

Bill, still in his teens, was employed in Comanche as a grocery clerk. Since 1918, however, he has operated his own grocery.



# Former Sipe Springs Citizen Heads Tarleton Health Center

Texas in a covered wagon to profession. Sipe Springs, a tiny community located between Dublin and Rising Star. The family had left Emory in Rains County and was heading west with the intention of reaching San Angelo and a climate which had been recommended for the fathers health. As the wagon movd into north central Texas the father's health worsened and the family stopped in Sipe Springs to visit with friends. They did not go on. In a few months the father had died and the young girl and her mother continued to live in the community.

Today, Mrs. Lillian Barekman, the woman who was that little girl, is head nurse and supervisor of the Student Health Center at Tarleton State College. From her early childhood Mrs. Barekman has been exposed to sickness and death. It may be that this was a strong factor in her decision to become a nurse. This fall at TSC, she begins her ninth year as nurse to approximately 1200 college students.

It may not be fair to describe Mrs. Barekman as a "pioneer woman" because this title usually creates a traditional picture in the mind of the reader. Mrs. Barekman is small, active, friendly, modern in her approach to medicine and strictly modern in her relationship to students. She
