Headquarters, U. S. European Command, Paris, France (June 1)-Major Harold N. Mehaffey, US MC, son of Mr. and Mrs. Z. O. Mehaffey, Gorman, Texas, was today awarded the Army Commendation Ribbon with Metal Pendant by General George H. Decker, USA, Deputy Commander, U. S. European Command.

The medal was awarded for meritorious service from June 4, 1956, to June 1, 1957, during which time Major Mehaffey has been senior aide-de-camp to General Decker. He was cited for his "outstanding tact and zeal in accomplishing his many difficult and highly important duties."

A Marine Corps aviator, Major Mehaffey has been at this senior U. S. headquarters in Europe for three years. His wife, Jane, and their 18-month-old daughter, Christopher, live in Ile de Villennes, near Paris.

A veteran of World War II and the Korean War, Major Mehaffey has previously been awarded 3 Distinguished Flying Crosses, 12 Air Medals and the Bronze Star.

The Mehaffeyes are due to return to the States within a few weeks.

"Brown Jug" Is Open For Business

The "Brown Jug" Dairy Bar and Cafe opened for business this week. The newly built establishment, which is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. E. L. "Jug" Dennis, derives its name from the nickname, "Jug", of Mr. Dennis. The name, "Brown Jug", was entered by three Gorman children in the contest recently conducted to choose the name of the new dairy bar and restaurant.

The "Brown Jug" is a cement block construction, and is located on Highway 6 about one-half mile west of the business section. It was built on the former A. M. Thurman plot.

The building consists of four sections, the main dining room, the dairy bar, the kitchen, and the patio. The main dining room occupies the left half of the building and will seat about 40 persons. Only tables and chairs (no booths) are in the dining room. The kitchen and dining room were equipped by B & H Restaurant Supply Co. of San Angelo. To the rear of the main dining room are rest rooms for men and women.

On the right half of the building are located the dairy bar and the kitchen. The kitchen is directly behind the dairy bar. To the right of the dairy bar and kitchen is the open-air dining space, or "patio". The patio has a roof, is partly enclosed, and runs the full length of the building. On the patio are tables and chairs which will seat about 36 persons. Including the dining room and patio, the "Brown Jug" will be able to seat about 76 people.

In the rear end of the patio is a barbecue pit. Barbecue is to be one of the specialties of the new eating concern.

Civil Defense Is Voluntary Efforts Of Individuals

Several people have come to me asking what is meant by Civil Defense and what would be expected of us should we set up a Civil Defense organization in Gorman. I am no authority on Civil Defense and in answering these questions I consulted several publications on Civil Defense published by our State and National Government.

I think possibly first we should assume a situation which I hope never comes to our city, but lets assume that our town is a shambles, our business district is leveled, the water supply contaminated, sewer lines broken. The dead lie unattended, the injured cry out for help we cannot give; those trapped in rubble and debris will live or they will die according to the measure of our skill to save them. If something like this should happen to our city what methods would we use in getting ambulances, fire trucks and rescue vehicles through streets that might be six feet deep in rubble and debris? How would we protect our people when the public water supply is contaminated? How could we lift this beam without endangering the lives of those trapped beneath it? Ambulances are taking the injured to the hospital that was filled hours ago. No central dispatching, no coordinator, no plan. We need food for the people and shelter and warm clothes. People are homeless; people are hurt; people are afraid. No county, no city, no section of our State is immune from this type of disaster. This is a fact we must face.

If we should decide to have a Civil Defense arrangement in our city, what shall we do? There are three things we should do - three things which need not cost us, our local government, our business hardly any money at all. We should first appoint a Disaster Relief Director, then we should train volunteers in different phases of Civil Defense and be ready for action when the emergency is at hand and our third step would be to urge the individual citizen to learn the basic principles of first aid, of fire fighting, of home nursing, and techniques of rescue.

Civil Defense is basically the voluntary effort of people, individually and in groups, together with local, state, and national governmental departments and agencies, to protect themselves, their families, homes, as well as other community facilities such as schools, etc., against the effects of warfare and natural disasters. I am a firm believer in the statement "Civil Defense is Common Sense."

O. P. Newberry Official of Bank Dies At Age 66

O. P. Newberry, 66 vice president of the Fort Worth National Bank, died early Sunday at his home, 801 Hill Crest, shortly after becoming ill.

Newberry became vice president of the bank in January 1952. Previously he was affiliated with Continental National Bank, as well as with banks in Kansas City, Mo. He was president of the First National Bank in Gorman from 1926 to 1951.

