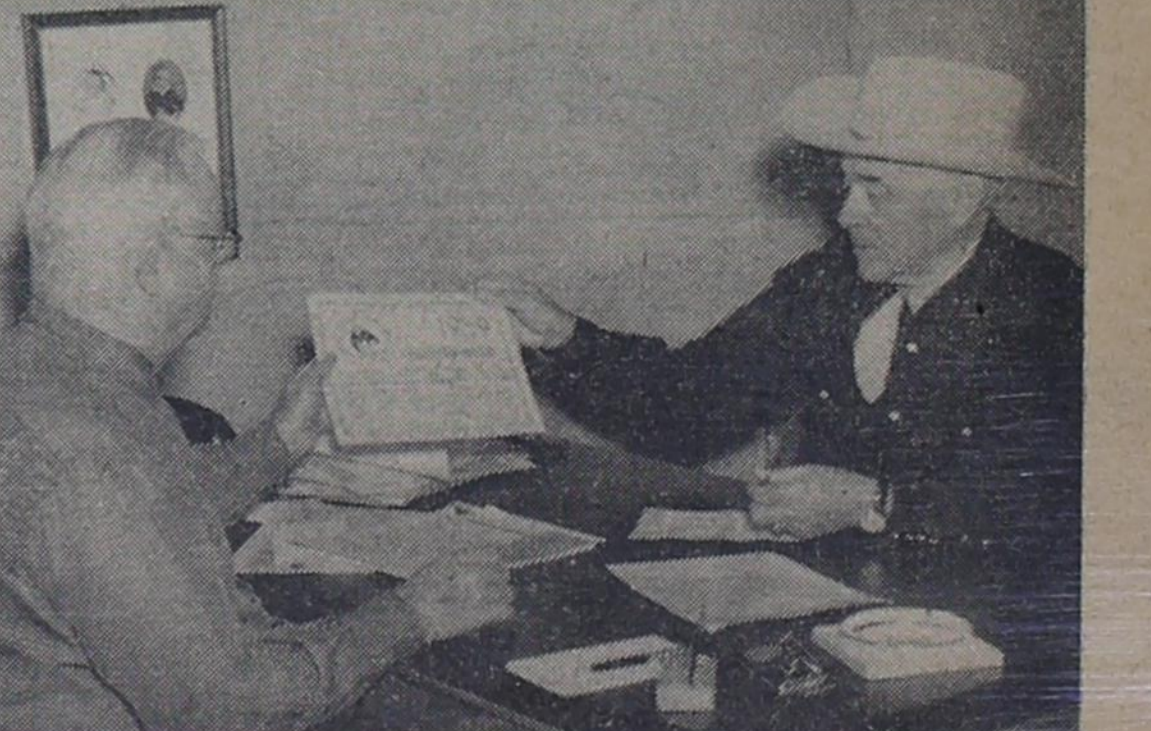
## National HD Week Set For May 4-9

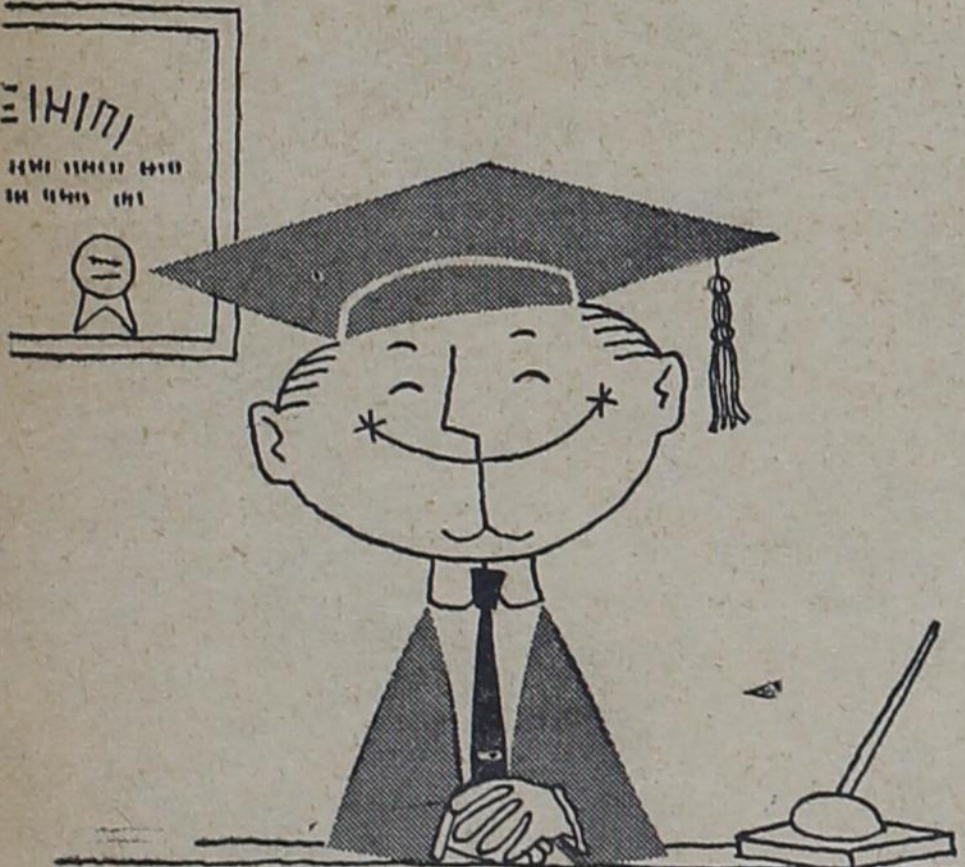

of Soil Stewardship Week. Dur-  
ing this period, May 3rd. to 10th.,  
inclusive, it is hoped that ap-  
propriate attention may be called  
to man's obligation in his use  
of God's gifts of soil, water, plants  
and wildlife.

