ment plans, and a conglomeration of fringe benefits in an attempt to woo them into doing the job for which they are paid a salary to do in the first place. May I ask this question: Do you feel a keen responsibility towards your employer to do your job as honestly and efficiently as possible? If you are self-employed, do you feel a similar responsibility towards your customer?

This same lack of responsibility is evident in our homes. Why do we have juvenile delinquency today? Parents leave the responsibility of the rearing of their children to the public school teacher, or to the minister, or to the park director. Young people themselves are given few responsibilities of their own in the home. And if they are given responsibilities such as washing the dishes, mowing the lawn, carrying out the trash, they expect a handsome reward for their efforts. Thus they have nothing to do. They have time on their hands, time to kill — and some of them do, some of them do.

**AN INTERNAL PROBLEM**

The basic solution to our problem is an internal one. Unless we readjust our thinking, we cannot survive. But with a restoration of individual initiative, moral consciousness, and a sense of responsibility, we cannot fail. The great German poet von Goethe, who lived through a crisis of freedom also, said to his generation, "What you have inherited from your fathers, earn

**One Plus God**

Lesson for April 5, 1959

"ONE PLUS GOD" is a slogan that might fit many a strong life. It is not only the secret of such men as were the prophets of old, not only for Saint Paul and Saint Augustine and Martin Luther, and other famous persons admired by Christians. The reader should realize that this can be true of every one who puts his trust in God. The price of admission to the goodly company of the saints is not cheap, but it is in every one's reach: Faith.

**Loyalty**

This was true of the famous Old Testament hero named Samuel. He was what in football language is called a triple-threat man. He was a priest, prophet, judge, military advisor; and tradition even says he was a writer, though of course he did not live long enough to have written the books that bear his name in the Old Testament. (They do not claim to have been written by him.) Before his time there had been no kings, and indeed not very much unity among the tribes of Israel. Under his leadership the tribes were better united, and it would not be much exaggeration to say that Samuel "licked the tribes into shape"—the shape of a kingdom which he turned over to the first king-by-title, Saul. It is true that King Saul did not pay attention to Samuel's wisdom; but all the same, after the old prophet was dead, Saul thought so much of his advice that he actually tried to conjure him out of his grave just to hear him again.

What was the secret of Samuel's power over Israel? First of all it was a contagious loyalty to the one true God. It was a time when most men worshipped man gods. Even the Israelites did this. Samuel ran the risk of being looked at as a crank or a fanatic, but such was his known loyalty to God that when he challenged Israel to throw away their idols, they did. There must have been something in his life that made even those primitive men sure that one-plus-God means greatness.

**Prayer**

Another marked feature of Samuel's life was his prayers. We have on record the story of his very first prayer. It was not a begging request, not a "Gimme" prayer at all. It was "Speak, Lord; for thy servant heareth." Even as a boy he would rather hear what God has to say than to pour out words before God. How seldom it is that people in praying give God any chance to speak! The Lord seldom has much to say to a man who insists on talking every minute.

Another feature of Samuel's prayer life was that he prayed for others, even when those others had turned their backs on him. Samuel did his best to persuade the Israelites not to have a king. He knew that "power corrupts" and he predicted accurately the injustice and tyranny which their future kings would show. But they wanted a king all the same; yet in taking leave of them Samuel was not bitter. "Far be it from me that I should sin against the Lord by ceasing to pray for you," he said.

**Wisdom**

Samuel was an example of what we nowadays call a circuit judge. He held court in three cities, including his home town. (This alone is remarkable.) He was not (on the one hand) the kind of religious person who retires to a cell and there spends his life in prayer. He was a man of affairs, trusted by high and low. He was not (on the other hand) the kind of religious person who keeps his religion with his hymn-book—in church, where he takes it out and gets loud and happy over it once a week—only once. Samuel on the contrary was a man whose religious faith was the foundation of his wisdom. Religion did not lift him "out of this world;" it gave him insight into the problems of this world. His one-plus-God life was not for himself alone; God in life helped him to be a help to others. Perhaps one strong reason why there are not more persons who deserve that "One-plus-God" description, is that too many of us want to have God by the hand to serve ourselves rather than others.

**Better Mail Service For Local Patrons**

Sweeping improvements in mail transportation that will mean better mail service for Gorman and 313 other communities in the Dallas and Fort Worth metropolitan areas were announced today by Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield.

Discussing the program at a special meeting of postmasters in Dallas, George A. Gray, Regional Operations Director, said that two and one-half million people in the 45-county area would benefit by better mail service.

Barring occasional distribution errors and infrequent delays in transportation media, first class letters mailed at designated collection boxes or in the post office before 5:00 p. m. on a business day will be delivered on the first delivery at any office in the area on the following business day.

"During the test period which has just been concluded," Mr. Gray said, "results exceeded expectations. An estimated 2,100,000 first class letters are handled on an average business day by the post offices within these two metropolitan areas. Approximately 65 per cent of the mail originating in the area is destined for points within the area, and our test operations have been very gratifying."

