## Saturday Is Homecoming Day For GHS

### Homecoming Game Puts Panthers Against Moran

As a climax to Homecoming Day at Gorman High School on Saturday, the Panthers will play their opening district game against the Moran Bulldogs. The scene of the grid battle will be Brogdon Field at 7:30 p. m. This will be the first district encounter for Gorman, since the first district game originally scheduled with Jim Ned last Friday night was postponed until Nov. 1 because of flu at Jim Ned.

Moran has already played one district tilt, which it lost to Baird 13-0. In non-district games this season, Moran has a record of 1

win and 4 losses. The Bulldogs won their first game of the season last week as they swamped the Cisco "B" team, 51-0, in their Homecoming game. Until then the Bulldogs had not scored a single touchdown, and all of their opponents had been Class B teams. Their losses, in order, were to Early, 26-0, Blanket, 26-0, Woodson, 20-0, Rule, 60-0, and Baird, 13-0. Their opponents have scored 145 points, while the Bulldogs scored their 51 points in the game last week.

Gorman and Moran have had one mutual opponent, Early. Gorman smothered Early, 40-14, and

Early banged Moran, 26-0. By that comparison, Gorman would be 52 points better than Moran. But comparisons of that type are far from predicting the actual outcome of a game, most of the time.

At halftime, the Homecoming Queen and the Football Sweetheart will be honored. Nominations for the Homecoming Queen will be made at the Business Meeting of the Ex-Students Association at 11 a. m. Voting for the Queen will take place at the business meeting or at the luncheon.

### Panthers Of '20-'21 Were Gorman's First Football Team

The Panthers of 1920 were football pioneers for Gorman High School. They were the first football team in the history of Gorman. Most of the boys had never even seen a football, much less played the game. The inexperienced team lost every game they played in 1920.

The boys must have learned a lot in that first season, however, for in 1921 only 2 teams defeated them. The Panthers won 7 games that season, and lost only to Breckenridge and Cisco. Teams on the schedule in '21 were Breckenridge, Hico, Eastland, Cisco, Dublin, Stephenville, De Leon, Rising Star, and Ranger. There

were 17 boys on the team, and their jerseys were red and white.

In '21, the Panthers had built up such a good record that mighty Breckenridge wanted to play them. Breckenridge payed Gorman \$250 to come to their city, but it cost about \$100 for the team in traveling expenses. The Panthers had played Dublin on Thursday, and had to play Breck on Saturday, so the boys just had one day of rest. But they were "men of iron" in those days, and the boys were rarin' to go.

The team started for Breckenridge early Friday morning, and it took all day to get there. There were no paved roads in those days, and the mud and dirt slowed the four cars to a crawl sometimes. Also cars were not as fast as they are now. But the boys finally got there and showed the big city boys that they were no "country hicks". The Panthers played the Buckaroos a close game, and Breck barely won, 13-0.

Football fields in those days were just cow pastures, and the tracks left by the cattle made running a treacherous business. There were many sand burrs in the field, and during "time outs" the boys would pick the burrs off. They would play and pick, play and pick.

The Panthers of '20-'21 were famed for their "Goober" formation, which was their own version of the modern Winged-T. It is surprising how near their invention was to the modern formation.

**Highlights and Sidelights**  
From Our State Capitol  
By Vern Sanford.

AUSTIN, Tex. - No member of the Legislature is saying there shouldn't be laws on lobby control, water conservation or the other items listed in Gov. Price Daniel's special session call.

But there are about as many ideas on how-to-do-it as there are members in both houses. Hence, for each law the road to passage probably will be littered with scores of amendments.

Contributing most to the discomfort and difficulties of the lawmakers is shortage of money. Robert Calvert, State Comptroller, bluntly predicts a \$6,000,000 deficit by the end of this biennium.

To meet costs of this session the legislature re-allocated funds appropriated for the regular session. Money to launch the new water planning program is to be gotten, a little here, a little there, from unused appropriations to other agencies.

But if this session, and the program the governor seeks from it, squeaks by financially, there's a rougher showdown ahead. That is whether to have another 30-day session for segregation laws.

