Burgess - Warren Attend FFA Meet In Fort Worth

Durwood Burgess and Jerry Warren, in company with Mr. E. C. Bramlett, left Wednesday morning to attend the three day State meeting of the Future Farmers of America at Will Rogers Memorial Auditorium in Ft. Worth.

Durwood will receive the State Farmer reward which is the highest honor a boy can receive in Texas FFA work.

Jerry is attending the meeting as a voting delegate. He is working for his State honor which he hopes to receive in 1958.

To achieve this honor the boys must have the following qualifications:

STATE FARMER DEGREE Minimum Qualifications for election:

1. Must have held the Degree of Chapter Farmer preceding election to the Degree of State Farmer, have been an active member of the FFA for at least two years, and have a record of satisfactory participation in the activities of the local chapter.

2. Must have satisfactorily completed at least two years of instruction in vocational agriculture have in operation an outstanding program of supervised farming, and be regularly enrolled in a vocational agriculture class or have completed all the vocational agriculture offered in the school last attended.

3. Be familiar with the provisions of the constitutions of the State association and national organization.

4. Demonstrate proficiency in parliamentary procedure.

5. Be able to lead a group discussion for forty minutes and pass some occupational or FFA test provided by the governing body of the State association.

6. Must have earned by his own efforts from farming or other agricultural work and deposited in a bank or otherwise productively invested at least \$500 (at least two-thirds of the amount must be derived from his supervised farming program.)

7. Show outstanding ability as evidenced by his leadership and cooperation in student, chapter, and community activities, and have a satisfactory scholarship record certified by local school superintendent of principal.

8. Must have participated in an outstanding way in activities for community improvement and the development of agriculture.

Farmers Warned Of Peanut Bag Ruling

New regulations concerning the type of bags farmers may use in marketing the 1957 peanut crop were announced recently by the U. S. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

In previous years, the Commodity Credit Corporation has encountered losses and difficulties from the use of old, odd size, and type bags in the Southwest area in carrying out the price support program on peanuts, Chairman E. E. Blackwell of County ASC Committee wrote.

This resulted in waste and loss from torn bags, problems in handling and stacking peanuts in the warehouse, and difficulty in meeting sanitation requirements of Pure Food and Drug Administration, Blackwell said.

"These problems originate with individual growers when they use old, dirty and odd size bags," Blackwell said. "For this reason, in 1957 Commodity Credit Corporation has established minimum requirements with respect to bags in order that peanuts may be eligible for price support." The minimum requirements were listed as follows:

1. Peanuts delivered in mesh or net type bags will not be eligible for price support.

2. The bags shall be made of material weighing not less than 7 1-2 ounces nor more than 10 ounces per square yard and contain no sisal fibers.

3. The bags shall be of uniform size with approximately two bushels capacity.

4. The bags shall be new or thoroughly cleaned used bags, free from holes and finished at the top with either the selvedge edge of the material, binding or hem.

"It is of utmost importance that the minimum requirements stipulated be complied with in order to avoid delay and possible refusal by the warehouseman to accept your peanuts into loan program," Blackwell said.

Yury Stepanov, not good enough to make the Russian Olympic team last year, bettered the world record for the high jump with a leap of 7 feet, 1 inch, Moscow Radio reported last Saturday. The world mark of 7 feet, 1/2 inch was set by Olympic champion Charley Dumas of Los Angeles, who established the record during the U. S. Olympic trials on June 29, 1956.

Stepanov thus joins Dumas as the only men in track history to clear the high jumper's dream goal of 7 feet.

Another world record was set last Friday when Stanislav Jungwirth of Czechoslovakia ran 1,500 meters (called the "metric mile") in 3:38.1 minutes. The listed record of the world for the metric mile is 3:40.6 by Istvan Rozsavolgyi of Hungary.

(The following is from an article by Bill Corum in the July 17 issue of The Sporting News):

The Indians will leave Cleveland in 1958 and shift their franchise to Minneapolis. The Giants, who own the American Association franchise in Minneapolis, have given their consent to the switch.

Thus the American League face lifting continues. The St. Louis Browns moved to Baltimore and the Philadelphia Athletics shifted to Kansas City.

The decision of Cleveland and the permission of the Giants shuts the door on rumors that the Giants might possibly go to Minneapolis, instead of San Francisco as had been reported previously. The Giants are believed headed for the Coast with the Dodgers, who will move to Los Angeles, according to most reliable information.

