



According to R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager of the Abilene Social Security district office, many such workers can now get social security disability benefits. More over, benefits can go back as far as August, 1958, if an application

to August 1958, a worker's social security disability payment was reduced by the amount of any other disability benefit he received under a State Workmen's Compensation program, or from another Federal agency. In a number of cases this meant that no social security disability paymany workers who would not have benefited by the "disability freeze" did not file a claim. These workers should check with their local social security office not later than August 31, 1959, Tuley
