





WYNNE CHESTER SAYS: Check Your Local Freezer Laws



This week I'd like to introduce some special friends of mine, the "boys" in the state and federal fish and wildlife services. It may surprise you to discover that the U. S. Department of the Interior considers home freezers a valuable aid to conservation, and protects your family by enforcing freezer storage laws. Although the leaness of wild game lends itself beautifully to freezing, no home-frozen food will keep indefinitely. By labeling the date your game was taken and frozen, you assure a safe time limit for serving the

meat. Your wildlife service is as near as your telephone or mailbox. Check regarding your local freezer laws, as these laws vary. Some states require licensed hunters to have a frozen storage permit: others do not: some limit the time game can be kept frozen; others do not: some allow you to keep game indefinitely; others do not. Your observance of freezer storage laws results in ample hunting, fine food for your family, and the conservation of wildlife.



AUSTIN, Tex. - - Most important date for the Texas voter this month is January 31.

After that it will be too late to get a poll tax receipt that will enable him to participate in this year's merry-go-round of political events.

Since 1960 is a presidential election year, lines will probably be long on the night of the 31st. Safest course is to do it now.

This year's poll tax receipts, mated \$9,000,000. for the first time, have a place for the owner's party affiliation to be stamped. But the voter doesn't have to decide this when he pays the tax.

Decision is made when the holder casts his primary vote. A person who votes in the Democratic primary will have his receipt stamped "Democrat". That means he can't go to a Republican convention that evening.

Also, if he fails to go to the Democratic primary to vote and doesn't have his receipt stamped at all, he can't get into a Democratic precinct convention.

As far as the general election in November is concerned, the new party registration law apparently makes little difference. There would be no way for anyone to know whether the holder of a receipt stamped for one party voted that party's straight ticket in the general election.


