
since they came a week ago. They have been visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Duke.



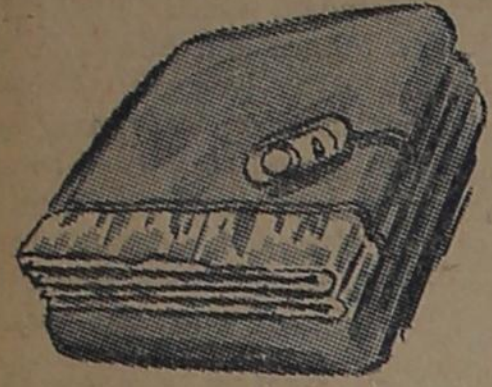

Gorman's overwhelming victory over Moran should prove to Fred Sanner, the wise scribe of the Abilene Reporter-News, that Gorman has a better team than Baird. The Bulldogs of Moran are the only mutual opponent for Gorman and Baird so far. Baird had a puny score of 13-0 against Moran, while the Panthers swamped the Bulldogs by 34 points. By comparing scores, that would make Gorman a 21-point favorite over Baird.

Baird claimed to have five backs out the night the Bears played Moran. But Panther reserves played almost the entire last half against Moran, and made one touchdown while allowing the Bulldogs none. So if Baird depends so much on its backs, its line must be rather weak. By

