EGG CASSEROLE

6 hard-cooked eggs 14 cup soft butter or oleo 3|4 teaspoon grated onion 3 teaspoons minced parsley (opt.) 1 1 2 teaspoon prepared mustard Salt and Pepper to taste 34 cup sour cream 1|3 cup dry crumbs. Paprika

Halve eggs lengthwise. Remove yolks; mash. Add 3 tablespoons butter, onion, parsley, mustard, salt and pepper; refill egg whites. Place, cut side up, in shallow baking dish; cover with sour cream. Sprinkle with crumbs; dot with butter. Bake in hot oven (400 F.) 20 minutes. Sprinkle Paprika over the top. Serve warm.


