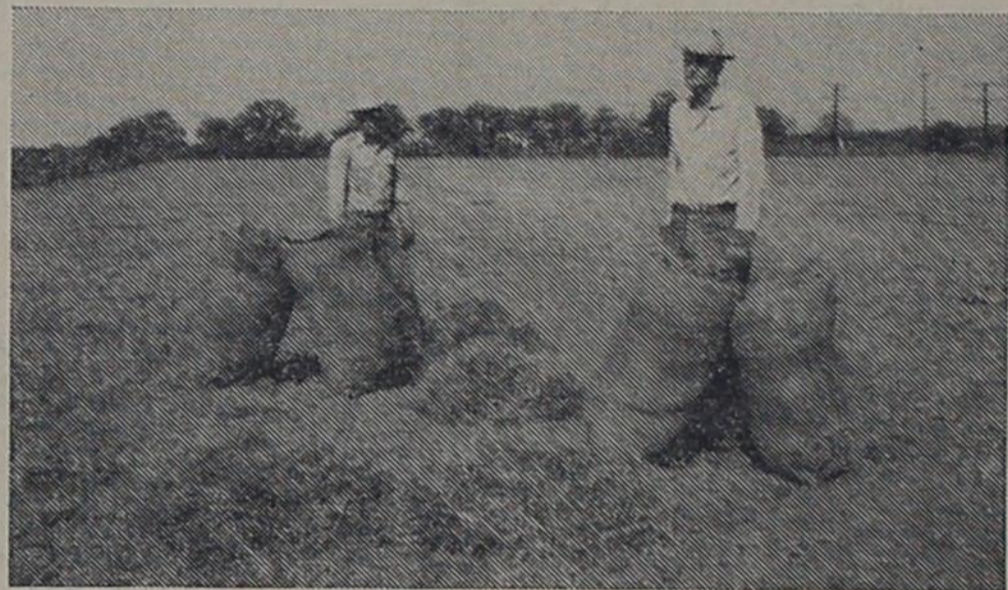

Coastal Bermuda Grass Good For Soil And Profit



This picture shows a strip of ground 36x175 feet which has already produced 2500 pounds of Coastal Bermuda Grass sprigs. James Ryan, left and Mr. Sam Powers, are shown sacking these sprigs.

Mr. Powers soddied his first Coastal Bermuda Grass in the spring of 1954; getting his sprigs from Tipton, Ga. and some certified sprigs from Iowa Park, Texas. He planted ten acres by hand and secured an excellent stand and growth. Mr. Powers said that the success of any planting depends on (1) A good deep plowed seed bed; (2) favorable moisture conditions; (3) fertilize with 200 pounds of balanced fertilizer, and (4) use good live sprigs which may run from 100 to 200 pounds per acre. The land sprigged at the heavier rate will cover over more quickly. In July, 1954, Mr. Powers was able to irrigate this 12 acres and stated that he secured considerably more grazing during the summer and fall months. The next year and each year since he has run approximately 65 head of cattle for 7 to 9 months each year.

In 1957 over 500 bales of hay were cut from 8 acres of this pasture. Mr. Powers says that Coastal Bermuda out-produces any grass if properly handled and is an excellent grass to control erosion, such as in waterways. Coastal Bermuda is a deep rooted grass that does produce seed and will stand rather heavy grazing. His sale of sprigs was more nearly accidental since his original planting was to find a high producing grass for livestock and conservation of water and soil.

Mr. Powers is now furnishing a large volume of sprigs to land owners within a 75 to 100 mile radius of his farm, north of Desdemona. He has 45 acres of Coastal Bermuda Grass growing and is planting another 17 acres soon. He has some 15 acres of dry land Coastal that is doing well.

Mr. Powers is rendering a fine service to farmers and ranchers in this area by having sprigs available for those interested in growing this grass.

LET'S TALK PEANUTS

By Thomas S. Cunningham
Oklahoma Extension Agronomist

An extra \$2563.00 on a 100 acre
peanut allotment is strong evi-
dence that the proper variety
does make a difference.

If you have been growing the
common Southwest Spanish pep-
nut, you might be well paid to
investigate the productive po-
tentials of improved and recom-
mended varieties.

Twenty-seven station years of
testing peanut varieties shows
that there is a difference in the
productive potential of improved
selections.

Dr. Ralph Matlock, of the O.
S. U. Agronomy Department, has
conducted tests at eleven loca-
tions in six counties over the past
five years.

Improved varieties are compar-
ed to the common variety grown
in each area. Results of these
tests conclusively show that pro-
fits can be increased by chang-
ing to improved selections.

