



Wilson Guest, president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, is issuing a special invitation for growers to enter pecans in the show. The two-day affair will be held in the Joseph building on Main Street in Ranger.

A quart of pecans will constitute enough for an entry. People who live intowns are equally welcome to have entries in the show, the same as those in the
