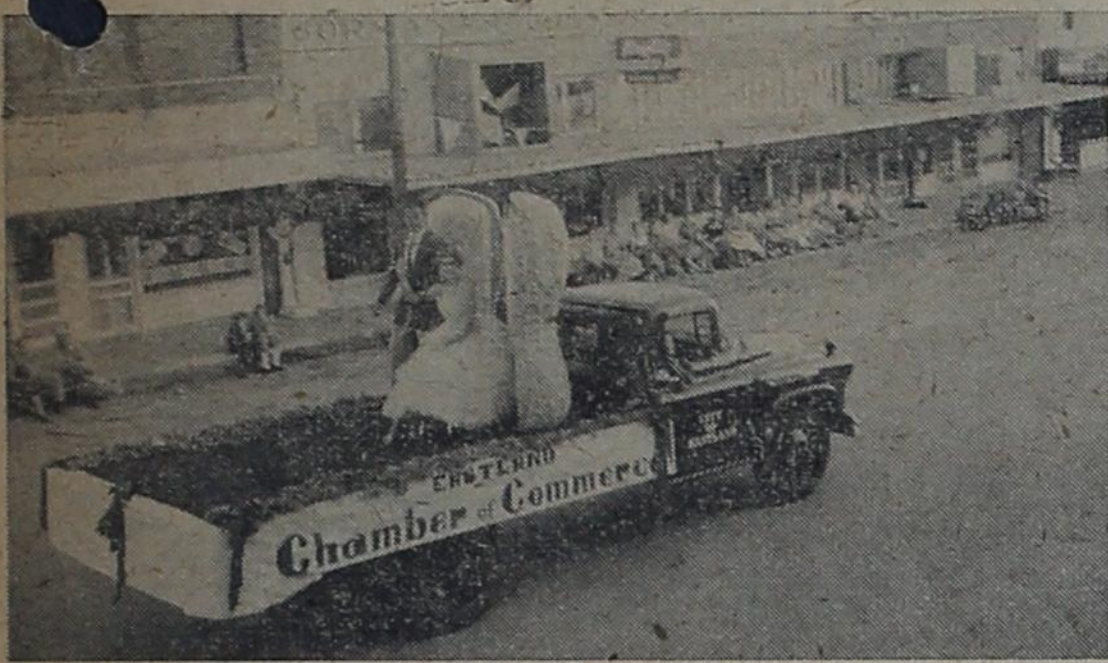

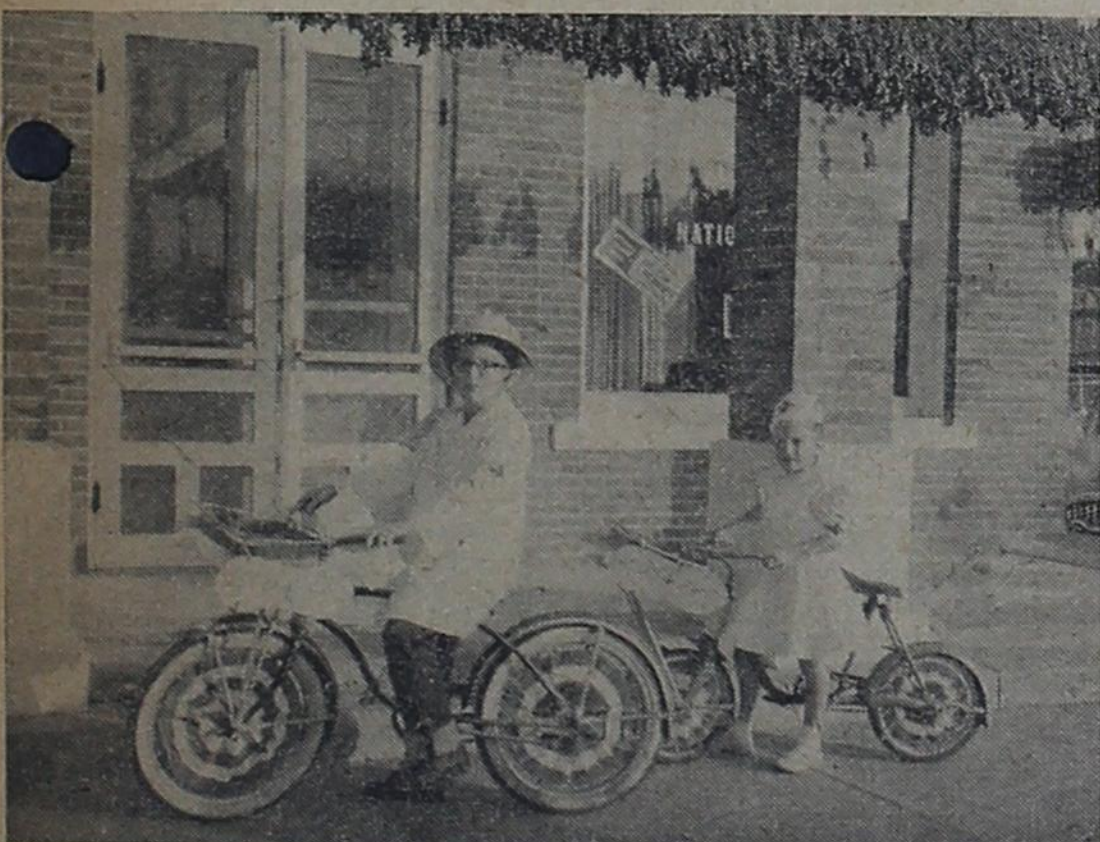

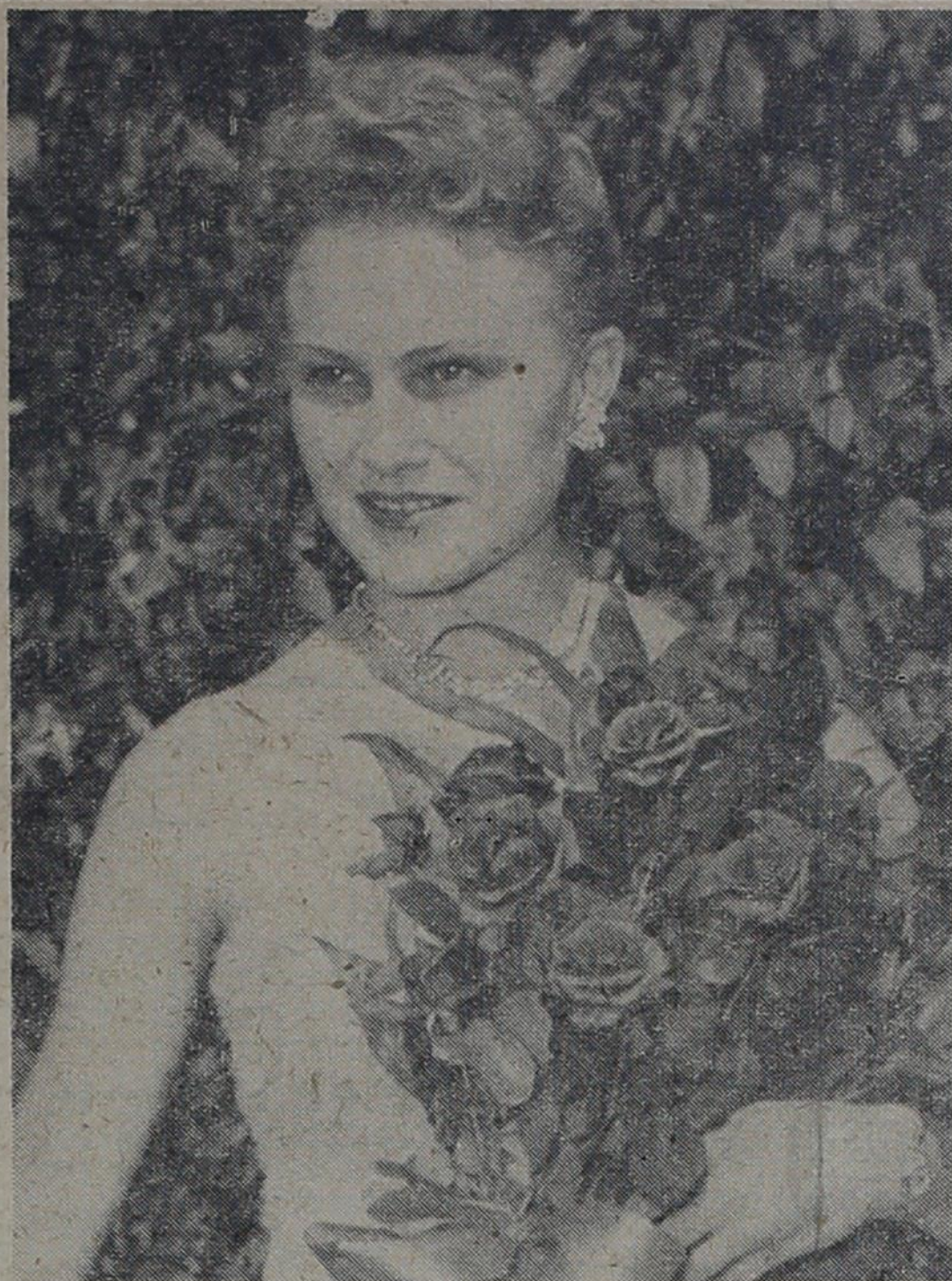

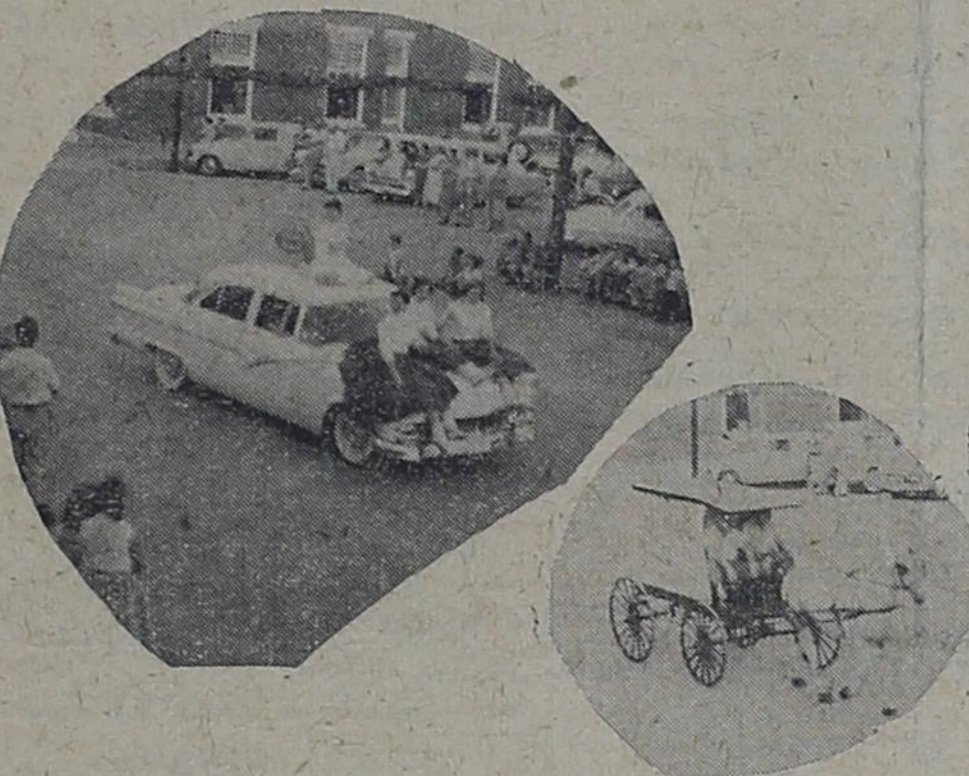
HULLS by Kernel Gene, aPe

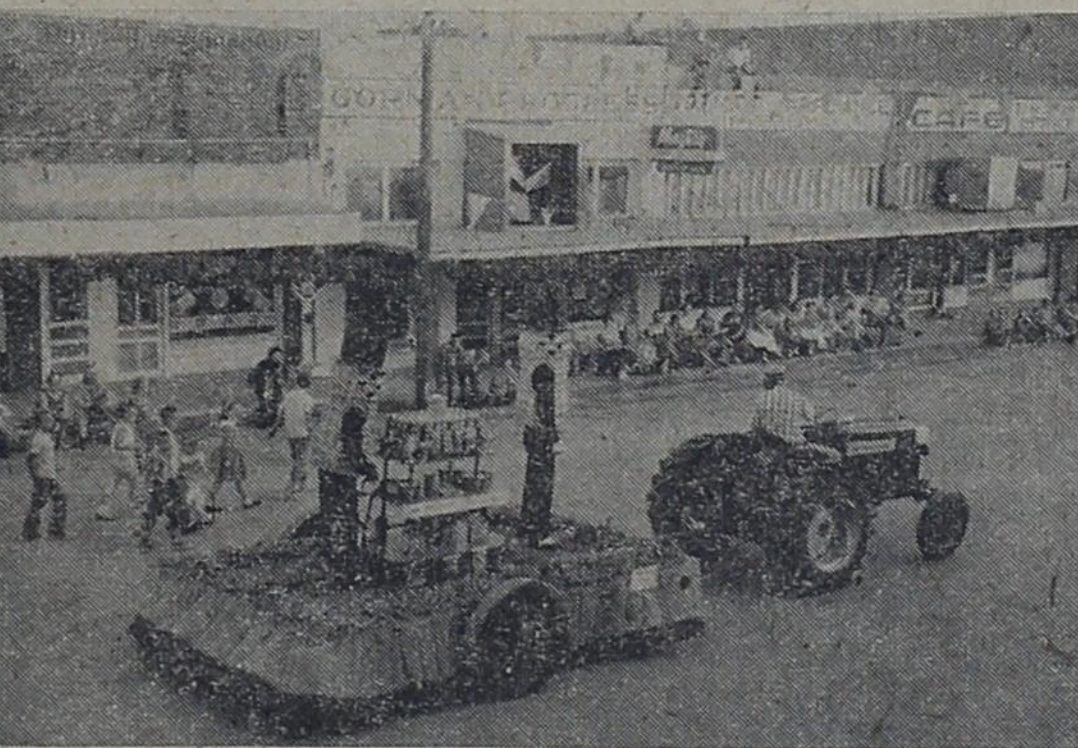

Panthers Smother Early 40-14; Meet Castleberry

Red Hot! That phrase could best describe the Gorman Panthers in the second quarter of their game with the Early Longhorns at Gorman last Friday night. The Panthers scored 33 points in that second period to ice the game away. After that the boys in Red and Blue coasted until the fourth quarter when they made their final 7 points.

The defensive line of the Panthers was a big factor in the game. Early made only 27 yards rushing against 211 for the Panthers in the first half. Heads-up defense by the Cats also led to five touchdowns for Gorman. Tackle Ed Rodgers blocked a punt