## Work On Duster Road To Begin In Early Fall

B. M. Bennett, commissioner and H. A. Huffman, Resident Engineer of Comanche County, were checking right-of-way deeds for the Duster Road Wednesday morning.

Mr. Huffman stated that work would start in the fall and be completed by early spring on this road.

The road will start at Farn-to-Market Road 587 at the Duster store and run north to intersect old Hwy. Six (now FM 8) at Brogdon Field. The new highway will continue north on Fisher to join the new highway. FM 8 will start at Fisher and extend west on Lexington to Capers' filling station on the hill-top.

Commissioner Bennett said that work is progressing on repairing roads and bridges that were washed out by the recent rains. He was profuse in his appreciation of the patience most of the folks in his precinct are showing in regards to repairing roads.

## Gorman Golfers Invited To Attend Eastland Tourney

Gorman golfers have been extended a special invitation to enter the Eastland Lakeside Country Club's seventh annual invitational golf tournament.

Qualifying rounds in the tournament are now underway and some 100 golfers are expected to qualify. A pro-am tourney is to be held June 21 and qualifying rounds for medalist honors must be played that day, according to O. H. Dick, chairman.

The tournament will be a match play event in all flights and Dick said there would be flights for beginners as well as top ranking golfers.

Dick described the Lakeside course as being in the best shape it has been in seven years. "Our greens are in perfect condition," he said, "and our fairways are beginning to take on that East Texas look."

The Eastland golf course was organized in 1950. Champions of the tournament have included such well known golfers as Joe Ed Black of Abilene, Jimmy Phillips, the late Marion Hiskey, Lee Chapman of Fort Worth, Ray Ferguson of Breckenridge and Darrell Tully of Corpus Christi.

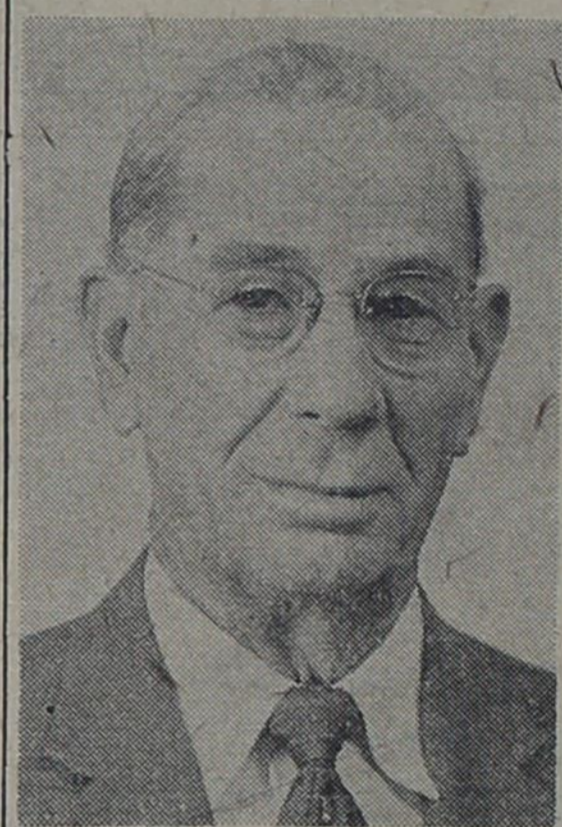
A picture of the wrecked car is displayed in the Progress window.

## C. C. Parker Retires As Rural Mail Carrier After 39 Years



(Sweetwater Reporter)

Charles C. Parker, who recently retired after nearly 39 years of service as a rural postal carrier and now lives at 1200 Sias Street, recalls service under 11 postmasters.

During his time, he has memories of the old horse and buggy days when he started.

The buggy did not have a wind shield and going north in the winter time was a tough job for the \$94 a month which constituted his salary in those early days. In the summer time he used a five foot umbrella for protection against rain and hot sun.

He began using his first automobile on the route in 1926. It was an "open air job", he recalls.

Parker tells of a time when he was caught in a severe wind storm. He thinks that he would probably have lost his buggy if he hadn't driven the horse in a circle "which seemed to have helped to keep it on the ground."

On one occasion he was trapped by high water and could not return to his office until the following day.

Mr. Parker and his wife are members of the Baptist Church and have many friends here and over this area who join his postal fellow workers in wishing them "a long life of retirement."

He was born Nov. 30, 1887 in Angelina County, Texas, and was married in December, 1911, to Miss Rosa Ellis of Eastland County. They have one daughter, LaVerne, who lives in Sweetwater.

Mr. Parker attended Hankins Normal College for a teacher's degree when a young man and taught school for five years. He also taught in Tyler Commercial College for two years before he entered the postal service.

