



ABILENE, TEX. - Familiar surroundings outweighed all flood discomforts with Mrs. Gertrude Hurd, 75-year-old blind resident of the flood-struck North Park area here, who insisted on returning to her home as soon as waters went down sufficiently, despite urging from friends and Red Cross workers. Here she sits in her favorite chair from which she says she can find her way to anything in the house. Helping her is Estell Johnson, one of the 56 trained Red Cross national disaster workers who have been dispatched to the Southwest storm area to assist chapter volunteers in helping disaster stricken families restore homes, furnishings and other living necessities. Red Cross relief operations have been constant throughout the month of April in Texas, with workers now spread through eight tornado swept counties and 18 other counties affected hy floods.







ing fifth in the broad jump. He was the only entry from Hawley, and almost won the Class B title singlehandedly. He would have scored two more points if judges had not overlooked his fifth place finish in the 100 yd. dash, and that would have given Hawley a clear second place in the meet instead of a tie with Richland Springs.

Other good performances by boys from our Region II-B were: David Green of Richland Springs was 2nd in the 100 and third in the 220; Pete Sloan of Richland Springs, 4th in the high hurdles and 5th in the low hurdles; Larry Nettleship of Richland Springs, 5th in the discus; Bryan Boyd of Early, 6th in the 880; and Pat Moore of Cross Plains, 6th in the 440-yard dash.

Texas is favored to win the Southwest Conference track and field meet at Austin this Friday and Saturday. At least four records should fall and several more are in danger.

Texas figures in all the marks that appear in danger - - its 440 yard relay team, miler Joe Villareal, hurdler Eddie Southern, and broad jumper Pat McGuire. Texas holds the world record in the 440-yard relay with 39.9 seconds - - a mark set at the Kansas Relays several weeks ago. And the Longhorn relay team has been consistent in getting under 40.8 seconds - - the conference record.

Villareal sped the mile in 4:08.8 minutes. That's 8.4 seconds under the conference record of 4:17.2 minutes. Southern has done the high hurdles in 13.9, which equals the league mark. McGuire has broad jumped 24 feet, 9 3/4 inches, same as the conference record. Texas appears likely to roll up more than 100 points to win by a long margin.