If the New York clubs, the Giants and Dodgers, move to the West Coast, the National League will be changed considerably.

State Aid Possible For Invalids - Mentally Ill

Complete and permanent invalids or persons in the community so mentally deranged that they require continuous oversight to keep from harming themselves or others may soon be able to receive small monthly checks from their State Department of Public Welfare through the new state-federal program of aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled. The Constitutional Amendment, which was adopted by the voters in November, 1956, limiting the amount of money that can be appropriated for this program to 1.5 million dollars per year, makes aid possible only to those who are helpless and have no relatives able to support them.

Arla E. Hallford, Welfare Supervisor for this area, pointed out this is the only welfare program which requires consideration of the ability of relatives to support. This law defines "responsible relatives" as children, parents, step-children, step-parents, brothers and sisters. Hallford said that for the first time in nearly 20 years the Department's Field Workers will be required by law to determine the resources of relatives of persons who apply for aid.

The "permanency" and "totality" of the disability will be determined by a State Reviewing Physician after study of a complete physical or mental examination by the person's own physician. Complete helplessness from a medical standpoint, rather than inability to work, is the criterion. The state will pay the private physician for his examination.

Funds for assistance payments will not be available until September 1, 1957, but applications will be taken after July 15. While the helpless individual will not be able to leave home, the persons responsible for his care may come to the local welfare office and acquaint the Department with his situation. A Field Worker will then call, as soon as possible, at the home to take the application.

