

NOTICE TO THE VOTERS OF PRECINCT 6 - DESDEMONA

A Democratic Precinct Convention will be held in Desdemona on Election Day, May 7, 1960, at 4 p. m. in the school building. All legal, qualified voters desiring to participate in the Convention must have a Poll Tax or Exemption Certificate stamped, "DEMOCRAT-VOTED", by the Election Judge.

If you do not have a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, but are qualified to vote, the Election Judge will issue you a duplicate which will admit you to the Democratic Convention.

ELIGIBILITY DEFINED

If you became sixty years of age before the first day of January, 1959, you are eligible to vote without a poll tax or exemption certificate in cities or towns of less than ten thousand population.

If you became 21 years of age after January 1, 1960, and desire to vote it will be necessary to have an exemption certificate. This certificate is issued only by the County Clerk.

DELMARVA CHICKEN IMPERIAL

2 cut-up chickens
2 1/2 to 3 lbs each
2 cups dry bread crumbs
3/4 cup grated Parmesan or Romano Cheese
1/4 cup chopped parsley
1 clove garlic, crushed
2 teaspoons salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1/2 lb. butter, melted
2 tablespoons butter

Remove crust from an unsliced loaf of bread, grate into fine crumbs to make 2 cups. Spread out on flat surface to dry overnight. When ready to cook, mix crumbs with grated cheese, chopped parsley, garlic, salt and pepper. Dip chicken pieces into melted butter, then into crumb mixture. Be sure each piece is well coated. Arrange in a shallow pan so pieces don't overlap. Dot with the 2 tablespoons of butter. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 1 hour, or until tender. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