Newberry, a Navy veteran of World War I, was a member of First Presbyterian Church.

He was past president of the Exchange Club of Fort Worth and was active in Boy Scout work and other civic affairs.

Newberry was a former president of the Fort Worth Art Association and a director of the Chamber of Commerce. He was a member of the Fort Worth Club and River Crest Country Club.

Surviving are his wife; two sons, O. P. Newberry, Jr. of Fort Worth and William B. Newberry of Midland, and three grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Monday in First Presbyterian Church with Rev. Robert F. Jones officiating. Burial was in Greenwood.

ABILENE, (Spl.) - Thirteen Gorman young people have registered for McMurry College's ninth annual summer band and twirling school, to be held here on the McMurry campus July 14-17.

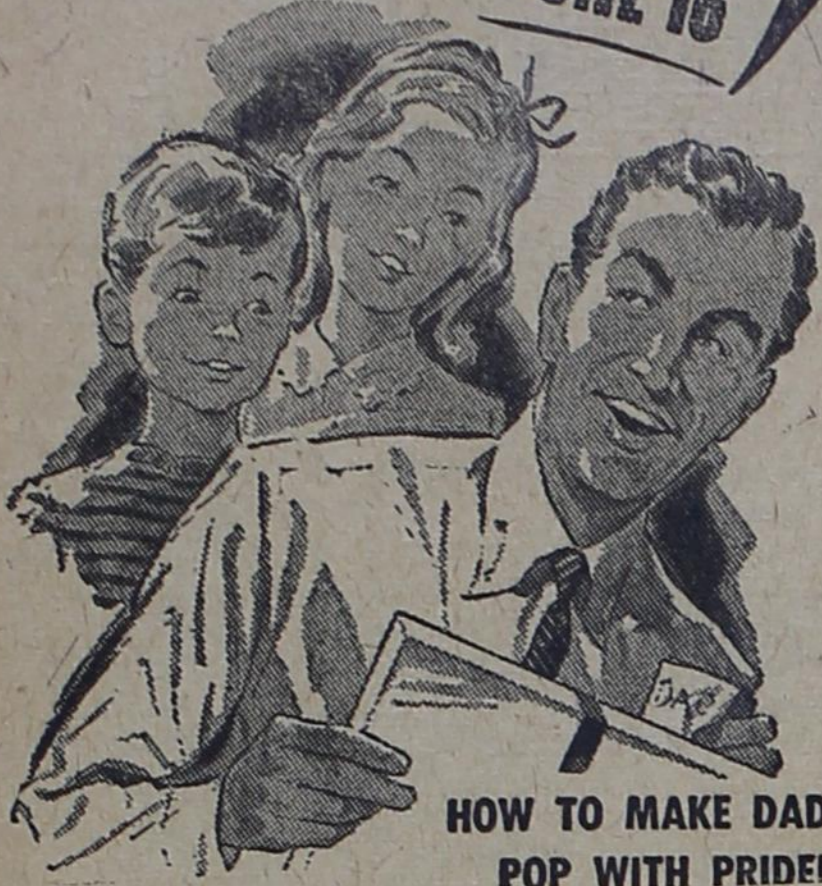
A student may take twirling, instrumental music, or both.

"His Bow Is Strength"

"But his bow abode in strength, and the arms of his hands were made strong by the hands of the mighty God of Jacob." Gen. 49:24

The discovery of gunpowder changed everything in warfare, but for thousands of years the bow and arrow were man's chief weapons, and good ones they were. Many more battles have been won or lost by the longbowmen and the crossbowmen than have been won and lost with the musket or the cannon.

Much depended on the bow, for those of ancient times, upon its strength and its resiliency. The English bow was made out of 'yew wood', a hard wood imported from Spain. The ancient Egyptians probably used the 'bamboo canes'. The American Indians used the 'hickory' for the making of their bows.