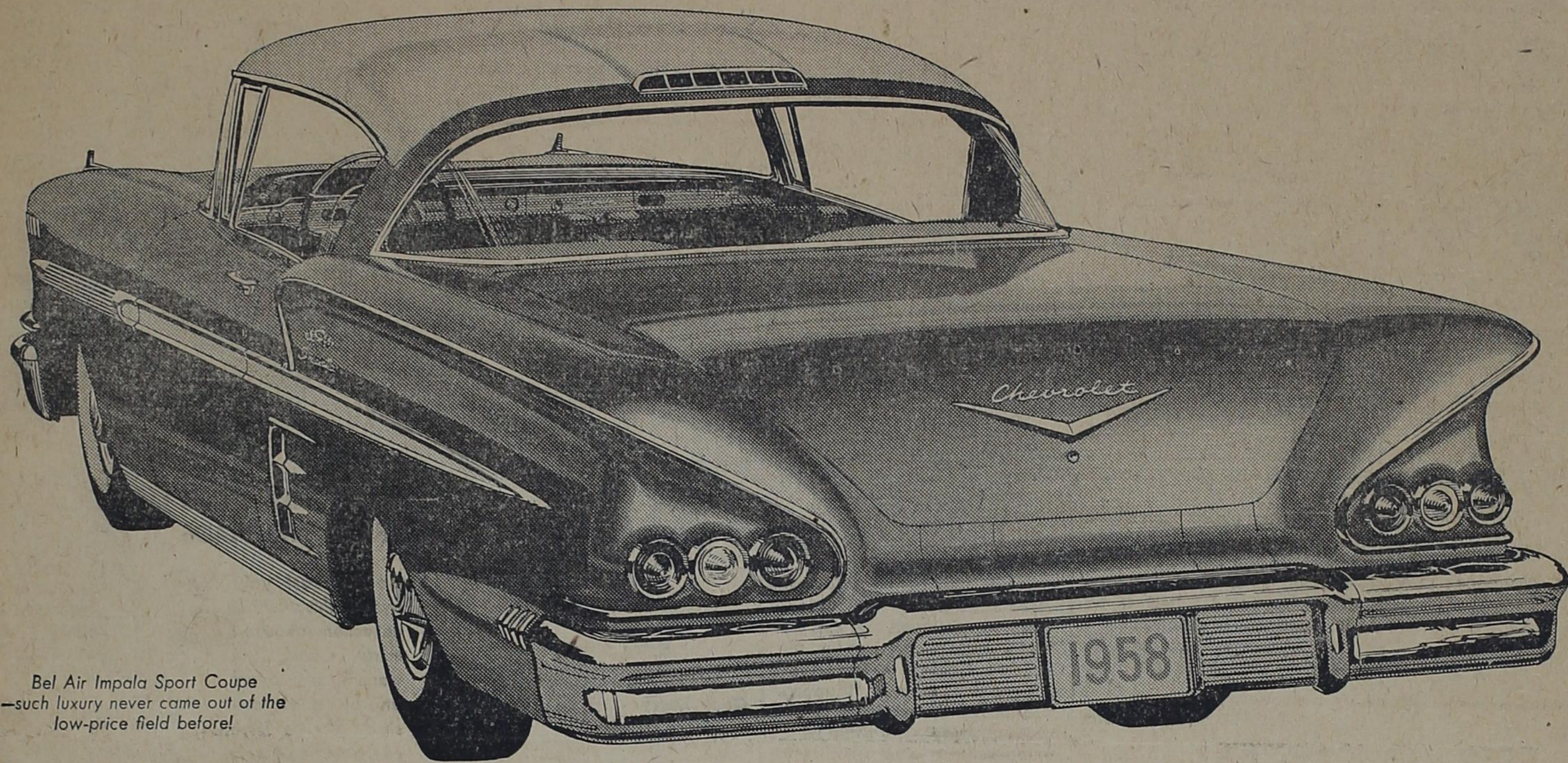

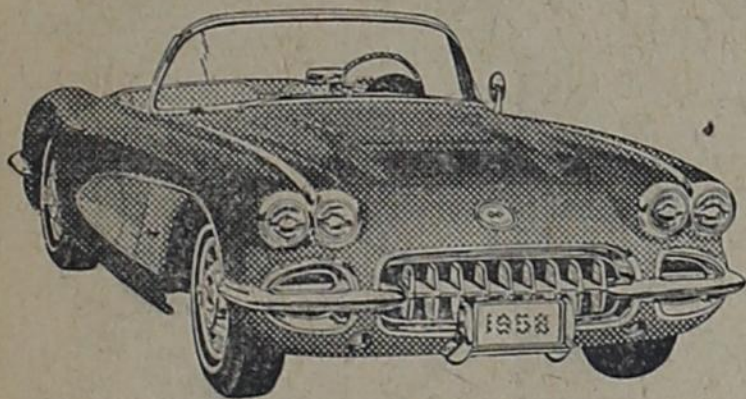

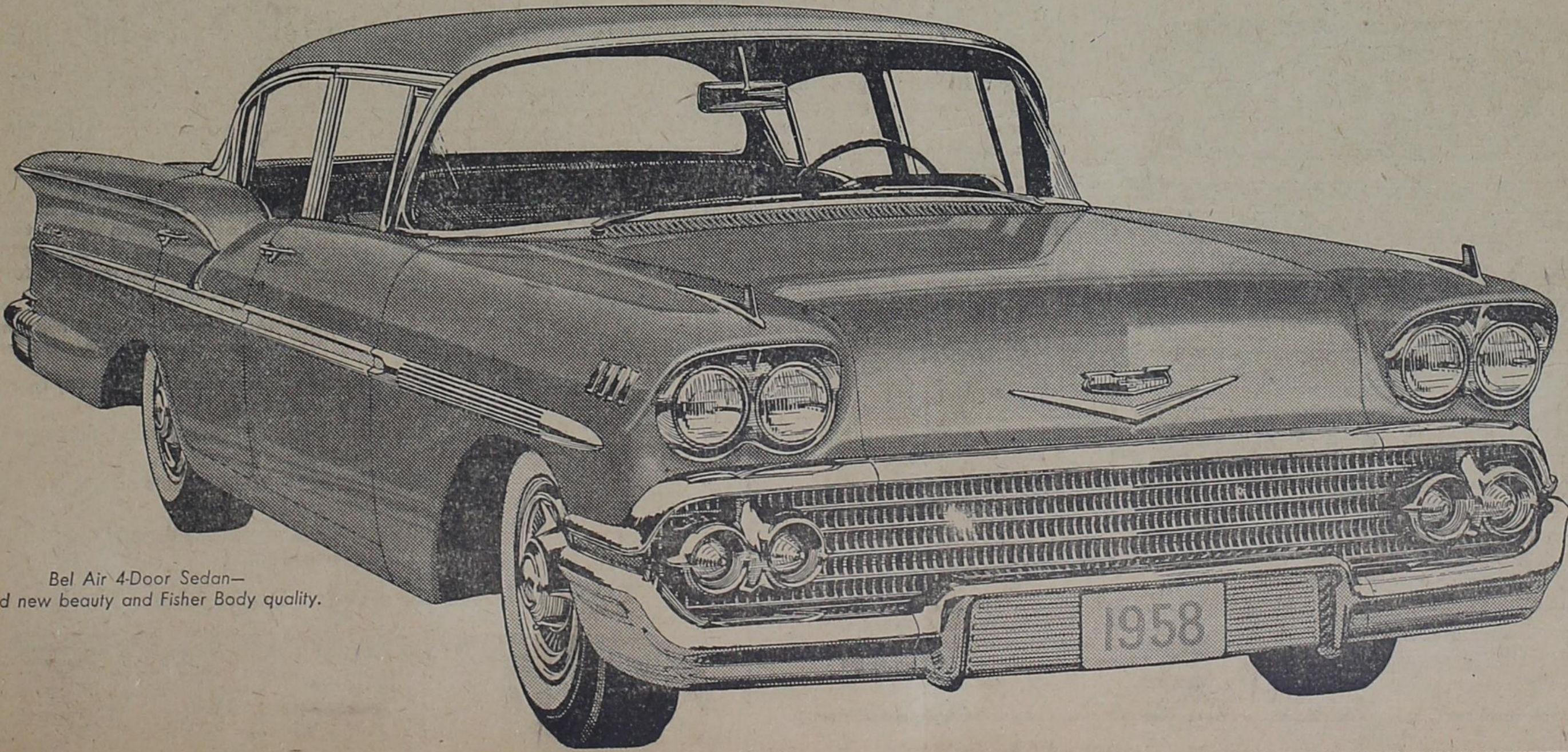

PROVENCE SAYS PUBLIC TIRED OF FLOODS; WILL VOTE FOR PROPOSAL NO. 3 ON NOVEMBER 5TH

Regardless of the kind of water legislation that comes out of the special session of the Texas legislature, the constitutional amendment (Proposal No. 3) to be voted on Nov. 5, must be adopted by the voters to make a state water program work.

So stated Harry Provence, editor of the Waco News-Tribune and chairman of the Governor's steering committee for the Water Development Amendment.

"This amendment was overwhelmingly approved by Texas Legislature last spring," Provence pointed out. "Its