Recommended varieties for
Oklahoma are Argentine, Dixie
Spanish and Spantex. Any one of
these is superior in yield poten-
tial to the locally grown common
spanish ranging from 104 percent
of local spanish for Spantex to
115 percent for Argentine.

The following table gives yield
of threshed nuts per acre and
percentage comparisons to the
local spanish, for 27 station years
of testing.

Variety	Yield per acre	% of Local
Local Spanish	1701	100%
Spantex	1777	104%
Dixie Spanish	1837	108%
Argentine	1971	115%

The importance of proper vari-
ety selection is magnified when
summer moisture is limited and
irrigation is not available.

Four years data from Caddo
County tests show that Argentine
is the best variety under both
dry land and irrigation, produc-
ing 923 pounds more under dry
land and 385 pounds more under
irrigation than local spanish.

All varieties tended to produce
more nearly the same under ir-
rigated conditions. The following
table shows yields of both dry
land and irrigated tests.

Variety	Yields - lbs. per acre
	Dry Land Irrigated
Argentine	2603 3144
Dixie Spanish	1847 3081
Spantex	1827 2970
Local Spanish	1680 2759

Total yield is not all of the
picture. The recommended vari-
eties have a slight advantage
over local spanish in the percent-
age of sound mature kernels
(SMK), and a decided advantage

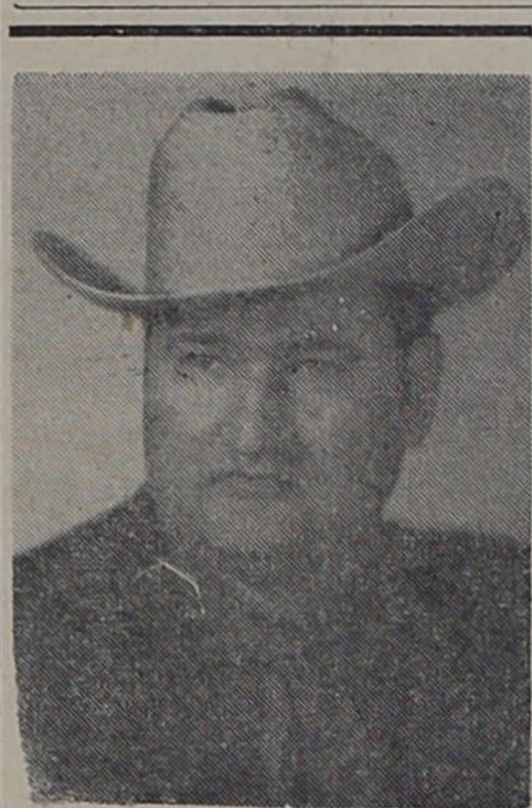

Using the 27 station years data,
Argentine outyielded the local
spanish by an average of 270
pounds of clean threshed nuts.
Thus \$25.63 per acre extra in-
come is available by selection of
the better variety.

HAM AND PEANUT BUTTER CANAPES

1/2 cup ground or 1 cup
chopped cooked ham
2 tablespoons chili sauce
1/2 cup smooth peanut butter
1/2 cup mayonnaise
Hot mustard
Sliced whole bread or party
rye.

If whole weath bread is used,
cut off crusts to make square
slices, then cut square diagonally

REPORT ON SWPGA SALES TO DATE

At the present date SWPGA has sold approximately 18,500 net tons of the approximate 32,200 net tons of farmers stock peanuts placed in loan storage during the 1959 marketing year.

Under the Association Loan and Handling Agreement executed annually with CCC the Association is given the right to redeem and sell all farmers stock peanuts which are placed under loan by producers. As has been previously stated, sales of this sort are made at a prescribed mark-up of 104% or 107%, depending upon the date of sale, and further upon such factors as the value of the peanuts involved and various set charges which are designed to cover necessary expenses. Income from such sales constitutes the principal source

of the Association's earnings.

If the total earnings for the year are substantial, the Association by virtue of its By-Laws and its agreement with CCC, will pay to the participating grower members dividends in proportion to their participation in the storage program. Dividends were last paid by the Association in 1957 based on the 1955 crop operation.

After all possible sales have been made, final settlements affected, and auditing completed, it will be determined as to whether or not dividends can be paid from this year's operations. More information in this regard will be furnished later in the year.