If so, the state presumably would have to go into debt to pay for the session. For legislators, most of whom will be facing campaign opponents in a few months, this is a hard choice.

EAST TEXAS PUSH - Efforts of a bloc of do-or-die East Texas legislators to protect Texas' segregated schools overshadows the other lawmaking.

Governor Daniel promised the group that no federal troops will "occupy the campuses and halls of our schools as long as I am

governor." But the governor said he wasn't ready to say if or when he would submit segregation laws to the legislature.

This was too vague for Rep. Joe Pool of Dallas. He introduced a resolution demanding the governor announce immediately if he will allow introduction of segregation measures this session or call another session for that purpose. Nineteen other representatives cosigned with Pool.

Some half-dozen other measures designed to preserve local control of schools have been put forward.

LOBBY CONTROL - At least nine lobby registration proposals are before the legislature. No one bill pleases a majority of members.

Rival bills in the Senate are sponsored by Senators Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, Searcy Bracewell of Houston, Jimmy Phillips of Angleton, and Henry B. Gonzalez of San Antonio. Senator Martin's measure has been labeled the "administration bill." Senator Gonzalez's closely parallels the federal lobbying law.

At the first Senate committee hearing Senator Martin's proposal was attacked as allowing unlimited entertainment expenditures without a report so long as legislation was not mentioned at the time of the entertainment.

Sponsoring the House twin to Martin's bill are Representatives Zeke Zbramek of Daisetta, Dick Cory of Victoria, Max Smith of San Marcos and others. Introducing the four other lobby bills in the House were (1) Reps. Charles E. Hughes and Tony Koriath, both of Sherman, (2) Reps. Marshall O. Bell of San Antonio, Cecil Storey of Longview and Glenn H. Kothmann of San Antonio, (3) Rep. Louis Dugas of Orange, and (4) Rep. J. C. Day of Brookshire.

WHO GETS THE WATER? - This session's statewide water

planning measure is already caught in the same swift currents that have capsized many previous water measures.

Mostly, it boils down to a fear by each individual lawmaker that the overall plan might benefit one area by taking water from his area.

Governor Daniel asked the lawmakers to set up machinery under the State Water Board to draw up a statewide master plan for water. Measures to this effect were introduced in the House by Rep. W. N. Woolsey of Corpus Christi and in the Senate by Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas.

Sponsors have repeatedly reassured that the bill would not take away "any vested right of any water user in Texas." But Rep. W. A. Stroman of San Antonio objected to giving the Water Board planners "law-making powers."

Rep. Leroy Saul of Kress withdrew as House sponsor of the bill because he said he believed its passage would "lead to deficit financing."

STATE PRACTICE ACT - A closer watch and possible limitation of practice before state agencies is proposed in a House bill.

Sponsoring a bill to regulate representation before state agencies are Representatives L. DeWitt Hale, B. G. Forsyth of Corpus Christi and J. C. Day of Brookshire.

Their bill would require each agency to register those who appear before it. This bill also would bar lawmakers from such practice entirely, if the constitutional amendment raising their salaries to \$7,500 annually is passed.

This was one of the bills requested by the governor.

LAW ENFORCEMENT STUDY - Creation of a law enforcement commission, which failed in the regular session, is back in the legislative mills.

This time the proposal is for a

commission to study means of crime prevention and improvement of the penal code - but not to investigate specific violations.

Sponsors are Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria and Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe.

