. O. Harper who will be secretary-treasurer in charge of the mission, has arrived in Dar es Salaam to make preliminary arrangements for the establishment of the sanatorium and a mission at Mbeya, in the Southern Highlands.

He also plans to set up a "goodwill center" in Dar es Salaam, which will combine religious work with boys' and girls' sports clubs, adult education classes and other social activities.

Mr. Harper told the Standard that it was planned to have a 50-bed sanatorium in the first instance, but it would be expanded to 100 beds as soon as possible. Both the sanatorium and mission buildings would have to be built "from scratch", and it was hoped to build them on a site adjoining the town in order to facilitate the provisions of services such as water and electricity.

Dr. J. E. Walker, who will be in charge of the sanatorium, will be leaving America for Tanganyika very soon. Other missionaries and their families are also coming in the near future.

Mr. Harper, who will have his headquarters in Dar es Salaam, said that the Southern Baptist Convention was spending about 10 million dollars a year in the foreign field. It had been established in Nigeria for over 100 years, and in the Gold Coast and Southern Rhodesia for many years, but Tanganyika would be the first mission venture in East Africa.

Mr. Harper stressed that his mission was not coming to Tanganyika to "take away" from other missions, but to add to the overall mission work being done in the territory. He realized that Tanganyika had had missions for years, but he had discovered that there were areas which still required mission work.

He expressed himself as very grateful for the cooperation and help he had received from Government, particularly the Medical Department, and from the Christian Council of Tanganyika when he made a survey visit to the territory in July.

The headquarters of the Southern Baptist Convention are at

Richmond, Virginia. Mr. Harper and his wife are both from Texas.

