20 Years Later . . . SAME STATION - DIFFERENT WAGON



The setting is the same as 20 years ago but, otherwise, these pictures tell a graphic story of two decades of station wagon development. The photograph at top was taken at the Wyandotte, Mich., New York Central station in 1939 as Chevrolet introduced its first station wagon model-a unit featuring a body made of wood and steel. In contrast below is a 1959 all-steel Nomad with luggage rack, wraparound windows, folding seats, electrically operated tailgate window, dual headlights, etc. A further note on station wagon history . . . in 1939, less than seven out of every 1,000 cars built were station wagons. Today, about every sixth car is a wagon. Five of Chevrolet's 15 passenger car models are station wagons.
