

AN OPEN LETTER: To the people of Gorman and the Gorman trade territory

Greetings:

Due to questions that have been asked, as to whether the Gorman Gin will run next season, we wish to place the question squarely upon the People of Gorman and the Gorman trade territory.

Here is the situation:

Eastland County has only two Cotton Gins. One is in Ranger, and this one in Gorman. Only one ran in 1957, the Gorman Gin. We ginned around 300 bales of cotton in 1956 and thus far only 236 bales for the 1957-58 season. We know that the drought has had a great bearing on the previous years, but what is to come in the future?

We have the best prospects for a crop, weather wise, that we have had for many years, so what do you want to do about it? There has been quite a bit of talk about Soil Bank. Well, we do not get ANY returns from Soil Bank and the farmer only gets a percentage of what he would make if he grew cotton.


If the Gorman Gin runs another year, several thousands of dollars will have to be spent for repairs. If there is enough cotton produced to warrant the repairs, the complaints we have to take, and the fire hazards we suffer from children playing around the cotton; the repairs will be made and the gin will run. Otherwise, it will not run in 1958 and it is doubtful if it will run again.

So the question is left up to the people of Gorman and the farmers in the territory, whether they want to keep it or not.

I am a member of the Farm Bureau and would be more than willing to meet with the farmers, or anyone interested, at a Bureau meeting or elsewhere, if I am notified.