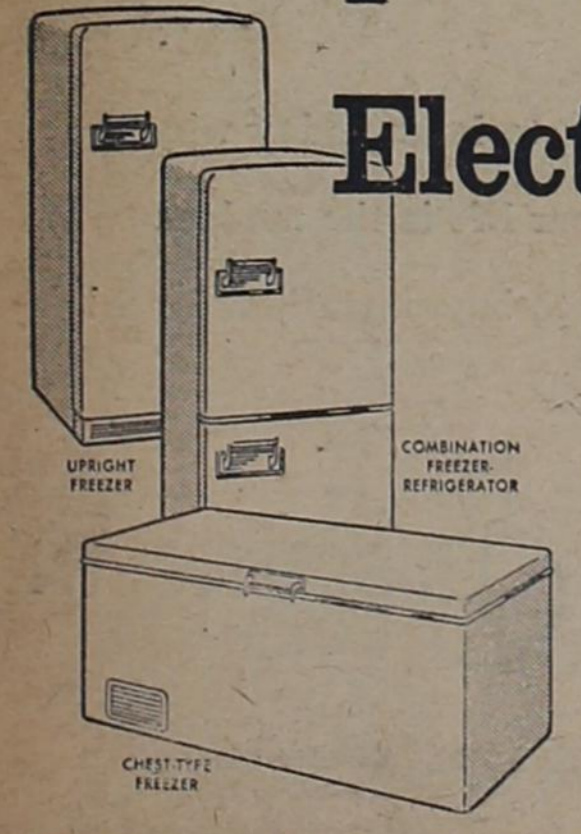
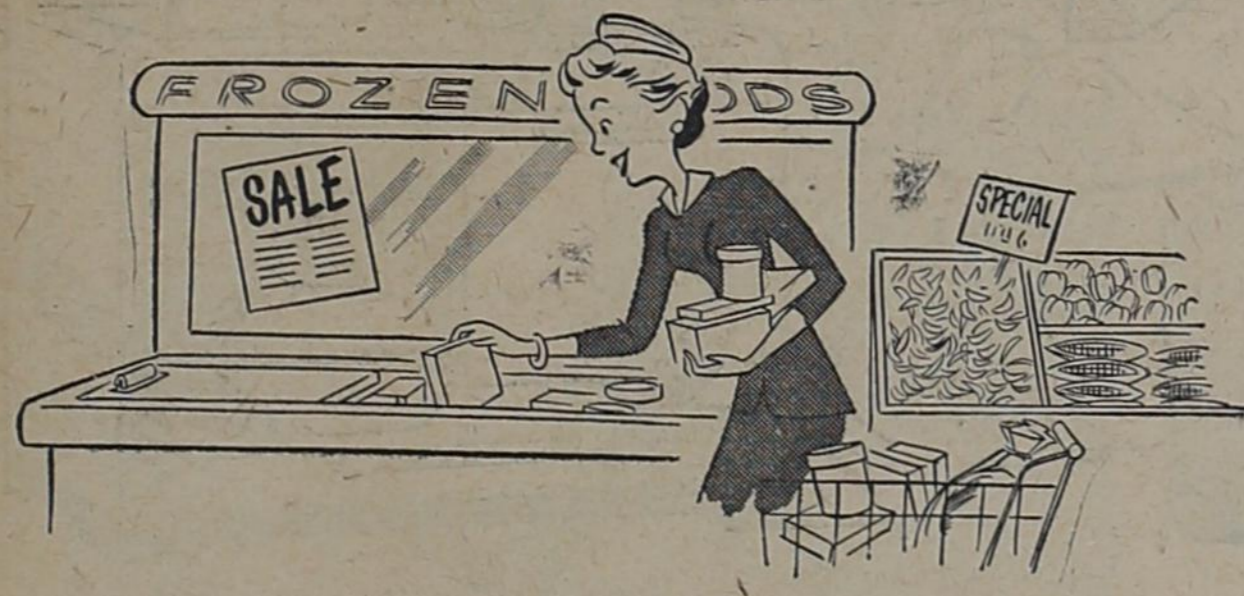

1957 Program Plans Underway

Peanut growers in all areas of the United States voted in the 1956 Referendum to continue price support of peanuts for the next three marketing years. Price support for 1957 has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture at a minimum national average level of \$221.40 per ton. This minimum support price which is 82 percent of the January 15, 1957, effective parity price of \$270 per ton will be adjusted upward at the beginning of the marketing year (August 1) if at that time the effective parity price or a change in supply from that now estimated results in calculation of a higher support price in accordance with price support legislation.

Use of peanuts in the first several months of the current marketing year in candy, peanut butter, and salted nuts show an increase of about 6 per cent over the same period for the preceding year. Thus, there does seem to be some gain in terms of expansion in the size of the edible market for peanuts which is of vital importance to growers, particularly over a period of several years.

Seed peanuts are available this year throughout the Southwest at prices ranging generally from 21c per pound to 24c per pound. Numerous seed sources are available to growers at these prices.

