> Heavy rains over the week end pushed the official total to 16.34 inches for 1957. All during 1956 only 17.47 inches were recorded. Already this year more rain has fallen than fell all during 1954 when only 16.33 inches was written into the books.

Already this is the eighth best May since records have been kept in the past 46 years. May is always the wettest month of the year in this area. If an additional 1.19 inches falls this month, it will be the wettest May since 1922, the Eastland County records show.
