

Many more millions-everybody else-could be threatened by radioactive fallout. But most of these could be saved."

Mr. Hoegh pointed out that the Federal shelter policy is based on the knowledge that most of those beyond the range of blast and heat will survive if they have adequate protection from fallout.

The OCDM booklet contains building plans for five basic fallout shelters. One is a do-ityourself project with solid concrete blocks. Cost of the shelters
