





BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-1, which shall read

"Subsection 51a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided for in Section 51s of Article III and on behalf of needy recipients of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided for in Section 51s of Article III and on behalf of needy recipients of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided for in Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas. 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

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



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Who determines the eligibility or applicants?

The county committee of the Farmers Home Administration must certify in writing that an applicant is eligible for a loan. farming conditions in their coun-Tenants and farm laborers are ty. This committee also certifies farm after the contemplated imthe farm and personally interviews the applicant before making its recommendations.

What are the loan terms and

The interest rate is 4 percent per year on the unpaid principal. Loans are scheduled for repayment within the shortest time consistent with the borrowers' ability to repay. In no case will the repayment period exceed 33 years. Each borrower is required to refinance the unpaid balance of the loan when able to obtain such refinancing at reasonable rates and terms from other lend-

What security is required?

Each loan will be adequately secured by a mortgage on the farm, subject to any existing prior lieins, and by such additional real estate security as the Farmers Home Administration deems necessary to reasonably protect the Government's interest.

Are there any limits on the kind of buildings that will be

Farm housinig loans are made to provide adequate dwellings and farm service buildings. Loans will not be made to provide buildings that are not needed for the actual operation of the farm or buildlings that would cost considerably more than adequate buildings on other farms in the community.

Are applicants expected to furnish building plans?

Applicants are expected to furnish detailed building plans. The Farmers Home Administration has a limited number of plans available that applicants may use if they choose to do so.

Are plans and construction reviewed and inspected?

Yes. The Farmers Home Admin istration reviews the plans and inspects the construction as it progresses in order to assist the borrower in obtaining construction that meets the generally accepted standards of soundness.

When can construction be start-

After the loan is closed. Construction work should not be started and debts for such work or materials should not be incurred before the loan is closed.

Does it cost anything to apply for a loan?

No. However, an applicant must pay for legal services necessary to make certain that he has a satisfactory title to the farm and for recording the mortgage.

Where does an applicant apply for a loan?

Application for a farm housing loan is made at the county Farmers Home Administration office serving the area in which the applicant owns, and evpects to im-

prove, his farm. If you are not able to locate the local office write to the Farmers Home Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D. C.
