John Henry Wheeler, 67, a resident of Gorman and this section for around forty years, died at the Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene on Friday night, August 23, 1957. In his final illness, John was sick for several weeks and no effort, on the part of his family, doctors, nurses, or friends, was spared in trying to prolong his life.

He was born December 1, 1890, in Yale County, Arkansas. In 1921 he and Velma Mae Moore of Eastland were united in marriage and four children came to bless this union. PEANUT ACTIVITIES DISCUSSED

Personnel of the Oils and Peanut Division, USDA, Washington, D. C., The Dallas CSS Commodity Office, the Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico ASC Offices, and the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association met in Dallas on August 27 and 28. The purpose of the meeting was to review the present structure of the peanut marketing quota and price support activities in an attempt to improve the overall program.

THE PEANUT PICTURE

Mr. J. E. Thigpen, Director, Oils and Peanut Division, Washington, D. C., presented a general overview of the peanut picture at present. Thigpen estimated a total 1957 production of some 795,000 tons. Of this amount about 150,000 tons will be surplus. This is somewhat greater than the 1956 production due largely to better crop prospects in the Southwest Area.

W. E. Jones, Chief, Commodity Programs Branch, Oils and Peanut Division, led a discussion on the 1957 Storage Program, the Warehouse Receiving and Storage Contract, and the Loan Agreement with the Cooperatives.

WAREHOUSEMAN'S OBLIGATION MORE RIGID

Warehousemen who store loan peanuts for SWPGA this year will be required to adhere to stricter handling and storage policies. For example, this year the warehousemen must sew the bags cut by the inspectors who grade the peanuts. Also, it is the sole responsibility of the warehouseman to determine the condition of bags which go into storage. Growers can strengthen the loan program by seeing that they market their peanuts in good bags.

Warehousemen are further required to spray loan peanuts up to a maximum of 27 times provided the peanuts remain in storage until loan maturity. The warehouseman is required to leave more aisle space this year so that better rodent and insect control can be achieved.

LOAN AND HANDLING AGREEMENT

The 1957 Loan Agreement has been signed and submitted to CCC by Southwestern Peanut

Growers' Association. The association's loan expense this year has been reduced from \$2.20 per ton to \$.70 per ton. This will substantially reduce operating capital of the Co-op and will lessen the chances of SWPGA members of receiving dividends. However, for the first time this year the savings which accrue from the \$9.00 deduction from the grower will be returned to the association.

INSPECTION SERVICES ACTIVITIES

Mr. Willard T. McNabb and Mr. Fain Ceaser, in charge of inspection in Texas and Oklahoma, respectively, told the group that inspection personnel had been instructed to use extreme caution this year when ripping bags for sampling purposes. Inspectors are instructed to make the opening no larger than is actually needed to obtain a representative sample. Inspectors agreed to work on Saturdays until noon if necessary.

ADMINISTRATION OF MARKETING QUOTAS

Mr. John Hoover of the Marketing Quota Division addressed the group and explained the procedure followed in allotting peanut acreage through the marketing quota setup. He told of plans now underway to ease the work load in County ASC Offices in order to do a better job for the producer.

OPERATION OF GROWER ASSOCIATIONS

Ross Wilson, local association manager, outlined the 1957 operation of SWPGA in making the loan to producers, relations with marketing type cooperatives, warehouse inspectors and contracting, and the Association's role in supervising the diversion of surplus peanuts.

The problem of interpreting program changes to growers was discussed at length. One very effective means of improving this service was pointed out. In the future the Association will maintain closer contact with all County ASC Offices in peanut producing areas so that the county office will be in a better position to inform growers relative to the peanut program. It was pointed out the SWPGA members now receive a monthly communication from the Association and are,

Panthers To Open Football Season At De Leon Friday Night - 8 P. M.

TOUCHDOWN CLUB ORGANIZED TO BOOST PANTHER TEAM

Thirty-eight Gorman men met last Friday night at the high school auditorium for the purpose of organizing a booster club to support the Panther football team. The name of "Touchdown Club" was suggested as a name

for the club. A movie of the Gorman-Eastland game played last year was shown, and members of this year's Panther team were introduced. Keith Gregory served as chairman.

Glynn Kirk, Ross Wilson, D. B. Warren, Oda Monroe, "Jug" Dennis, and Jerry Clark were placed on the membership committee to secure the membership of every man in Gorman if possible. Gene Rodgers was made treasurer of club. Any man desiring to join the club may contact any of these men on the membership committee.

Films of the preceding week's game will be shown at the high school auditorium every Monday night. Only members of the club will be allowed to see the movies. It will cost approximately \$55 to film each game, and membership dues will be used for this purpose. Dues are \$5 per member.

Twenty-four men signed up on Friday night and paid their dues, making a total of \$120 raised at the first meeting. By Wednesday morning 31 more members had been signed up, making a total of \$275 raised. This amount will film half of the games. Approximately \$550 will be needed to make movies of all ten games.

The Panthers are sharpening their claws for their first football game of the season with one of their oldest rivals, De Leon. Game time is 8 p. m. at Bearcat Field in De Leon.

According to the De Leon Free Press, the Bearcats have 11 returning lettermen but only 2 have more than one letter. Of the returning lettermen, five were regular starters last season.

The Bearcats are reported to have a good passing attack, but are weak in the middle of the line and have inexperienced linebackers on defense. Nevertheless, the Bearcats are always formidable opponents for the Panthers, mainly because De Leon is a Class AA team.

Twenty-five boys have been working hard for the past two weeks to make the Panther team. Some newcomers have been showing up well in practice, especially Gary Echols and Burl Warren, both seniors who have never played football before. Harold Hilley and Norman Woodall are two freshmen showing good promise.

Co-captains for this season are Bobby Standridge and Larry Grice, both seniors. Bobby, better known as "Chigger", is a guard and Larry is an end. Both have two letters.

Coach Roy Byrd said that he is not sure of his starting lineup for the De Leon game. A complete roster of the Panther team can be found on the football page.