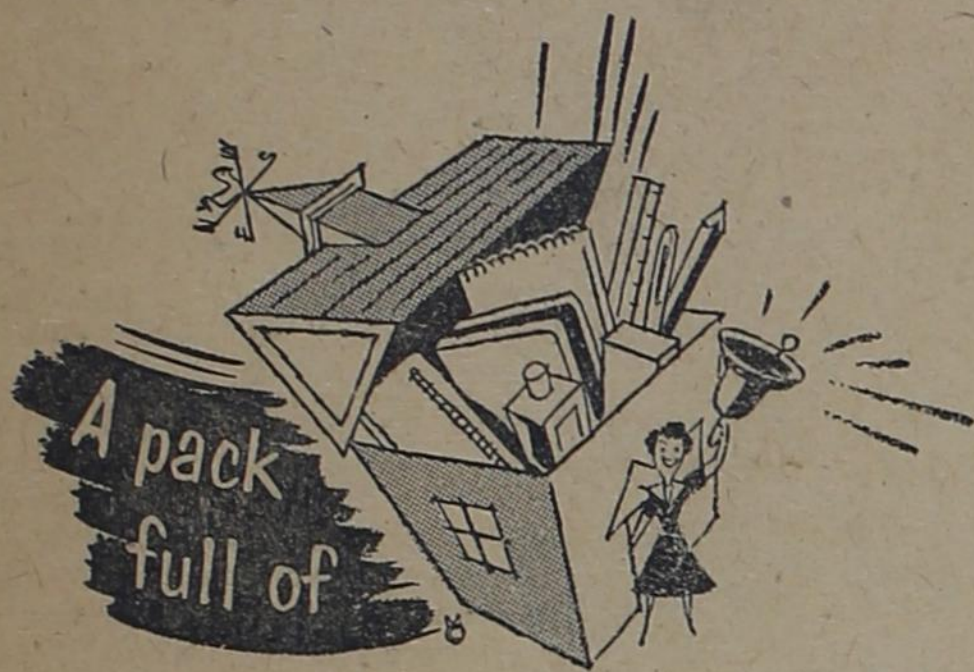
OIL IMPORTS HIT - Companies which import foreign crude oil could have their Texas production cut back under a proposed House bill.

Representatives John Lee of Kermit and Charles Ballman of Borger introduced the bill. It is "waiting in line" with others that cannot be considered until the governor opens up the session to additional topics.

It would give the Railroad Commission power to reduce the allowable production on wells owned by those who import oil. It is designed to help Texas producers who have been unable to find markets for their oil.

**STATEMENT BY SENATOR RALPH YARBOROUGH ON LAND DAMAGE FUNDS**

GIDDINGS, Oct. 24 — Twenty million dollars—were appropriated by Congress last August to help drouth and flood plagued farmers and ranchers, rebuild their land but Texans haven't received any of the money, Senator Ralph Yarbrough stated here tonight.

The Senator declared that Agriculture Secretary Ezra Benson has "fought the program all the way," and that thousands of eligible Texas farmers and ranchers have not been told of their rights under the plan.

Speaking at the annual barbecue of the Lee County Farm Bureau, Senator Yarbrough, who took the lead in getting the \$20 million appropriated, said the land damage funds are "critically needed".

"Some farmers are still being forced from their land and many others are unable to practice farming methods necessary to remedy erosion. This money is needed to help get the topsoil back on the land but Benson has

not even seen fit to let Texans' farm folk know about the program", Senator Yarbrough declared.

He added: "Every farmer and rancher whose topsoil washed away in the floods last spring or was blown away during the seven-year drouth is entitled to rebuild that soil from this fund.

"Farmers and ranchers through out the state, who suffered these hardships, should immediately contact their county agents for information on such grants. This appropriation dies June 30, 1958. If not used, the money lapses.

"Texas agriculture has been so hard hit that unless these grants are utilized, it will be many years before our farm and ranch economy can possibly come back to normal," he said.

The Senator quoted Texas Department of Agriculture figures showing that 1,971,489 acres of land were permanently damaged by spring and summer floods. In addition, 3 million acres of cropland and 300,000 acres of rangeland were permanently damaged by the extended drouth. The money was voted by Congress to restore this soil.