The agency charged with the responsibility of carrying out price supports on peanuts in this area is SOUTHWESTERN PEANUT GROWERS ASSOCIATION. The Association will support the price by making available to growers non-recourse warehouse storage loans. A number of warehouses in various parts of the Southwest will be available this fall for the storage of loan peanuts. In addition various shellers in the Southwest will be purchasing peanuts at or above loan prices for their immediate use. Ample marketing and storage facilities will be available to growers in all sections of the Southwest this year.

Peanut growers in the Southwest are reminded of the services available through the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station located at Stephenville, Texas and the Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station located at Stratford, Oklahoma. These Experiment Stations are doing research work on all phases of peanut planting, growing and storing and work closely with the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association in informing growers of ways to increase peanut production. For any information or any problem in this regard contact the Association or contact Experiment Stations directly. Several grower meetings have been conducted this year jointly by the Association and the Experiment Stations. More meetings are being planned to discuss growing and marketing developments.

Subsoil Moisture Best In Years

Eastland County Texas farmers are approaching the 1957 planting dates with one of the best subsoil moisture seasons in years according to County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper.

W. B. Starr long time peanut farmer in the western part of the county in the Dan Horn community recently expressed the opinion of many of the peanut farmers who are expected to plant 35,000 acres in the next several weeks.

Starr said: "We have a wonderful subsoil season. Because of these rains our problem now is to get the peanuts in the ground and get them up."

Incidentally, Starr, while serving as the first manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, worked for a year without any salary. He did however receive a part of his travel and other incidental expenses.

Should the rains continue Cooper said that some of the fungus diseases of peanuts would be expected to take their toll and result in lower yields. He specifically referred to Southern Blight and Leaf Spot.

There is no cure for the Southern Blight. It has been reported as attacking over 200 culti-

vated and wild plant in the Cotton Belt Leaf Spot though not as severe can kill the peanut plant but it does its greatest damage through the yellowing, the spotting and the loss of the leaves.

The use of gypsum or land plaster, although an old practice in some sections, has never been fully explored in Eastland county.

According to the County Agent it has been tried on several farms by being applied to the soil prior to planting the nuts without any appreciable increases in yields. The recommended practice now is to apply 400 to 500 pounds of the material to the top of the plant at blooming time.

The use of a preemergence chemical at planting time may have a place in the future on peanut farms during years of normal or above normal rainfall.

A formulation of a chemical known as dinitro ortho secondary butylphenol is sprayed on a twelve inch band down the drill after the peanuts are planted and the row packed with a packer. This is done in one single operation. The material kills crabgrass and other weed and grass seed as they germinate. It is effective for several weeks and does not harm the young peanut plants.

This material was tried last year on the farms of J. B. Caudle, T. J. Wellborn and Hulon Erwin in the Rising Star area but it could not have been called a fair test due to the drought according to Cooper.

Plans are in the making to try it again this year he said.

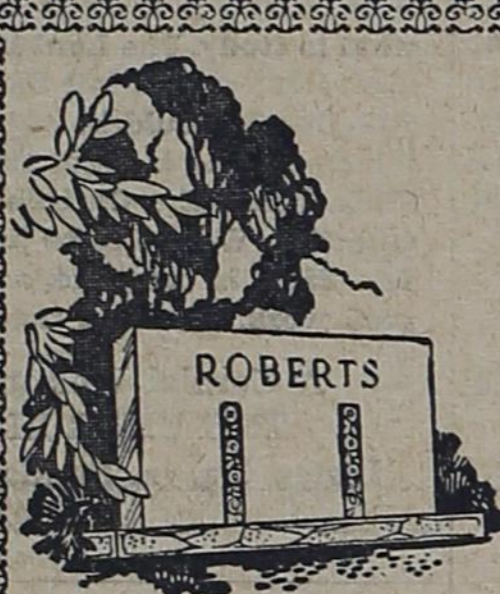

Highlights and Sidelights

From Our State Capitol
By Vern Sanford.

AUSTIN, Tex. - - Fifty-fifth Legislators will have a shorter-

than-usual "vacation." Gov. Price Daniel says he will call them back, probably about October, for a special session.

Final score showed 47 out of 51, or better than 90 per cent, of the governor's recommended bills passed in the regular session. But the missing 10 per cent are

vital, says Daniel. He still wants: 1. His law enforcement commission, a sort of statewide grand jury to investigate official misconduct.

