SOUR CREAM CHICKEN CASSEROLE

Rub salt and pepper into the skin of a disjointed broiler or fryer. While this is flavoring, saute chopped onions in hot fat. Sprinkle generously with paprika. Use enough to give the onions a brilliant color. Add just a suggestion of vinegar.

Brown the seasoned chicken in onion mixture. Then cover tightly and simmer until chicken is fork tender. Remove the chicken from the pan and add flour to the drippings. Stir until uniformly thickened.

Then add equal parts of tomato juice and sour cream. About a half pint each will cover one chicken well. Blend until creamy.

Travis E. Hogan Buried Monday

FORMOSA (FHTNC) - Marine Lt. Col. Harold N. Mehafey of Gorman, Texas, took part in a huge amphibious landing exercise, March 22, on Formosa's southern coast, while serving with Marine Aircraft Group 11.

The exercise, termed "Operation Blue Star", called for all U. S.-Republic of China navy, marine and air force elements.

Purpose of the operation, which comprised over 18,000 Marines and 70 Navy ships, was to promote closer working relations between U. S. and Republic of China forces in practicing the conventional and vertical assault type amphibious landings.

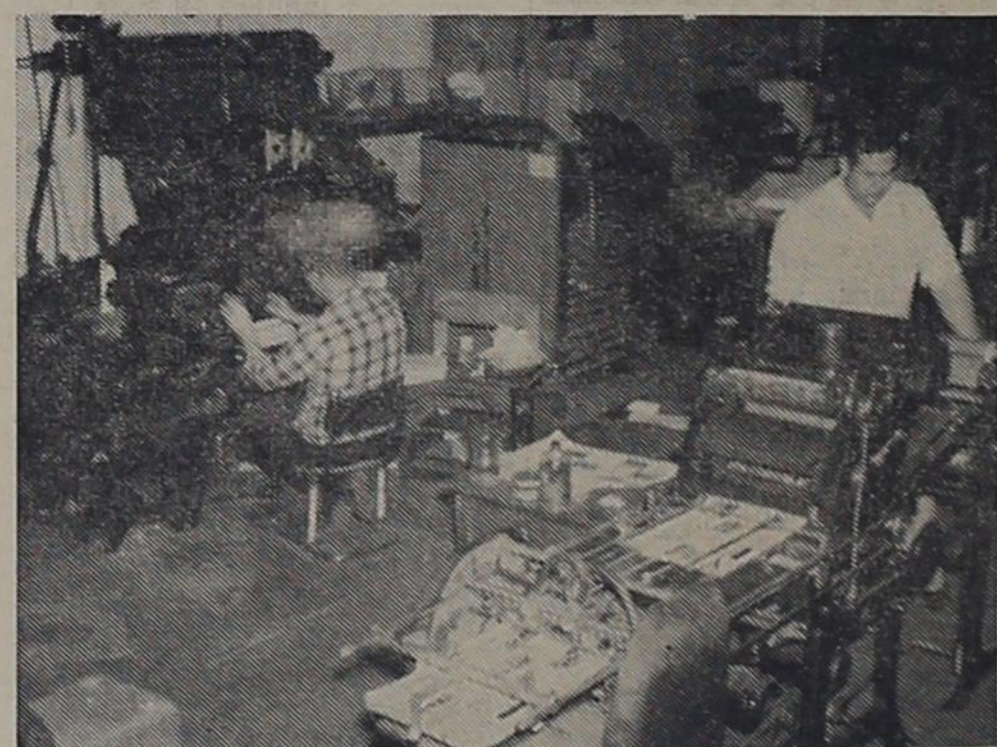

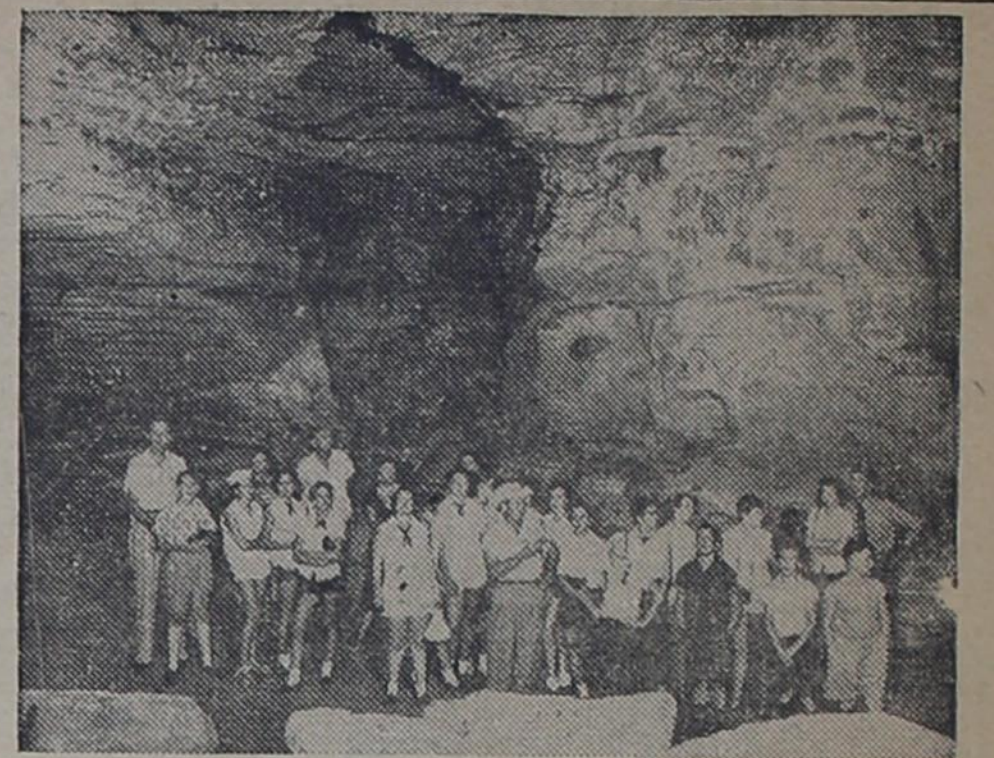

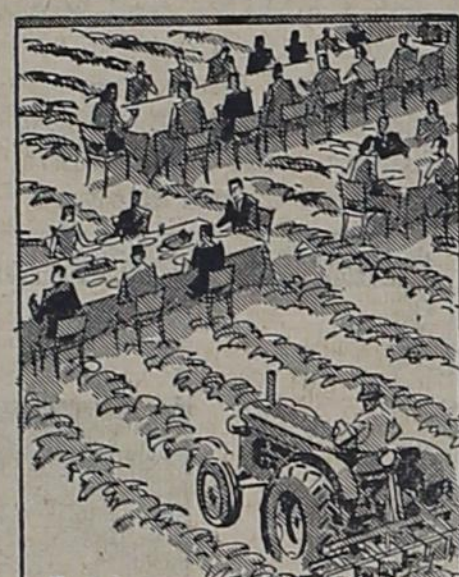

DENNIS G. HUNEWELL SCHOLARSHIP FUND SET UP AT TARLETON

