

All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name

A baby girl is born to a Yankee carpenter

Oliver Holden put down his saw, beat out a few bars of a melody and picked up his hammer. The 21-year-old carpenter-musician had come to Charlestown from nearby Shirley, Massachusetts, to help rebuild the town after the British had burned it during the Revolution. Though he never had a lesson in music, Holden became famous for composing a welcoming song for George Washington when the general visited Boston in 1789.

One day after the singing carpenter failed to show up for work friends called to learn the reason. They found him at his organ. He had just become the father of a baby girl and he had a song in his heart . . . a song he was sounding out and putting on paper.

Came 1793, Charlestown had been rebuilt. Oliver Holden, at twenty-eight, was dealing in real estate, was a member of the legislature, owned a music store, built a Baptist Church at his own expense and was up to his neck edit-

Ye chosen seed of Israel's race, Ye ransomed from the fall, Hail Him who saves you by His grace, And crowns Him Lord of all.

ing material for his hymnal, "American Harmony." He had found some verses in the English periodical, "The Gospel Magazine," but the author had omitted his name.

England's Rev. Edward Perronet had preached and written hymns for the Wesley brothers while they were establishing the Methodist Church. But the fiery tempers of John Wesley and Perronet clashed over laws of the church and Wesley banned Perronet's hymns from Methodist song books. But Perronet kept on writing . . . under pen names and under no name at all. Oliver Holden didn't know all that. He just knew the anonymous words fit the tune he had written after his little daughter was born and the phrase "Crown Him Lord of All" suggested the title "Coronation." But, perhaps John Wesley wouldn't object because for a century and a half one of the favorite hymns of the Methodist Church, as well as of many another denomination, has been Edward Perronet's

Let every kindred, every tribe, On this terrestrial ball, To Him all majesty ascribe, And crown Him Lord of all.

O that with yonder sacred throng We at His feet may fall! We'll join the everlasting song, And crown Him Lord of all.

Clue No. 10, Prevention One area of cancer research involves producing a vaccine against the disease.


The first successes now have been recorded. It has proved possible to vaccinate mice against specific kinds of cancer — but, unfortunately, vaccina-tion against one kind does not protect the animals against many other kinds of cancer. Chicks also have been

vaccinated successfully against a form of leukemia which costs the poultry industry many millions of dollars each year. While these results are en-

couraging, they do not portend the end of the cancer problem in humans — at least, not at this time. Humans are susceptible to many kinds of cancer; and it is not possible to deter-mine against which cancers each individual should be vaccinated.

Nevertheless, a widespread search is under way for a vaccine which might apply to many or all human cancers. Help science help you! Send your contribution to the Amer-