2. A lobbyist registration act, registration of persons who represent others before state agencies, and, possibly, other "better government" bills previously advocated.

3. A state plan for buying water storage space in federal reservoirs. A constitutional amendment to do this died in the past session. Since amendments cannot be considered in a special session, the governor said he is working on a statutory plan - - possibly the creation of a statewide water district with authority to issue bonds, and levy taxes.

4. Action on "other matters that may arise" after the Travis County grand jury reports. Jury is looking into any irregularities that might have caused the ICT Insurance Co. collapse and alleged payoffs to legislators by the Texas Naturopathic Association.

So, instead of the usual post-session lull, the Capitol faces a summer of suspense followed by a frenzied fall. NEW JURY AT WORK - Texas has generated more troubles than one grand jury could see to in two months. Hence, a brand new Travis County jury begins this week where the old one left off after digging away all during April and May.

Its study of ICT's past and

naturopathic legislation will probably last all summer.

A Dallas grand jury already has indicted Ben Jack Cage, one-time ICT manager, on charges of theft and embezzlement. Authorities are trying to get him returned from South America so he can be tried.

WHO, WHAT, WHERE AND WHEN? - - Texas' off-again, on-again Insurance Commission is still a prime source of speculation.

Past Legislature passed laws abolishing the old board and enabling the governor to appoint new members. It also directed the commission to move within three years from its leased office quarters into a building to be erected with insurance tax revenue. And it passed dozens of new restrictive insurance laws for the new commission to administer.

Old board members Mark Wentz and John Osorio promptly resigned. But Gov. Daniel refused to accept their resignations. He said they'd have to stay on until their successors were named.

Then Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ruled the insurance tax revenue couldn't be used for a new building. It goes into the general revenue fund and is already earmarked for other things, he pointed out.

And, until the new commission gets going, insurance men over the state are uncertain as to how to comply in detail with some of the new laws.

ETHICS QUANDARY - - Just who should do what to comply with the new code of ethics is still being discussed in the Capitol.

Some 163 legislators and state officials have given the secretary of state statements about their connections with businesses, under state regulation. Assets ranged from Cuban oil companies to small town dry goods stores. Sec'y of State Zollie Steakley said failure to file such a statement could be grounds for removal from office, but that he didn't have authority to enforce it.

Gov. Daniel said he saw no need for his filing, since the constitution prohibits a governor's serving as officer or director of a corporation under state regulations. But, he suggested the secretary of state might ask for an attorney general's ruling to clear up other points about the law.