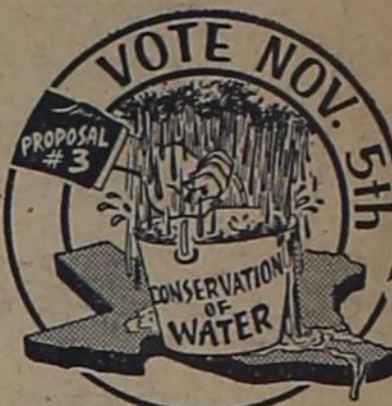

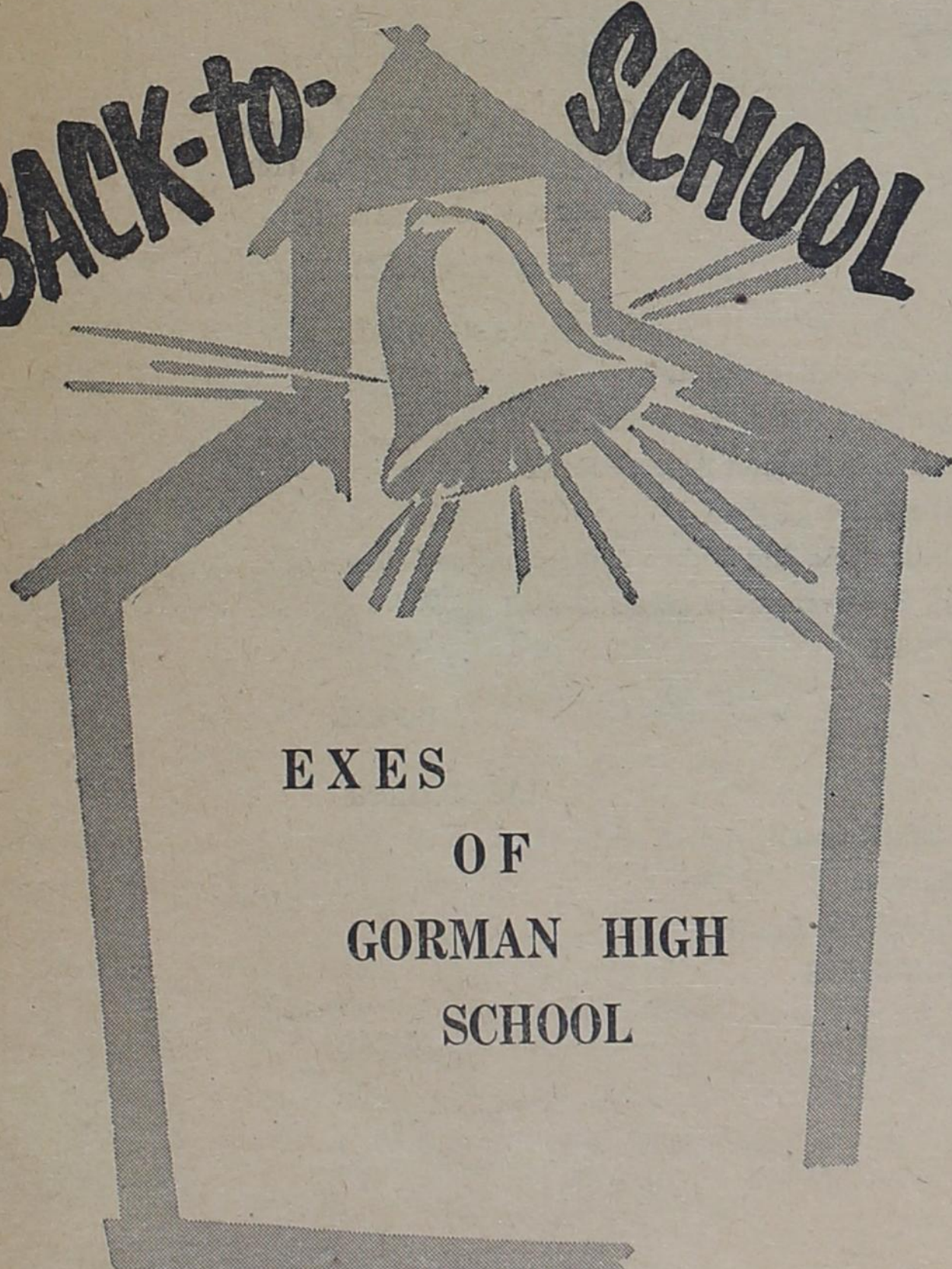

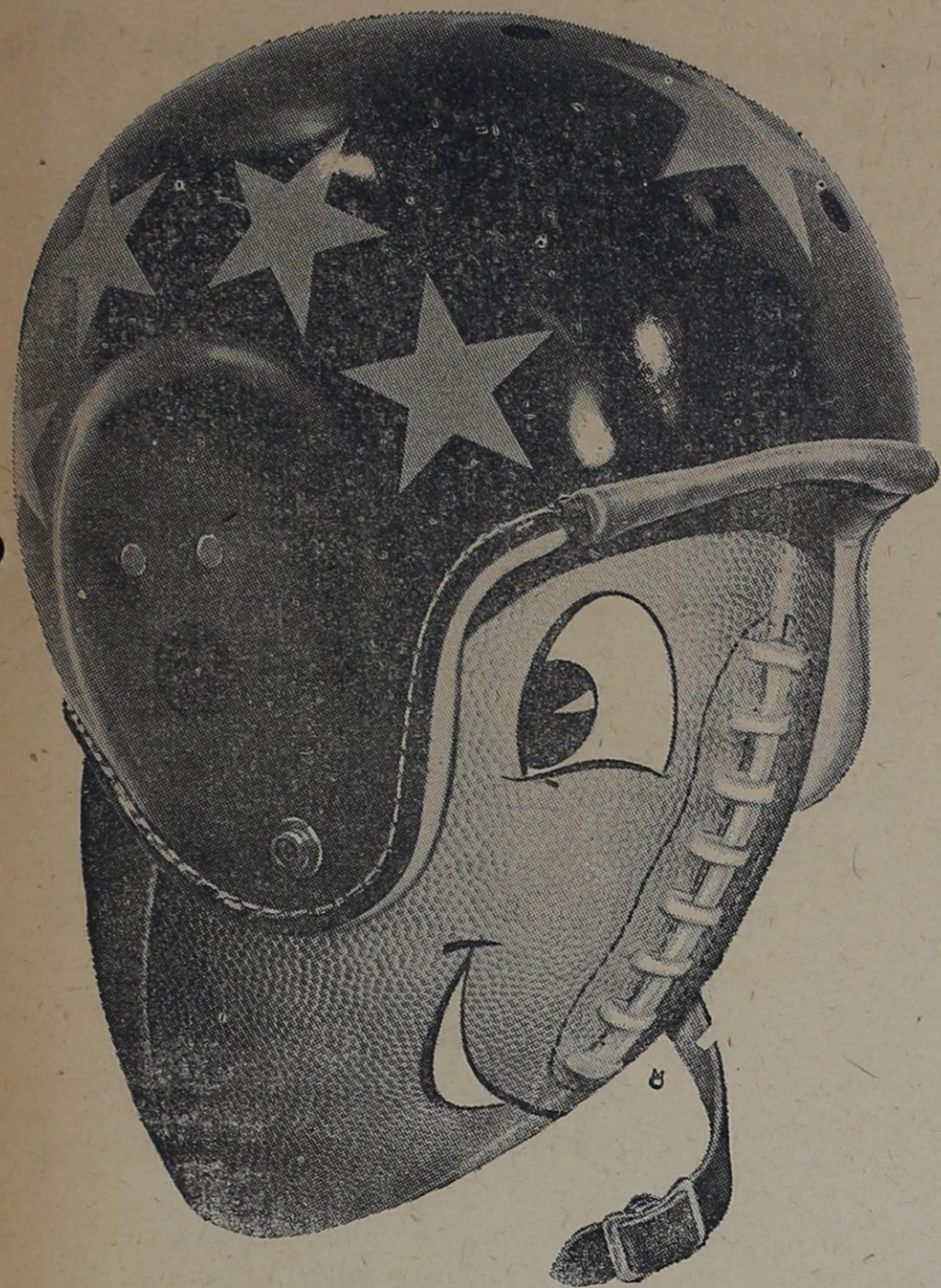

About 50 are expected to attend the conference of executives, scheduled Oct. 24-25. Meetings will be held in the fellowship room of the College church building.

