

The Southern Baptist Convention, which has 81 million members in America and missions and hospitals in 35 overseas countries, has decided to start mission work and set up a big tuberculosis sanitorium in Tanganyika.

Already the Rev. W. O. Harper who will be secretary-treasurer in charge of the mission, has arrived in Dar es Salaam to make preliminary arrangements for the establishment of the sanitarium 440,637.64 and a mission at Mbeya, in the Southern Highlands.