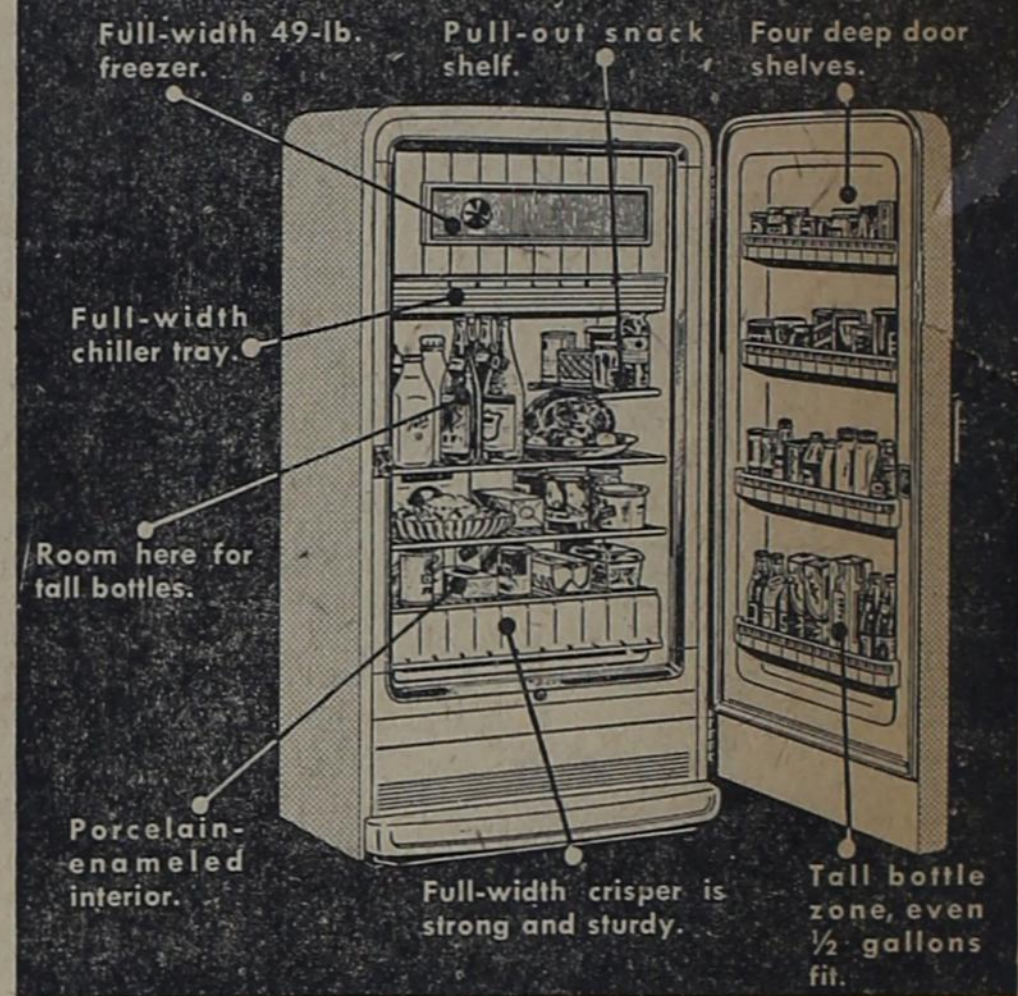

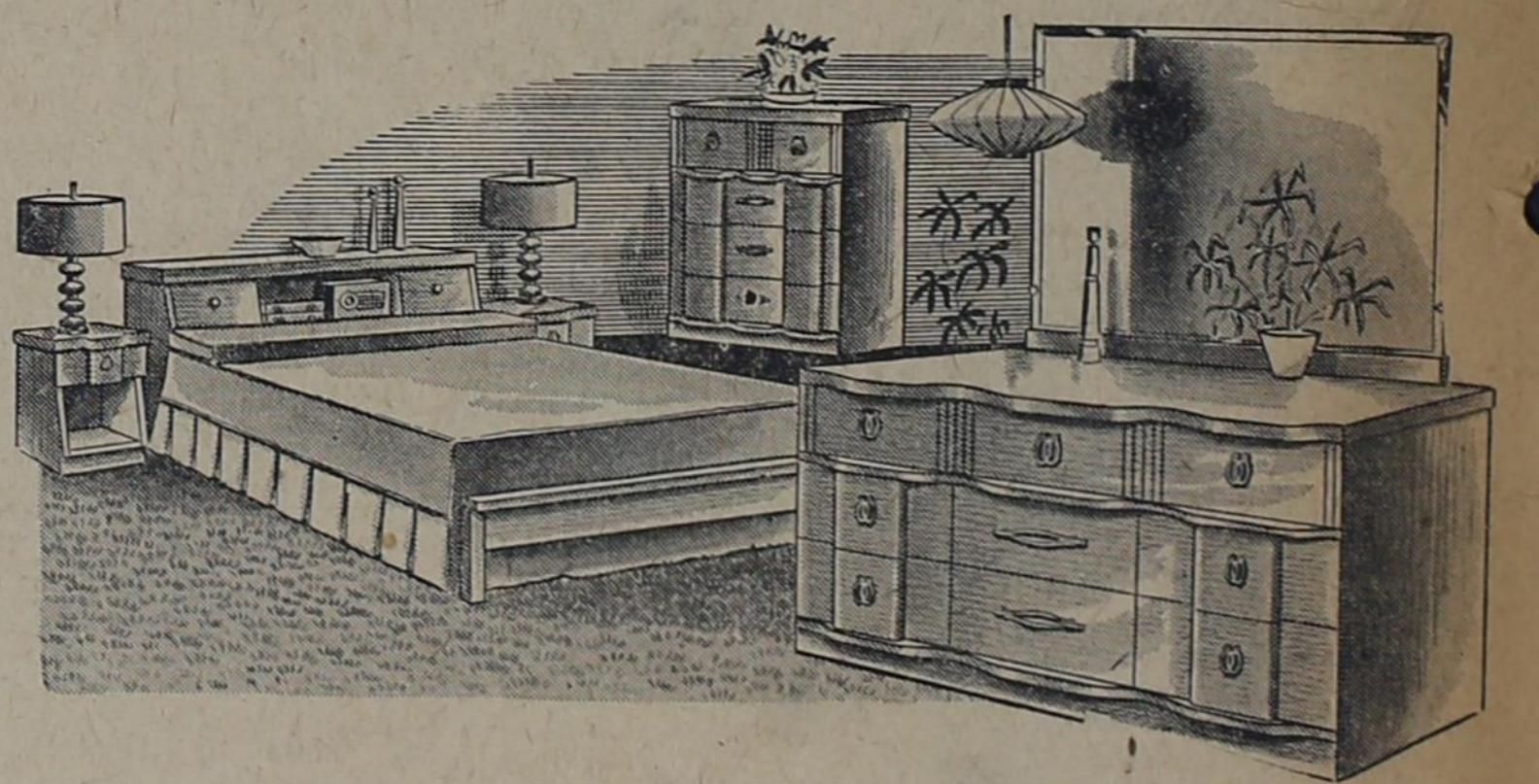