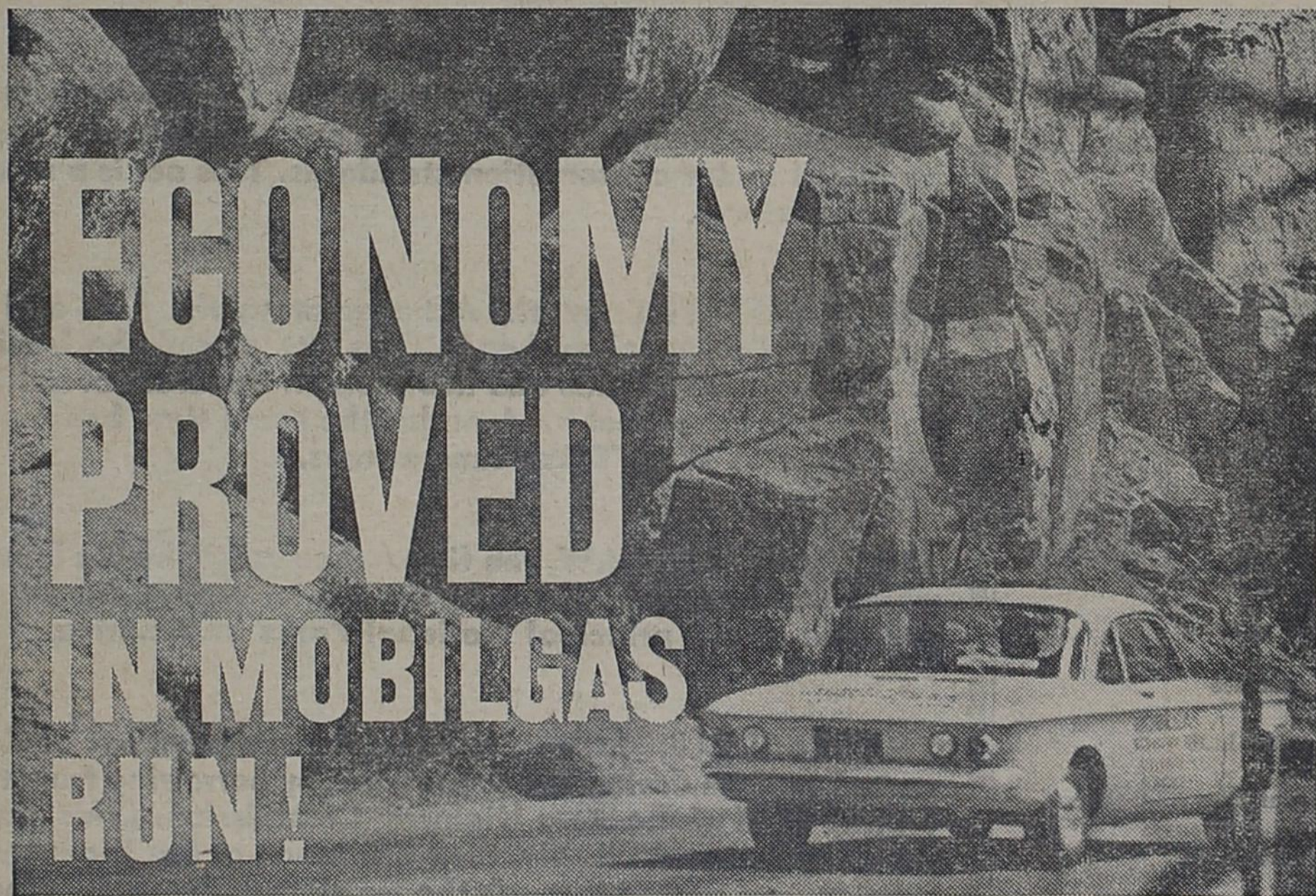

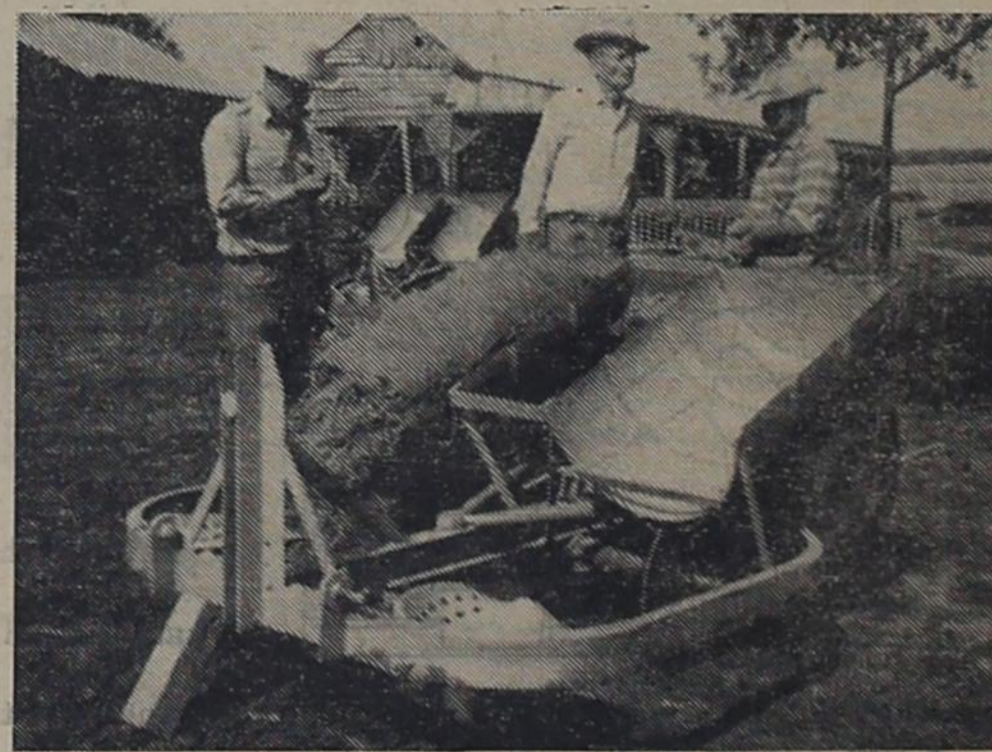

HEAVENLY PEANUT BITS

1 3/4 sticks butter
1/4 cup granulated sugar
2 cups sifted all purpose flour
1 tablespoon water
1 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 cup crushed salted peanuts
Cream butter and sugar. Add flour and water alternately as flour makes mixture difficult to handle. Add vanilla and peanuts. Cover bowl and place in refrigerator overnight. For crescent