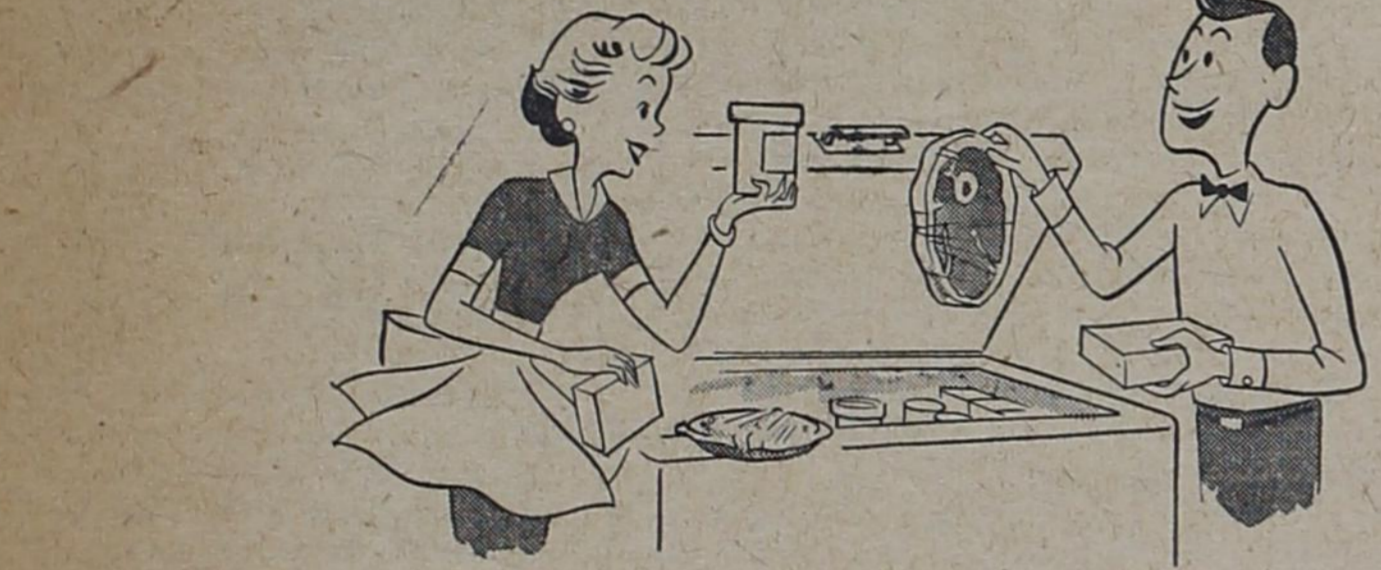



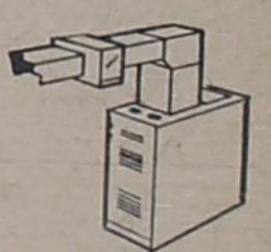

MORROW FINALLY TIES  
WORLD RECORD

Bobby Morrow has finally attained the one accomplishment that has eluded him for three years in his specialty, the 100-yard dash. He is now a co-holder of the world record (9.3 seconds) for the century sprint. Morrow came from behind at the 80-yard mark to beat Ira Murchison of Western Michigan in the world-record-equaling time of 9.3 in their preliminary heat, breaking one of eight NCAA records to fall at the track and field meet in Austin last weekend.

Morrow, who has defeated 3 of the 5 men who share the world record of 9.3 first set by Mel Patton of Southern Calif. in

1948, finally found the wind (3 miles per hour), the track (fast), and the competition right for an official share of the world mark that has been just beyond his flying cleats for so long. The wind of 3 miles per hour was well under the limit of 4.73 required for world records. Bobby's time lowered the NCAA record of 9.4 first set in 1929 and tied three times.

The other world record co-holders for the 100 besides Patton and Morrow are Hector Hogan of Australia in 1954, James Golliday of Northwestern in 1955 and Leamon King of California and Dave Sime of Duke, both in 1956. Sime had tied the world mark four times. Morrow has beaten Hogan, King and Sime. Sime is one of only two men to beat Morrow in the 100-yard dash in college. No one has ever defeated Bobby twice.

Murchison, who was ahead of Morrow until the 80-yard mark of their historic race, is one of the two men who hold the world record of 10.1 seconds for the 100 meters, which is more than 9 yards over 100 yards. Murchison was also timed in 9.3, but his time will not be considered for the world record since it was a non-winning performance.

