Panthers Lose To Hico; Host Cross Plains Friday

The Gorman Panthers lost a hard fought ball game to the Hico Tigers on Brogdon Field last Friday night. The Hico team had one of the best defensive ball clubs the Panthers have faced this year. They held Gorman to one first down, the first three quarters. However, the Panthers were slowed by injuries to key men; Neil Overstreet did not suit up for the game as a result of an injury from the Dublin game and Ken Welch, the regular quarterback, saw limited duty.

Joe Harrison, directing the Panthers most of the evening, did an outstanding job but the Red and Blue could never get a sustained drive going long enough to score against the Tigers. This is the third time this year Gorman has been shut out.

Not much improvement has been shown in Gorman's blocking and kicking, however, the defense showed marked improvement from last week.

Gorman will host the Cross Plains Buffaloes next Friday night at Brogdon Field. The Buffaloes are far below par this year and seems to be about equal to the Panthers which should make next Friday's ball game a good one.

COACH BYRD'S REPORT

The Gorman Panthers were out-manned by the Hico Tigers, 24-0 Friday night at Brogdon Field.

The first Tiger touchdown came late in the second quarter on a six-yard plunge by tailback Ronnie Bishop. Bishop passed to his right end for the extra points which made the score 8-0.

The Tigers second touchdown came at the beginning of the 3rd quarter on a 60 yard drive. The touchdown was scored by full-back Wash on a 4 yard slant over his left tackle. Wash also ran for the extra points making the score 16-0. Minutes later Hico recovered a fumble on the Gorman 25-yard line and drove for the last touchdown. The final 6 yards were made by Wash on a slant over his own left tackle. Wash scored the extra points making the final score 24-0.

defensive standouts for the Panthers were Ronnie Page, Gene Snider, Dick Townley, Joe Harrison, James Whitlock, and Phil Puckett.

Next Friday the Gorman Panthers will meet the Class A Cross Plains Buffaloes at Brogdon Field. Game time will be at 8 p. m.

Still on the injured list are Kenneth Welch who has been unable to play since the Early High ball game and Neil Overstreet, injured in the Dublin ball game. Jerry Anderson will probably see little service because of a chest injury early in the season. Because of the flu it is doubtful that Dick Townley, and Jerry Shugart will be able to play in this Friday night's contest.

Cubs Beat Glen Rose; Journey To Hamilton

The Gorman Grade School Cubs defeated Glen Rose Tuesday night at Gorman by a score of 30-16.

The Cubs struck for two quick touchdowns in the first quarter with Gary Overstreet hitting from 11 yards out and Don Wallace plunging one yard for the second after a pass from Overstreet to End Bobby Rodgers set it up. Overstreet added the two points.

The Cubs stayed close to the Glen Rose goal in the 3rd quarter but could not find the scoring punch until early in the last quarter when defensive end Rodger Woodall, playing his first game of the season because of illness, recovered a fumble for a touchdown after a jolting tackle by Jim Rodgers caused the ball to go free. Overstreet added the points and the last tally with halfback Jerry Ormsby scoring the final two points.

The Glen Rose crew scored all their points in the last quarter, one on a 60 yard jaunt.

The entire Cub squad saw action with everyone contributing to the win. Gary Overstreet and Don Wallace did most of the ball carrying with outstanding blocking by William Jay and ball handling of Terry Clark.

Linemen that were tough with their blocking and tackling were Ends Rodger Woodall, Larry Kirk and Bobby Rodgers; tackles Billy Welch, Jim Rodgers and Tommy Broom; guards Terry Joiner, David Kirk, David Harrison and Larry Newton, and center Richard Watson.

The reserve team that saw considerable action in the final quarter consisted of ends Ronnie Smith and Gregory Pennington; tackles Mike Rodgers and Mack Sutton; guards Harold McLearn and David Kirk, who played on both units; and center Robert Whit. In the backfield were Doyle Welch and Jerry Ormsby at halfbacks, Mike Foster at fullback with starters Terry Clark at quarterback on offense and William Jay at defensive halfback.

The Cub win, along with a De Leon victory, 20-0, over Stephenville and a Hamilton win over Comanche, leaves the district race in a 3-way tie between Gorman, De Leon and Hamilton.

The Cubs journey to Hamilton next Tuesday night in a game expected to be the toughest game remaining to be played by the Cubs. A win at Hamilton could push the Gorman team closer to at least a share of the district championship this season.

Game time at Hamilton will be 7:30 p. m.

Peanuts To Be Exhibited

Eastland County peanut farmers will again furnish 30 large bunches of peanuts for the general exhibit at the State Fair of Texas at Dallas, October 10-18 according to County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper who has been securing the peanuts with the vines attached from over the county.

Cooper said that the bunches have attracted a lot of attention at this office on the second floor of the courthouse in Eastland. They are cured out by turning them each day so that the vines will be "pea green" by the time they are taken to Dallas.

For the first time several of the bunches to be shown will be of the Argentina variety although most of them will still be of the Spanish variety Cooper said.

The peanuts were secured from the D. B. Warren and the Mitchell Campbell farms near Gorman; Herman Schaefer, Nimrod; Carl Stroebel, Nimrod; Conrad Schaefer, Romney and Oscar Schaefer of the Cobb Community.