shape, work one teaspoon of dough at a time, molding into crescent shape with fingers. Place crescents on cookie sheet and bake in a pre-heated oven for 15 to 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Roll in confectioner's sugar.

For small round cookies, push one teaspoon of dough at a time onto cookie sheet. Flatten slightly with back of spoon, push whole peanut into face of each cookie. Bake as with crescents.

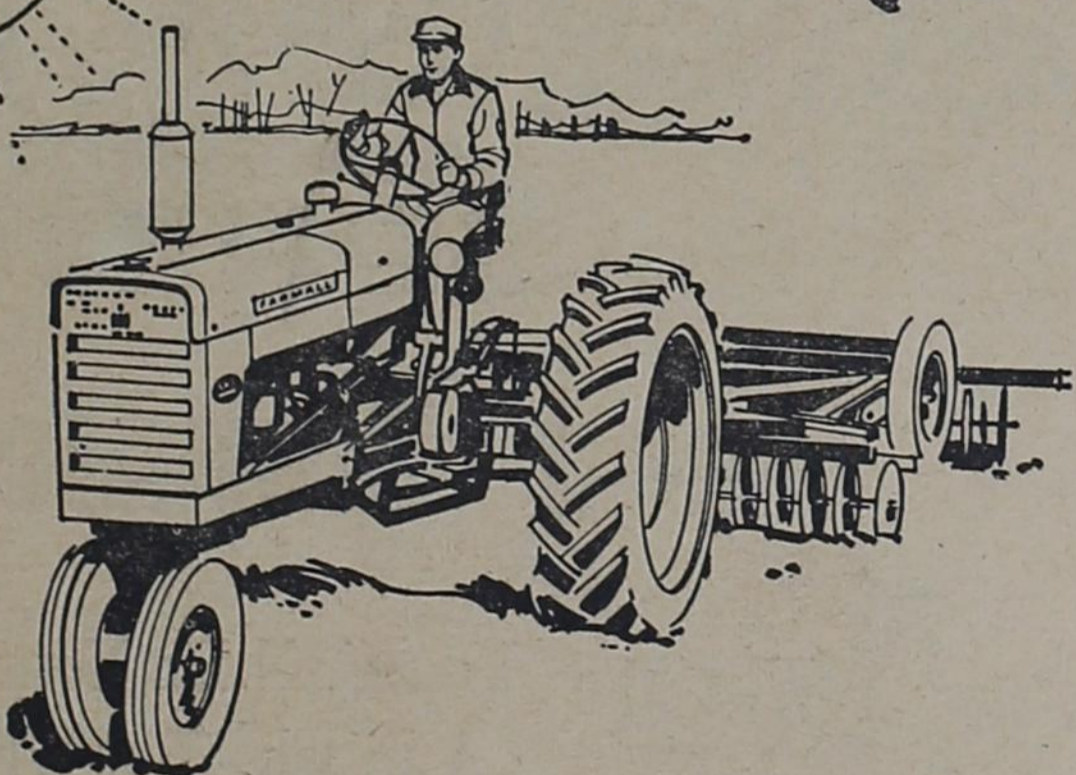