on the Early 28-yard line to set up the first tally; tackle David Revels recovered a fumble on the Early 18 which led to the second score; and Co-Captain Bobby Standridge recovered a fumble on the Early 21-yard stripe to begin the fourth TD. All of this came in the second quarter. Another defensive play which started the third scoring march for Gorman was an interception of an Early pass by Jerry Warren on the Longhorn 25-yard line. The Cats moved 75 yards to paydirt after the interception.

A recovered fumble also set up Gorman's last TD. David Revels pounced on an Early bobble on the Longhorn 38-yard marker to begin the final scoring drive in the fourth period. So all but one touchdown for Gorman was set up by the Panther defense.

Gorman's last score in the first half came after Early gambled on 4th down and the Panthers took over the ball on the Longhorn 40. Eddie Gregg twisted through the middle 40 yards on the first play for the tally.

Gregg scored 4 touchdowns and made 190 yards rushing to lead the offense. His scoring runs covered 1, 5, 40, and 15 yards, and two runs of 52 and 20 yards sparked the third and fourth TD's. Full back John Brinegar kicked four of six extra point attempts, and scored one six-pointer on a 1-yard plunge. Halfback Neal Overstreet made the other counter on a 1-yard jaunt. Gregg made 190 yards on 22 scampers, Brinegar had 52 yards on 19 tries up the middle, and Overstreet totaled 43 yards on 12 trips.

Early fought the home-town boys on more even terms during the second half. Early gathered 70 yards rushing and Gorman made 86 yards. The Longhorns also completed two passes for 46 yards, so Early outgained Gorman in the second half. To begin the 2nd. half Early received the kick-off and moved 61 yards for their first score.

The second Early tally came in the third quarter when the Longhorns recovered a fumble on a kick-off on the Panther 26-yard line. A 19-yard pass covered most of the distance to the goal. That ended Early's scoring.

On Friday night the Panthers travel to Ft Worth for an encounter with a new high school, Castleberry, in that city. The Castleberry Lions are a Class AAA team, and should be very tough. Last week Castleberry defeated Van, 27-19, in their first game of the season. Van is small town about 90 miles east of Ft Worth, and is about the size of Gorman. So maybe the Panthers will have a chance.

HOW TO GET TO THE CASTLEBERRY STADIUM

Going into Ft Worth on Granbury Highway, turn left at sign that reads, "North Ft Worth", and go to Weatherford Traffic Circle. At traffic circle, turn on Hwy.