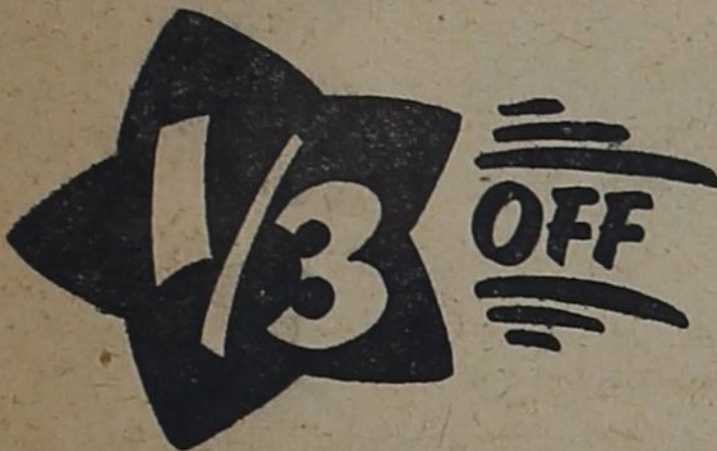

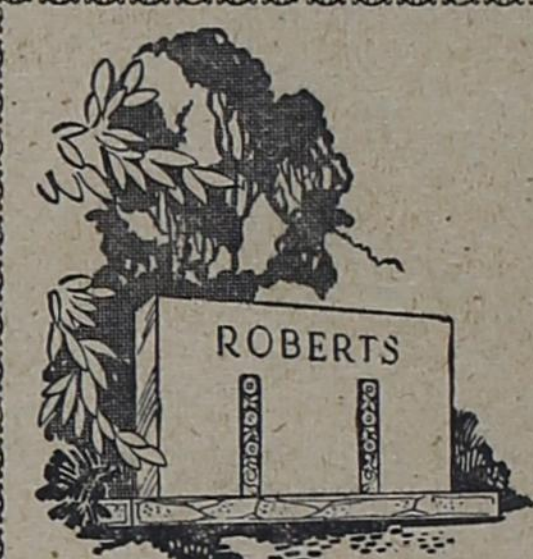

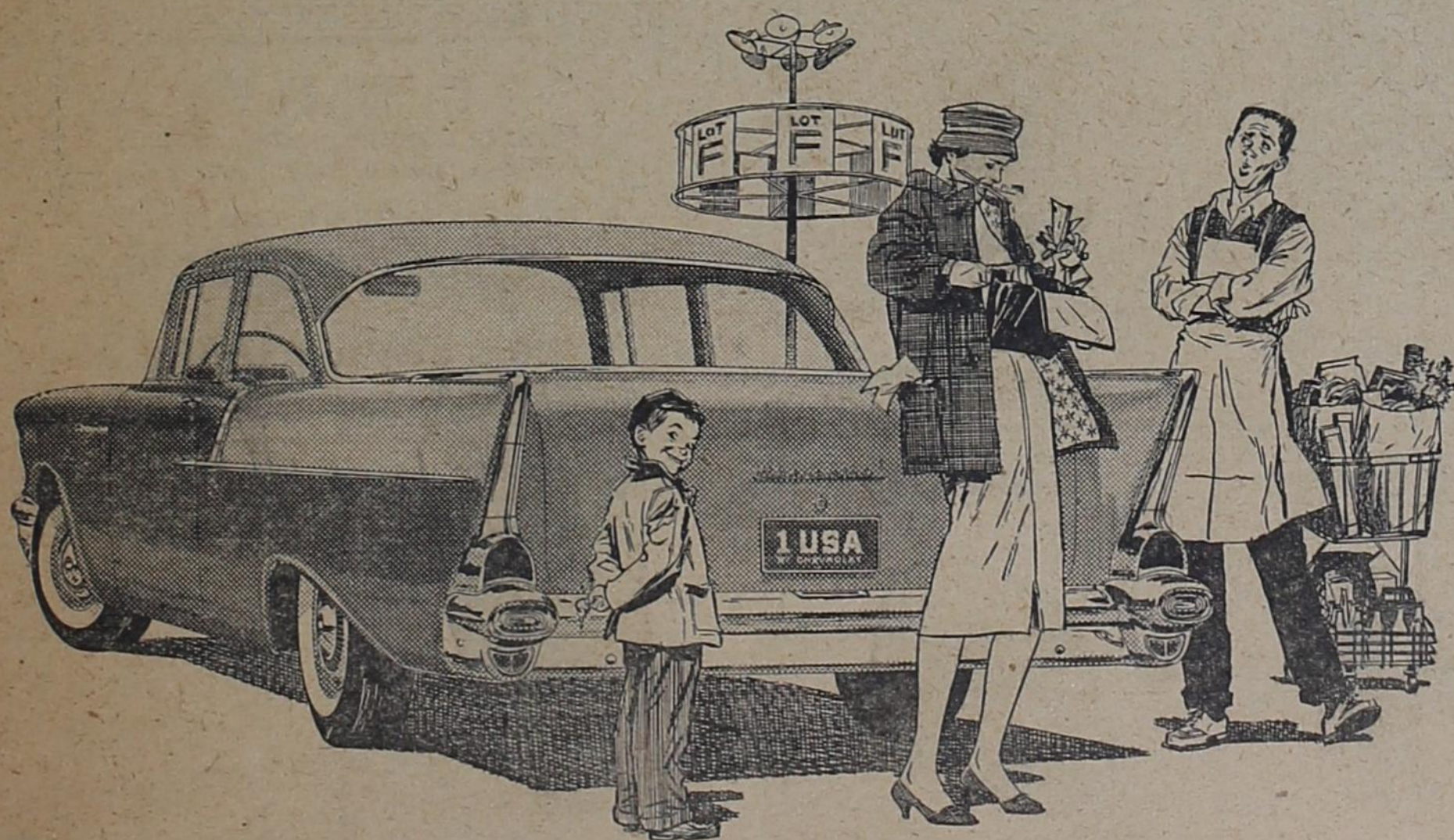

Highlights and Sidelights

From Our State Capitol
By Vern Sanford.

AUSTIN, Tex. - Conflict, complications and suspense made 1956 one of Texas' newsiest years. Many of the biggest stories didn't run out with the calendar. They are marked "to be continued in 1957."

These were some of the headline-makers:

POLITICS wore everyone to a frazzle. Gov. Allan Shivers took his first political tumble when Sen. Lyndon Johnson won control of the May Democratic convention. Price Daniel won over Ralph Yarborough for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in a narrowest-ever margin of a little more than 3,000 votes. Daniel gained shaky party control by getting a mostly-friendly executive committee at the September Democratic convention. But he held on to the Senate seat too long. Governor Shivers wouldn't buy the election-now, resign-later plan. And Shivers came to the end of his historic seven-year tenure as leader of the again-triumphant Democrats for Eisenhower.

DROUGHT, in its seventh year, grew steadily worse. Crops burned up. Streams stopped flowing. Reservoirs dwindled. State Water Board had its hands full trying to referee squabbles over water rights. Agricultural groups banded together in the Texas Drought Emergency Committee finally organized expanded federal relief.

All but five of Texas' 254 counties were designated disaster areas. Texas Water Resources Committee, a legislative study group, put in a lot of overtime reading a statewide water program for the next legislature. Suggestions: a \$100,000,000 bond program to help finance local projects, fishing and boat taxes to buy water storage space in federal reservoirs, "rainmaking" research at Texas colleges.

FEDERAL LEGISLATION had Texas repercussions. Eisenhower supporters groaned when he vetoed the natural gas bill. But the federal highway building bill passed. It means \$57,000,000 a year more for Texas road building. Texas Highway Dept. started using it at once, predicted an era of unparalleled progress. To move things faster, it reversed its long time policy, is now buying right-of-way for interstate roads. This brought a new headline - a hue and cry from county officials for help in buying land for state highways.

INTEGRATION VS. SEGREGATION made news on many fronts. Voters overwhelmingly approved three pro-segregation interposition referendums in the July primary. But no one was sure what would come of them. At Mansfield and Texarkana citizens blocked efforts at federal court-ordered school integration, and Governor Shivers sent Texas Rangers to maintain order. Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepherd took on the NAACP in a Tyler district court and won a temporary order banning the organization in Texas.

INVESTIGATION by legislative committees into US Trust and Guaranty Co.'s \$7,000,000 downfall brought demands for new lobby laws, controls on legislators' dealings with state agencies. US Trust's many creditors are still unpaid. It's all tied up in their numerous lawsuits for priorities.

INSURANCE INDUSTRY underwent a statewide solvency check. Seven per cent, out of more than 1,300, failed to qualify for new licenses.

POLIO VACCINE restrictions were completely removed in late summer. But with plenty for everyone, an indifferent public let vaccine supplies stack up. Some 80 per cent went unvaccinated. Unless interest increases, Texas will have to return nearly half of the state's \$3,000,000 federal vaccine allocation when the fiscal year runs out next June.

BUSINESS LEVEL HOLDS - Capital expansion, the building of new and growth of old industries, has kept Texas' 1956 business index at its 1955 high.

University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported the 1956 11-months total as the same as 1955. Rapid industrial expansion has kept the average up, says the bureau.

It offsets declines in residential building, consumer spending and farm employment.

CROP VALUE DOWN - Value of Texas' 1956 crops is estimated at \$1,100,000,000 - nine percent below last year and the 10-year average.