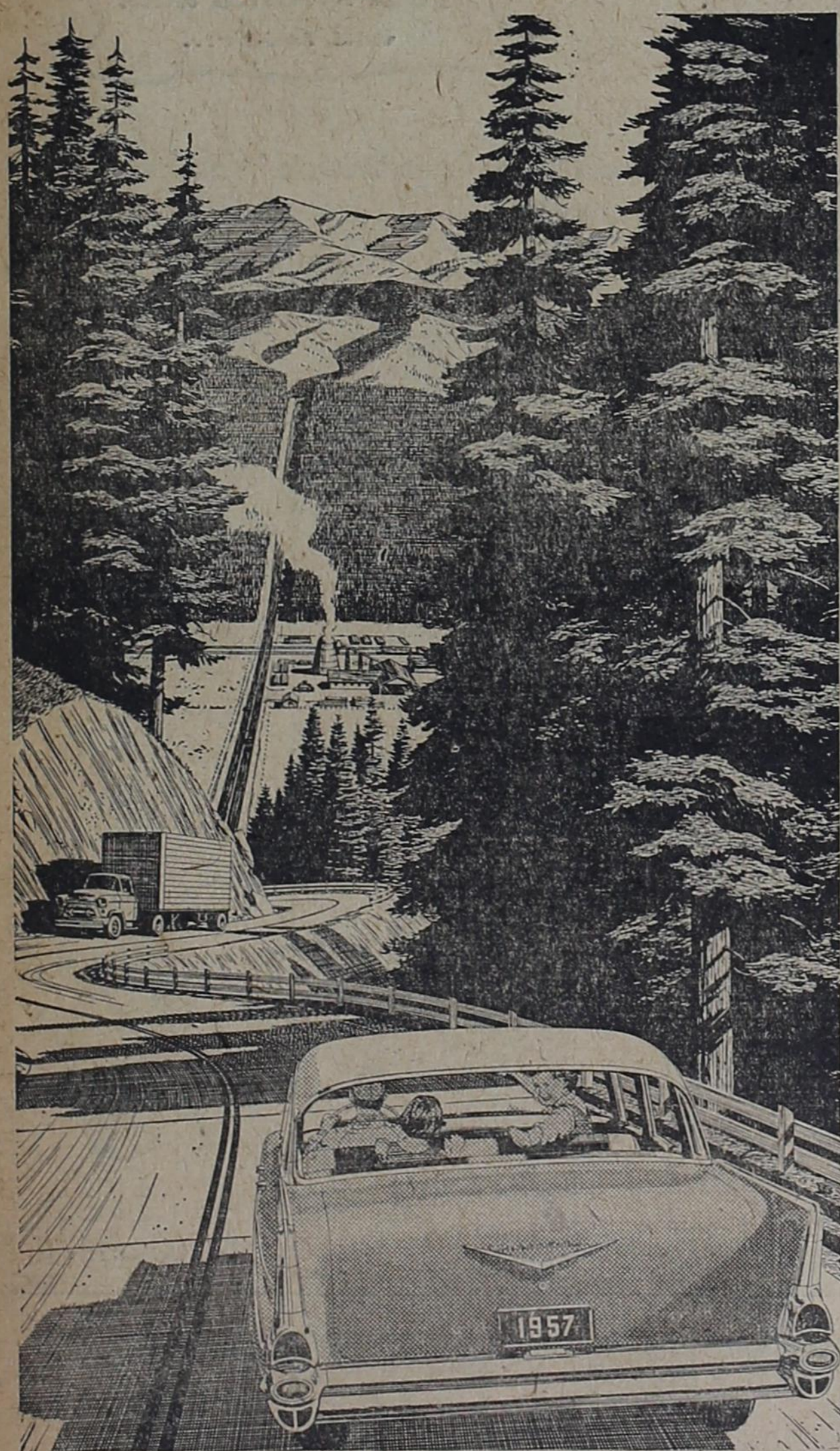

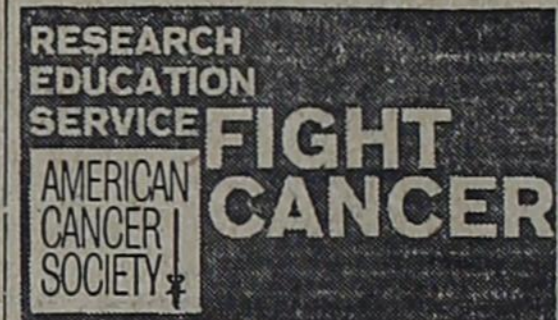
LINDA LEE SPECK ENROLLS AT HARDIN-SIMMONS SUMMER SCHOOL

BOBBY MORROW IS TRAVEL WEARY

Bobby Morrow, the world's fastest human who has traveled within the past 18 months halfway around the world and back proving it, is travel weary. In an interview with the Abilene Reporter-News last week, Bobby emphasized that he's not tired of running but weary of traveling.

The Olympic triple gold medal winner actually has been in training since December of 1955, when he made a pre-Olympic tour of New Zealand and Australia. However, he does not attribute his loss to Willie White of Harbor Junior College at the Compton (Calif.) Relays two weeks ago to his travel weariness.

"White just slipped up on the whole field," Bobby explained. "All the top runners were in the middle lanes and he (White) was on the outside lane. While we were watching each other (Mike Agostini of Fresno State was on Bobby's left and Orlando Hazley of Oklahoma A&M on his right) White slipped up on all of us."

Morrow and White were both timed in 9.4 seconds, with Agostini third and Hazley fourth. The defeat by White was only the second 100-yard dash loss in Morrow's brilliant college career. The other was a loss to Dave Sime of Duke in the 1956 Drake Relays at Des Moines, Iowa. Sime, you may remember, is also one of the world's fastest humans. He set a new world record for the 220 at 20 seconds flat, and tied the world record for the 100 (9.3 seconds) on three occasions last year.

SIX OLYMPIC CHAMPS HEAD NCAA FIELD

The National Collegiate Athletic Association track and field meet goes on at Austin this week end boasting six Olympic champions, the first American miler to crack the 4-minute barrier, and four potential world record smashers.

Prospects are dim for a renewal of the sprint feud between Bobby Morrow of ACC and Dave Sime of Duke. Sime, who beat Morrow once but lost to him in the NCAA last year and failed to make the Olympic team, hasn't entered the meet and reports indicate he won't because he has been playing baseball. He did take time out from baseball to tie the world mark (9.3 sec.) in the 100 again this year.