The peanuts will not compete with other bunches at Dallas as they will be in the general exhibit.

Comanche County will furnish the peanuts that have been harvested off of the vines.

But the sun is shining and there is work to be done. So let roll up our sleeves and get it done.

Our Town has been made sad by the news that Higginbothams are going to close their Ladies and Men's Ready-to-Wear, the piece goods and shoe departments. It is going to hurt everyone as well as the town itself. I wish they would modernize a bit in those departments to display the merchandise to a better advantage. Then we would all be happier and I believe they would be greatly benefitted. What is your opinion? Of course, it is the people themselves who make or break. I have advocated "Trade with your Hometown Merchants" ever since I've been here. What if our other grocery stores were to close - would you like it if you had to get in your car and drive to a neighboring town because you forgot one or two items while you were helping to support an out of town merchant? It cost you money to go out of town. Others help you to live here, so why not pass it on and keep our town growing.

Here is a surprisingly quick and tasty recipe:

SURPRISE TURNS

Take one package of either plain or buttermilk biscuits and roll each biscuit into a thin 5-inch round on a lightly floured surface. Spoon one tablespoon filling (see below) onto center of each round. Fold dough over filling bringing edges together to form a semi-circle. Seal by pressing with the tines of a fork. Drop turnovers into 4-inch depth of hot fat, fry, turning once, 2 or 3 minutes, or until golden brown. Drain on paper towels. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

You may freeze these little pies. To reheat, place in a very hot oven until heated through.

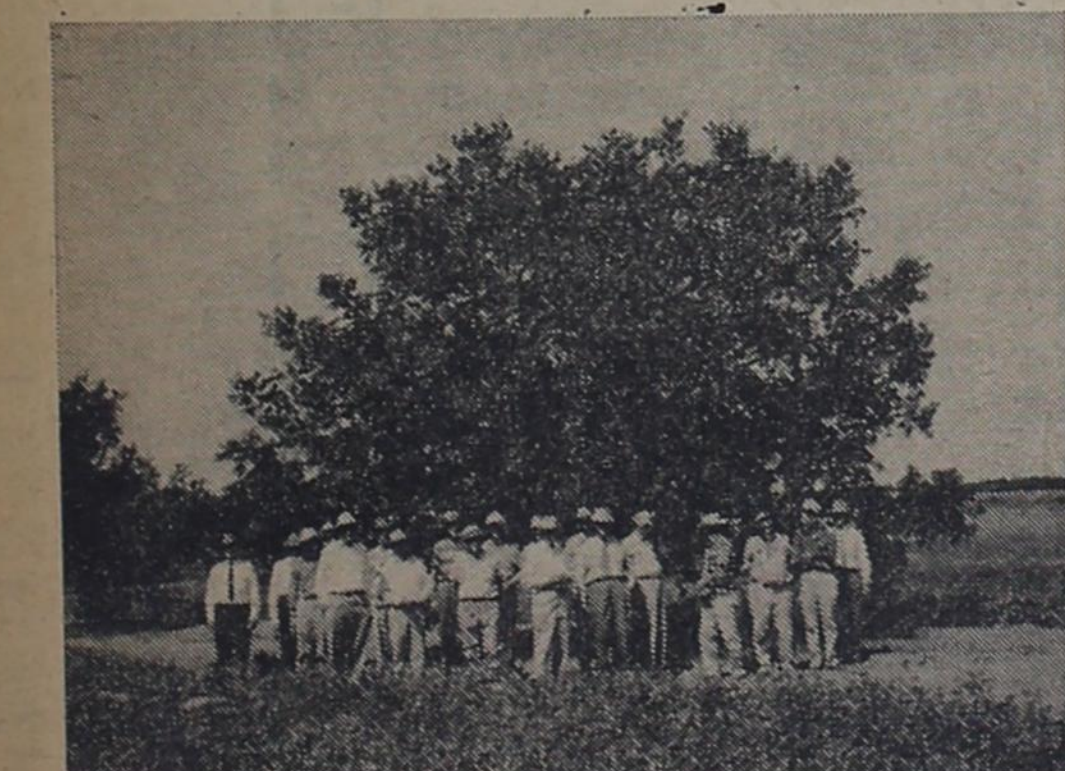
Airman Standridge is a graduate of Gorman High School. He also has attended Cisco Junior College in Cisco, Texas.

OCTOBER DESIGNATED FOR USDA SURVEY

This month the USDA, in cooperation with the Post Office Department, is conducting an annual acreage survey. Rural Mail Carriers are delivering 30,000 cards to Texas farmers and ranchers. The cards list questions on crop acreages and livestock. Carriers pick up the completed cards and forward them to Cary Palmer, Agricultural Statistician for Texas in Austin.

Mr. Palmer urges farmers to answer and return cards to Mail Carriers. "This survey," he points out, "serves as a basis for estimating the State's farm production. Every report helps to make accurate estimates."

This is the 17th nationwide census in which farmers and the U. S. Government have participated during the past 120 years. Information gained from this agriculture census will have a vital influence on future planning.