All in all, there was one world record set, two world records tied, and eight new NCAA records set in the 2-day meet. The new world record was set in the pole vault by Bob Gutowski of Occidental at 15 feet 9 3/4 inches, which better his pending world mark of 15 feet 8 1/4 inches. Besides the feat of Morrow, the other world record-tying performance was 22.2 seconds in the 220-yard low hurdles by Ansel Robinson of Fresno State. The world mark for the low hurdles was set by Dave Sime in 1956. Naturally, all three are new NCAA records.

Greg Bell of Indiana leaped 26 feet, 7 inches, which is the second best broad jump in history and better the NCAA mark of 26-6. Only the 26-8 1/4 world record leap by Jesse Owens in 1935 surpasses Bell's effort.

Other NCAA records to fall were Lee Calhoun, North Carolina College, 13.6 in high hurdles; John Fromm, Pacific Lutheran, 248 feet, 1 inch in javelin throw; 880-yard run, Don Bowden, California, 1:47.2 minutes; Charles Jones, Iowa, 8:57.6 minutes in two-mile run.

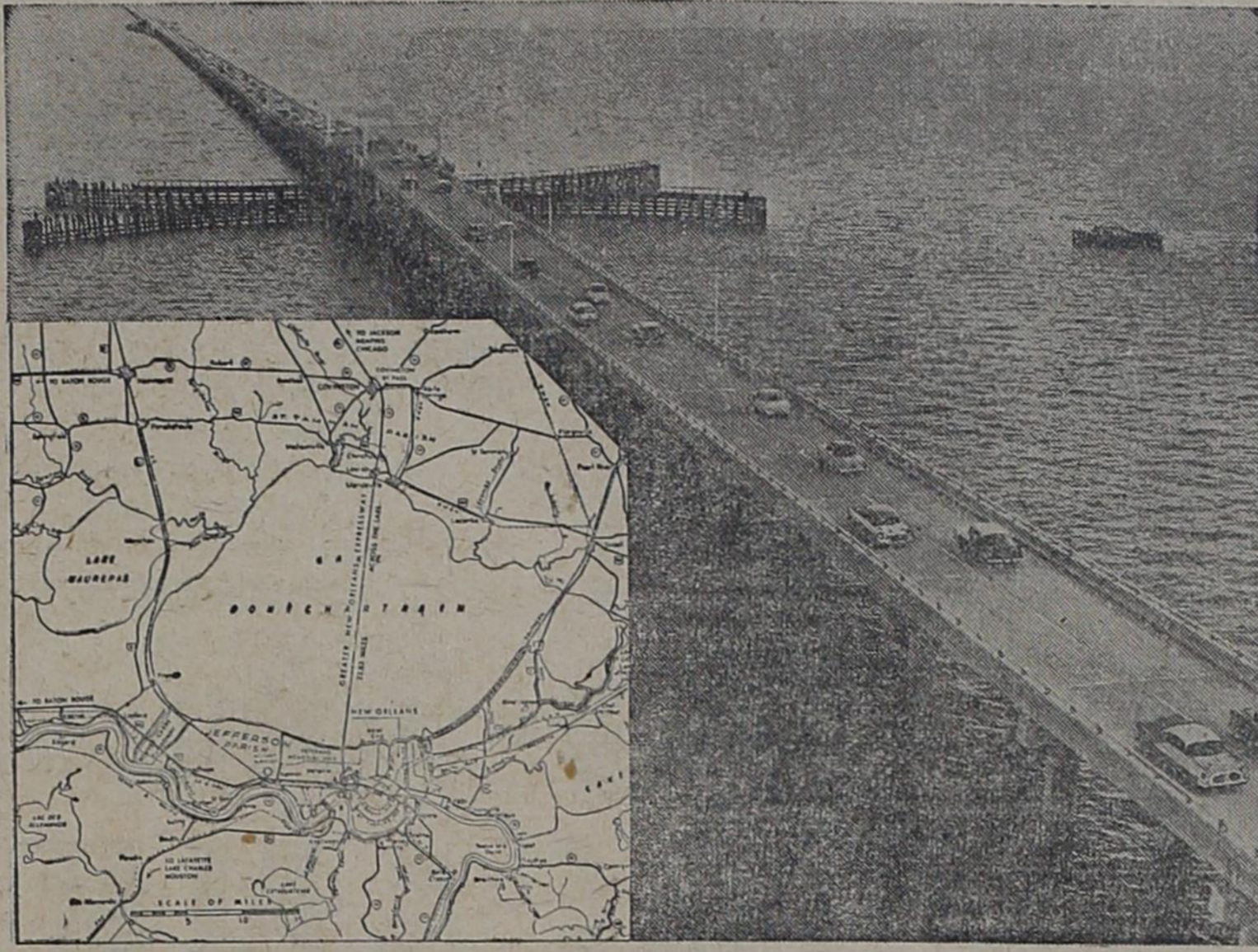

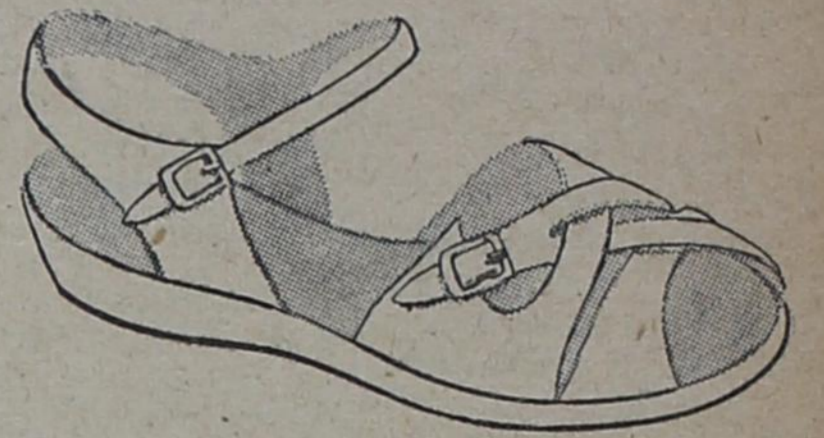

**WHO'S BEING GORED?**

Some months ago there appeared in the columns of the Progress an item from the Federal Dept. of Health at Washington in regard to the Hoxey Cancer Clinic of Dallas, Texas, giving it a black eye so to speak and advising all who were afflicted with cancer to abstain from having anything to do with this method of treatment.

Some time later there appeared in Gorman the Mobile X-Ray Unit for the purpose of making an X-Ray of any who wished to take advantage of this service. And according to my information there were several hundred of our citizens that took advantage of the same.

Now I wish to make some statements in observation of these two Health Units. And they are as follows: It is my information that quite a few of those who took the X-Ray service offered received a report back from the Austin office of the Texas Health Dept. to report to their doctors for further observation, indicating that they had indications that TB was present in their lungs, etc. Now, I have talked with several of these who got this kind of report and have as yet to find one that had the report from Austin confirmed by their doctor, including myself as one of these. After spending quite a little time and money to find out that I did not have any TB symptoms, I am compelled to write this letter to the Progress and ask who is being gored?