**FAT STOCK SHOW SET FOR JAN. 24-FEB. 2 AT FT WORTH**

Cash awards totaling \$188,374 will be offered during the 1958 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth Jan. 24 through Feb. 2.

The seven breeds of beef breeding cattle are allotted a large share, \$45,180, of the premium total.

Prizes for the breeds are; Herefords, \$13,800; Polled Herefords, \$5,000; Shorthorns, \$6,000; Aberdeen-Angus, \$10,000; Brahmans, \$2,000; Santa Gertrudis, \$1,000, and Brangus, \$2,000.

There is also the bull carlot-and-pen division with \$5,380 in cash awards.

Premiums in the junior show total \$11,919, which includes \$3,761 for steers; \$2,880 for heifers; \$2,000, dairy calves; \$1,128, lambs, and \$2,150, swine.

Open show steers will compete for \$4,180; open dairy cattle, \$7,635; poultry, pigeons and rabbits, \$2,000; sheep, \$5,875, and swine, \$8,950. Awards in the judging contests amount to \$1,500.

Entry fees and horse show premiums probably will come to an estimated \$37,185. The Southwestern exposition horse show ranks among the foremost in the nation and, as in the past, will offer both show and Western type horses.

The open cutting horse contest will be presented at each of the 19 rodeo and horse show performances, as will the Ranch Girls barrel race.

The rest of the \$188,374 figure will be awarded to rodeo contestants. The rodeo contenders will be trying for an estimated \$63,950, which includes entry fees.

First performance of the rodeo and horse show will be Friday night, Jan. 24. Deadline for cattle, sheep and swine entries in the livestock judging is Dec. 15. Horses may be entered until Jan. 1. Premium lists and entry blanks may be obtained by writing the stock show at P. O. Box 150, Fort Worth 1, Texas.

Judging in the junior steer show at the 1958 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Ft Worth will be changed, show officials have announced.

Steers will be judged by age in the junior show just as in the open show. Previously, the junior show steers were judged by weight.

The age groups are:

Junior yearling steers, calved between Jan. 1 and April 30, 1956.

Summer yearling steers, calved between May 1 and Aug. 31, '56.

Senior steer calves, calved between Sept. 1 and Dec. 31, 1956.

Junior steer calves, calved after Jan. 1, 1957.