"Mailing early in the day in order to give the post office time to sort and transport the mail to destination is now the best way a patron can assure delivery of his letter in this metropolitan area the next day," Mr. Gray said.

A fast-growing population is making the postal service pattern increasingly complex, the Regional Official said, pointing to the urgent need for adequate space and modern mail-handling equipment.

The revised mail service pattern is based on the establishment of new offices.

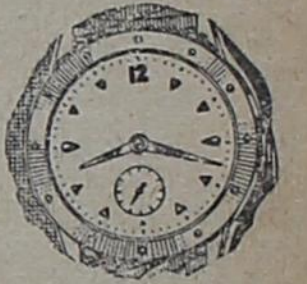

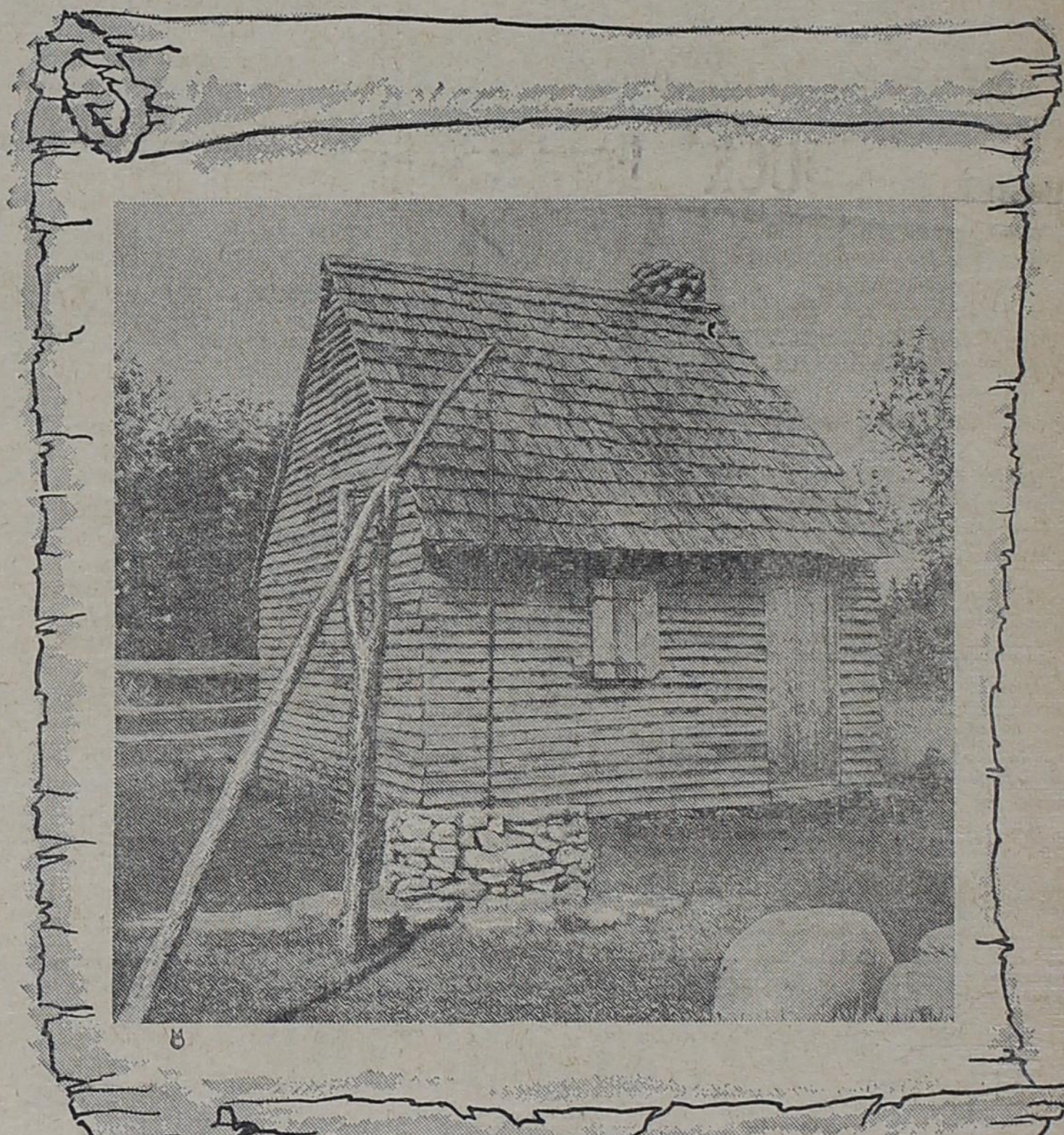

Mr. Gray said this improvement in letter mail service is the result of intensive study, and he credits the cooperation of dedicated postal employee in the 314 offices involved.

He explained that the next-day delivery depends on the conscientious attention of postal employees as well as the closely integrated time table which governs the area's postal units and the transportation linking them together.