sole purpose is to provide a fund with which the State of Texas can help finance water development projects."

Provence explained that there are bound to be differences of opinion among Legislators as to the kind of water legislation that is needed. "There always are differences of opinion on any legislation," he emphasized. "But differences can and will be settled."

Recent rains, the Waco editor cited, again point up the necessity for adequate dams and reservoirs. And he added that the people of Texas are getting tired of losing millions of acre feet of water and suffering thousands of dollars in property damage, because of lack of water storage facilities.

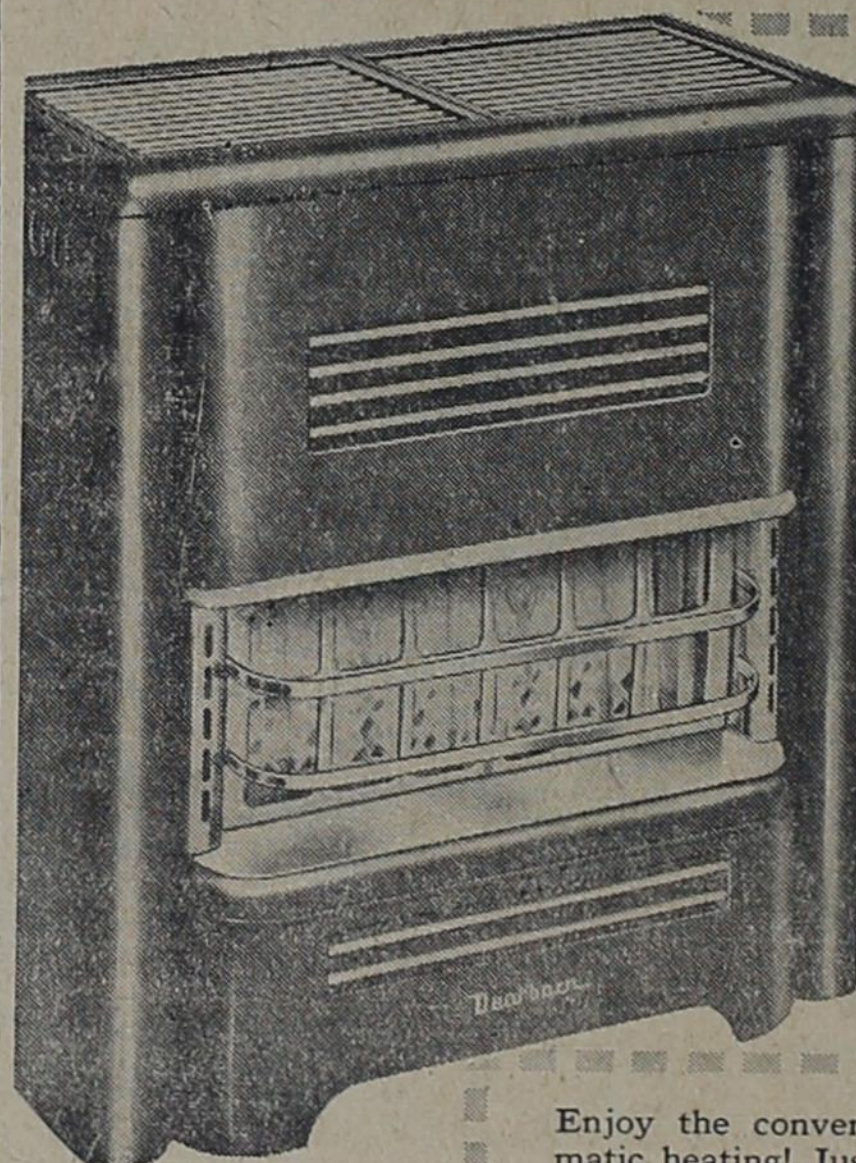