Don Bowden of California, who electrified the nation last week when he ran the mile in 3:58.7 minutes, hasn't said for sure he will be in the mile although he is entered in both the mile and the half-mile. But in the half-mile he has a time of 1:47.8 against the NCAA record of 1:49.5 minutes.

Bob Gutowski of Occidental, who recently bettered the world mark in the pole vault with a leap of 15 feet 8 1/4 inches, will be competing in the meet.

World record prospects are Gutowski in the pole vault, Greg Bell of Indiana in the broad jump Bowden in the mile and half-mile, and Elias Gilbert of Winston-Salem in the high hurdles, although the latter will face defending and Olympic champion Lee Calhoun of North Carolina College.

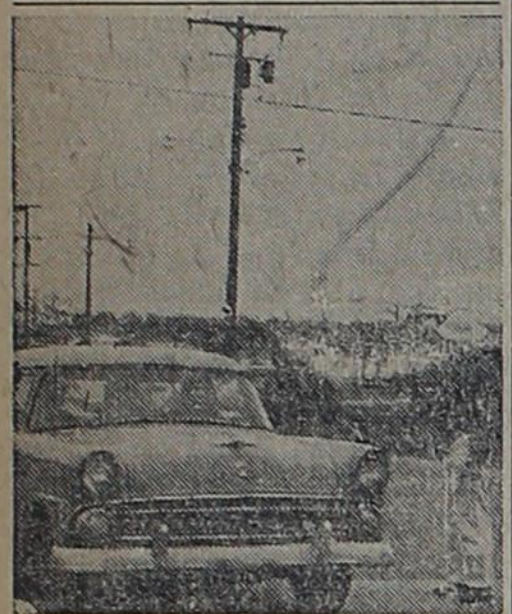

New Interstate Highway Net to Aid CD Evacuation

America's roads to survival, a part of the 41,000-mile National System of Interstate and Defense Highways, that will be carefully laid out over the continent within the next 12 years.

THIS INTEGRATED \$33,000,000,000 network — the world's greatest public works project — will include freeways running from the heart of major cities to the outskirts and beyond. Over these roads, the millions who live and work in cities could seek the safety of distance from a nuclear bomb blast if adequate warning of impending attack were given.

In normal times, restless Americans drive 550,000,000,000 miles a year in private autos. Families must also rely on cars to flee from danger in the event of civil defense emergency.

The automobile is a rolling home in an emergency, the Federal Civil Defense Administration points out. You can eat and sleep in it, keep warm and dry, receive vital instructions by radio, drive out of danger areas, and even get some shelter against blast or fallout.