"The Earth Is The Lord's" - -  
given to all men of all times as  
his greatest material gift, but  
only loaned to each generation.  
The persons who have access to  
created natural resources sin a-  
gainst God and man when they  
destroy those resources. Land  
ownership is, in God's sight,  
stewardship. It requires of the  
owner the continued improve-  
ment of his acres. It enables the  
possessor to develop the full  
human life for himself, his fam-  
ily and for security.

People who live in the city,  
though they may never see a  
harvest, have a direct interest in  
the soil from which they receive  
the many products they use. No  
one is far removed from the soil,  
its blessings and its demands,  
though he may dwell high in an  
apartment in a crowded city.  
Persons who own no land can be  
a strong influence in behalf of  
the prudent use of our soil and  
water. As good citizens they owe  
it to their community and to  
their nation to inform themselves  
and to support sound soil and  
water conservation efforts.

When the soil's precious re-  
sources once are destroyed, it  
takes a long time to return the  
soil to its useful state. It is much  
wiser to prevent this destruction,  
to conserve the land and build  
up its productivity for the future.  
In our generation we have seen  
the cost of neglect of soils, thou-  
sands of acres that once produced  
for family needs now lie ruined.

Your local S. C. D. supervisors  
have made Soil Stewardship ma-  
terials available to local ministers  
and churches desiring to observe  
Soil Stewardship Week. Similar  
materials have been furnished for  
the past several years and ex-  
cellent use has been made of it  
by many of the local churches.

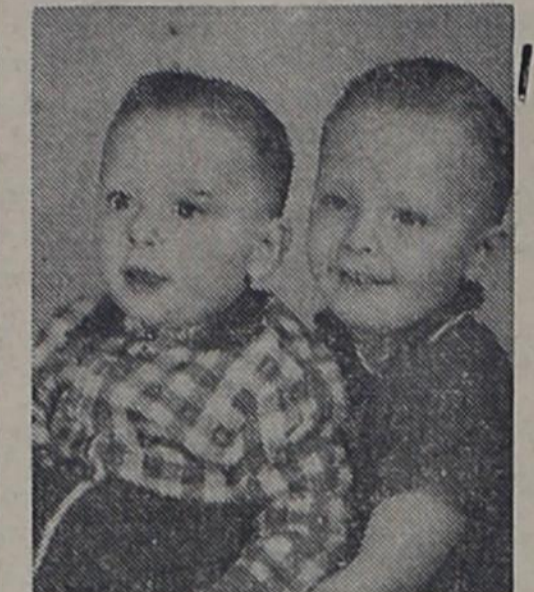
Sgt. Dupuy finished high school in Gorman in the class of 1956, before he volunteered for the Army in October of 1956.

The new causeway from Aransas Pass will not be completed before fall.

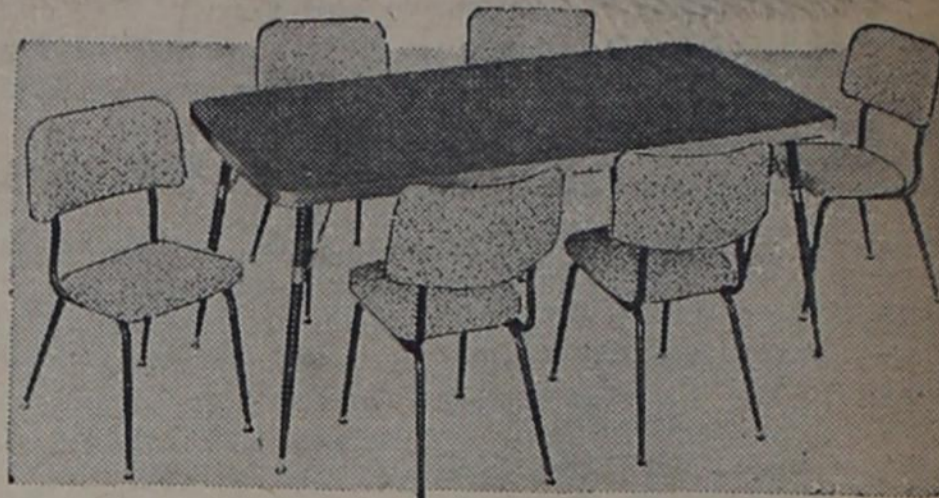

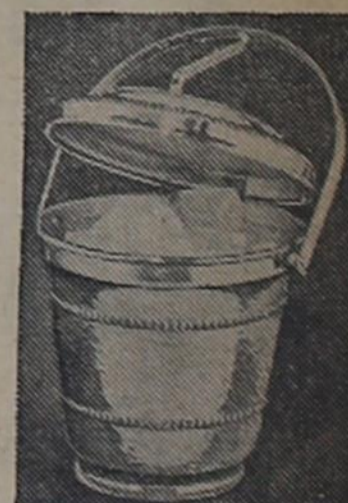