In the first place this X-Ray unit has cost several thousand dollars of your and my Tax money to equip and then another nice sum to send it out and take these shots at the suspecting public. Then another nice sum is being spent by many old age pensioners and others to find out that what the Unit showed was all an error. All this at our expense, too, from our tax money.

But on the other hand as far as I know the Hoxey Clinic at Dallas, does not get any tax support from the State. And also I can name some in the Gorman territory that have taken this treatment and are apparently well today as a result of this treatment. Perhaps you, the reader of this article, can also name some that have had treatment and were helped by the Hoxey method.

Now, I am not condemning our splendid hospital and staff of doctors, nor trying to promote the interests of the Hoxey Clinic, but am just wondering from th's angle "WHO IS BEING GORED".

As to "being Gored", I don't think anyone is trying that in this case. Many cases of TB have been arrested and cured due to this Mobile Unit. If one person in a large family was carrying a TB germ and did not know it, in time the whole family might become victims.

As to the Hoxey Clinic - if you and a few other people want to risk your lives and health with them, that is your business. Personally, I think too much evidence has been presented against their so-called cure for me to endorse them. As far as I know the cost of an X-Ray is approximately \$6 - could it be that you had blood, heart of other treatments or examinations as a precaution against future illness?

"Tips on freezing cooked foods" and "processing foods for the freezer" was the subject matter for the afternoon lesson. The foods leader, Mrs. Julian Steele was unable to attend, so the lesson outline was presented in leaflet form and a discussion period followed. Some of the pointers on freezing cooked foods are:

1. Don't overload your storage space with cooked foods, but it is wise to have some cooked food in case of an emergency, or for special occasions, such as holidays or during the busy season.
2. Moistureproof packaging is a must in preserving texture and flavor. Baked products may need more protection than others.
3. Food must be thoroughly cooled before storing away in the freezer.
4. Use only the best of high quality foods for freezing. Freezing never makes a high quality food from an inferior product.
5. Cut spices to half the amount - because freezing tends to make them stronger.

7. Fried foods do not freeze as well as others. Flavor is lost some what.
8. Only a few ready-cooked vegetables freeze satisfactorily. In fact, baked beans and sweet potatoes are the exception. They improve in flavor.