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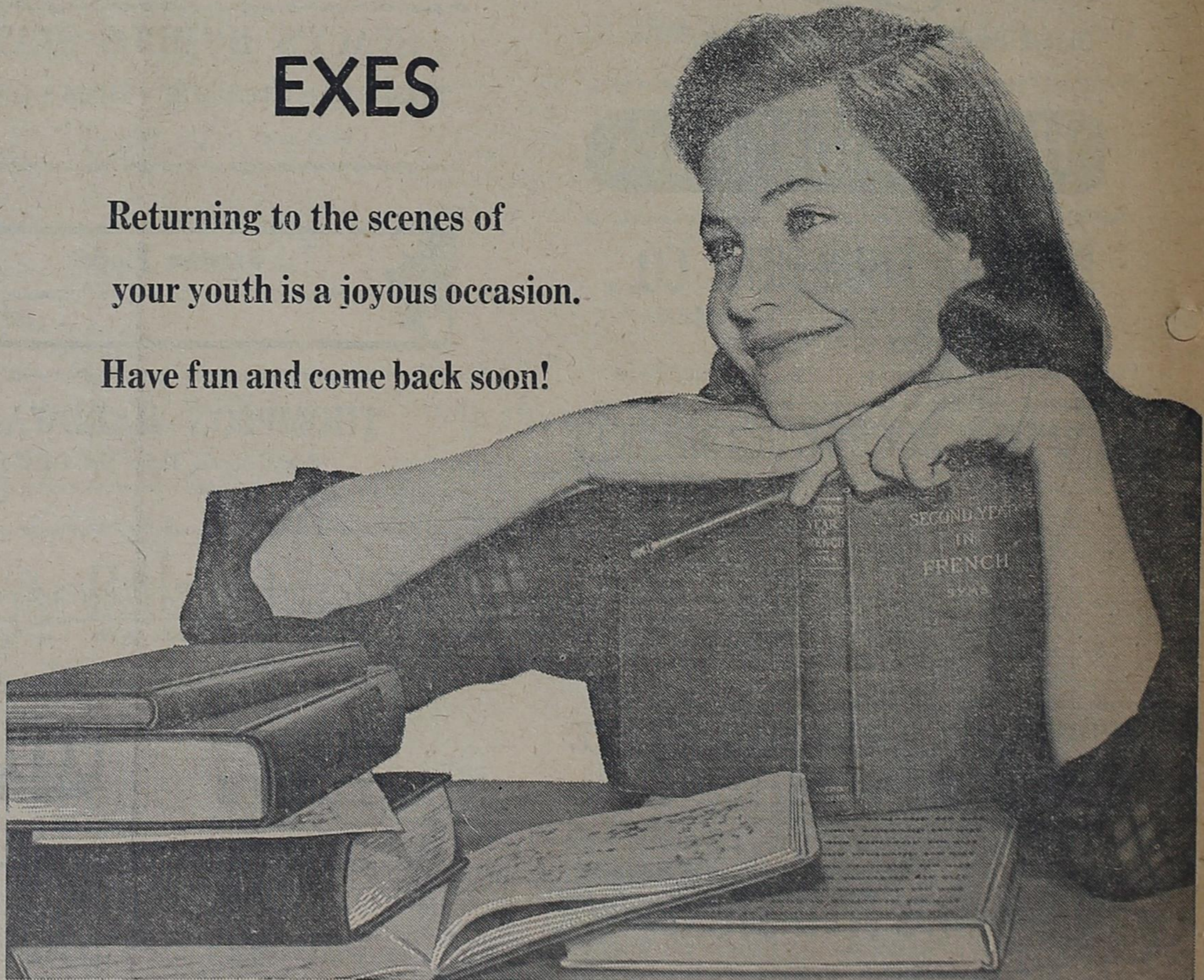

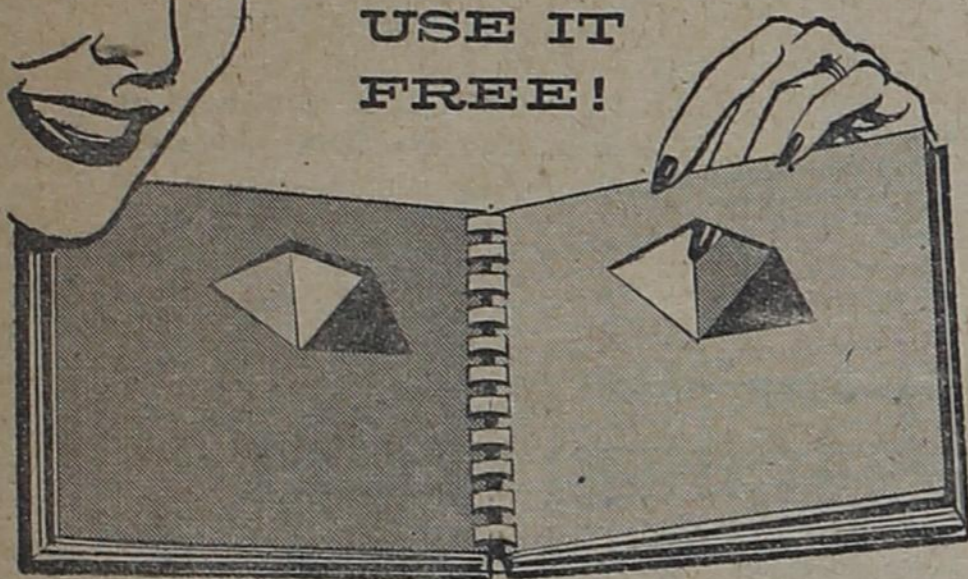
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