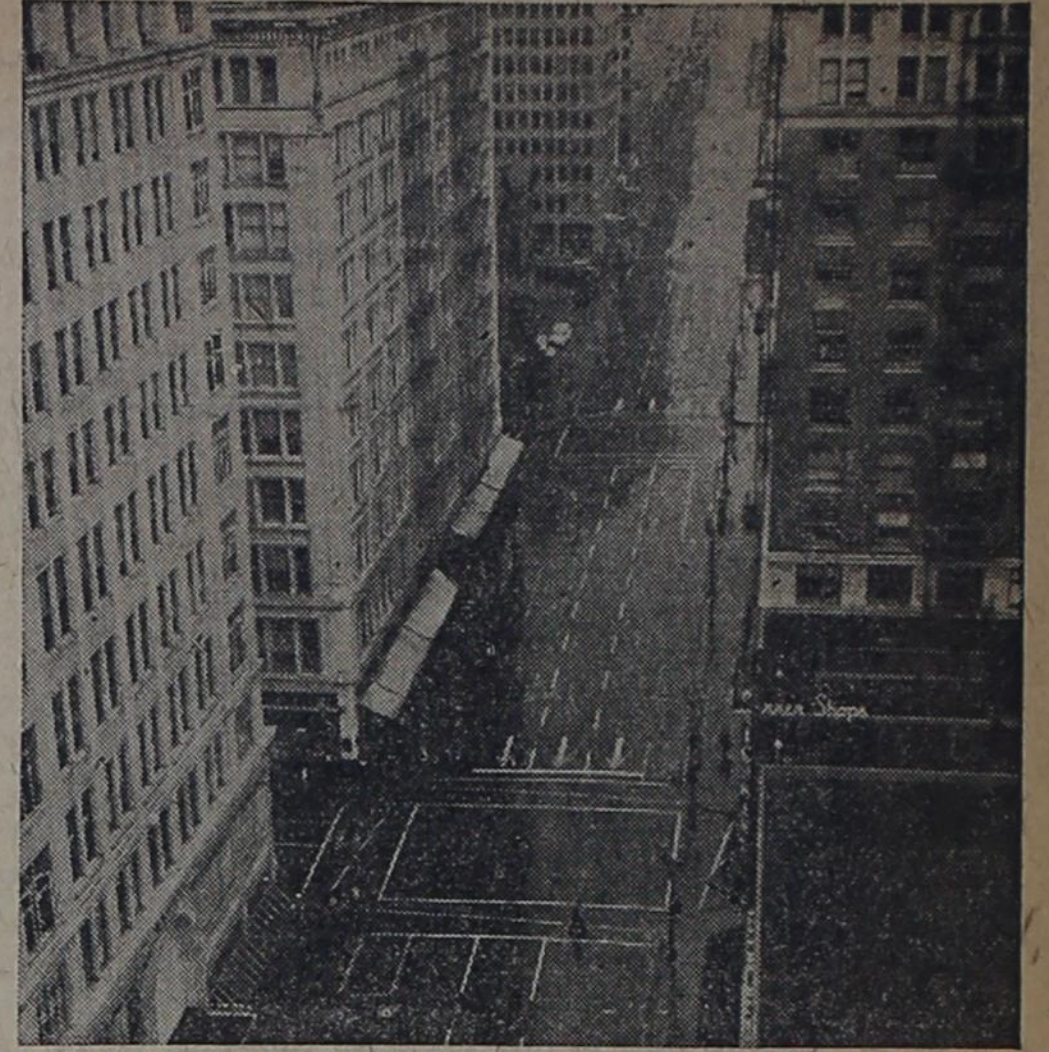

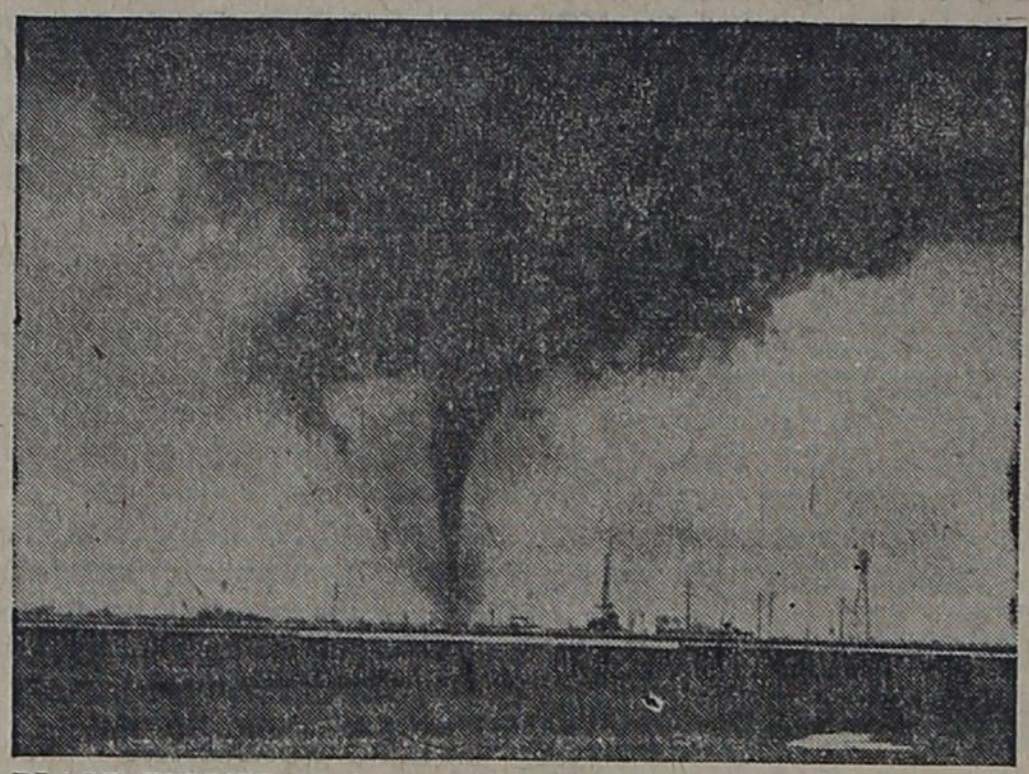
