



Special Stamp Honors Polio Volunteers



UNITED STATES POSTAGE

This is the new commemorative stamp, inspired by the coming victory over polio. "Those who helped" are the millions of volunteers of the March of Dimes, scientists, doctors and technicians.

March of Dimes volunteers here and throughout the country have been honored for the fight against polio in the issuance of a special three-cent stamp. The Post Office will place the stamp on sale throughout the country Wednesday, Jan. 16.

The stamp is a "long vertical" and shows a woman with a protective arm around a boy and girl. She also holds a shield with a medical emblem symbolizing the partnership between civilian volunteers and the medical and science professions in the battle against polio. The legend reads, "Honoring those who helped fight polio.'

4,000,000 Volunteers

This recognition by the U.S. Government points up the work of some 4,000,000 March of Dimes volunteers for the last 19 years in supplying financial aid to polio research and patient care. The crowning achievement of the program was the development of Salk vaccine.

However, as March of Dimes spokesmen warned, much remains to be done despite the protective power of the vaccine. There are 80,000 Americans disabled by polio who may still need treatment and rehabilitation. Thousands of trained personnel to administer care are

In addition, research must be continued to improve the vaccine and develop new treatment techniques for the disabled. These are the needs to be met out of proceeds of the 1,957 March of Dimes.







Teams of Experts Making New Gains in Care of Polio Victims

disabled than strengthening a weakened arm or leg or applying a brace. Experts in the treatment of patients who have suffered polio-the great crippler-long ago discovered that the job of human repair is about as complex as the disease itself.

Often it requires, in addition to the physician, the skills of the physical therapist, the specially trained nurse, the psychiatrist, and other specialists.

More recently, researchers supported by the March of Dimes have found that these experts can do more by working together as a team than the sum of their efforts by working sepa-

A 34-year-old California airline pilot, for instance, is cited by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis as one case of a polio victim whose "almost hopeless" plight was salvaged by such a team. The pilot lost the use of both his arms and his legs. In addition, he suffered a respiratory paralysis that reduced suffered a respiratory paralysis that reduced his vital breathing capacity to eight per cent of normal. Aggravating his condition, he contracted pneumonia, an inflammation of the air passages behind nose and throat, and a severe skin ailment.

Survey Team Formed

A medical and rehabilitation team was formed at the Rancho Los Amigos Respiratory Center, supported by March of Dimes funds in Hondo, Calif., to survey his condition and map out a plan of salvage. The physician in charge admitted, to begin with, that the patient presented "a discouraging picture as far as rehabilitation is concerned."

Despite this, the team of experts was so successful in treating the pilot that he was eventually able to return to his home and even to resume work again in a responsible ground position for his airline.

This new idea of "team approach" is described by Dr. Kenneth S. Landauer, director of Respiratory and Rehabilitation Center Services of the National Foundation. He calls it a treatment that involves "giving adequate care to the whole human being" of the polio victim. "Adequate care is a phrase whose meaning changes from day to day," says Dr. Landauer. "What is adequate care today is antiquated tomorrow. New techniques for the restitution of polio ravage are discovered and applied with startling speed."

To 'Finish the Job'

Care for "the whole human being," declares Dr. Landauer, means that every aspect of the handicapped polio patient's life must be investigated and readjusted. Included are his mental, emotional, social, economic and vocational capacities.

The "expert team" plan will be pushed in 1957 by the National Foundation's 15 respiratory and rehabilitation centers scattered

There is more to the care of the physically | throughout the country as part of its Patient Aid program. This program, together with its drive to wipe out polio by widespread inoculation with Salk vaccine, constitutes a main feature of the Foundation's 1957 "Let's Finish the Job" campaign.

Need Care For Years

Some 80,000 persons in the United States still suffer physical disability as the aftermath of polio attacks. Though the Salk vaccine, developed under the sponsorship of National Foundation funds, promises an eventual end to paralytic polio, less than half the susceptible population—under 40 years of age—has as yet been inoculated. More victims of polio will inevitably be added to the 80,000 before vaccination is universal.

In 1957 the March of Dimes will help meet these challenges with a \$4,000,000 expansion program at its respiratory and rehabilitation centers and by means of a \$5,000,000 special fund to start bringing the benefits of new team techniques to polio casualties.

One obstacle to the use of teams of experts, Dr. Landauer explains, is the shortage of trained personnel. "The March of Dimes has been making grants to 13 medical schools and institutions to recruit experts for this highly specialized profession," he says. "March of Dimes funds have already been awarded to 4,200 men and women as a part of the National Foundation's educational program. Last year \$2,800,000 was allotted to this program. The total sum contributed by the March of Dimes for rehabilitation teaining since 1938 is \$24,-900,000."

How Teams Work

This is the way the team experts work when a polio patient enters a March of Dimes rehabilitation center:

First, the medical director starts a comprehensive and individualized evaluation of the patient's condition. Called into action for this purpose are several different kinds of medical and mental specialists, as well as physical therapists, occupational therapists, social workers and vocational counselors.

Then, an overall plan of treatment and reeducation is formulated jointly by the whole team. The medical director remains in charge, but each team member is responsible for integrating his particular rehabilitation job into the overall scheme.

The National Foundation believes that this new team concept will prove to be as big a step forward in medical progress as the organization's sponsorship of the polio vaccine. The team plan, it points out, can be applied to other chronically incapacitated Americans, estimated at 28,000,000. Of these millions only a minute fraction has been benefited by the team approach. Thus the scientific advances made possible by the March of Dimes rehabilitation and education program hold out great promise of happier and more hopeful lives.