Property valued at \$70,000 has been left to Tarleton State College by the late Dennis G. Hunewell, former band director, it was announced by the Texas A & M System Board of Directors today.

Income from the Erath County property, approximately 1,200 acres, must be used for scholarships for Tarleton band students according to the provisions of the will. It provides that 10 scholarships of \$200 be awarded each year. The surplus revenue from the property will be used to buy band equipment, instruments and

music.

Tarleton president, E. J. Howell, was named administrator of the property.

Mr. Hunewell was band director at Tarleton State from 1920 to 1942 during which time he was the central figure in a broad program to publicize the school. He and his bands became known throughout the state and attracted many students to the college. He died December 19, last year, at the age of 83.

College President Howell said the Hunewell gift was typical of the former band director's generosity and a reflection of his great love for Tarleton State. He said, "Those who will appreciate his gift the most will be the music students who are recipients of the scholarships bearing his name in the years to come."

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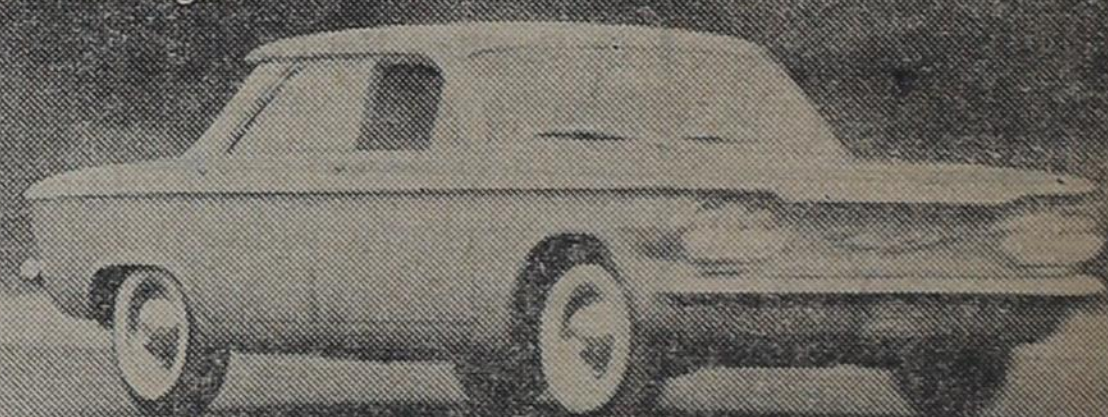

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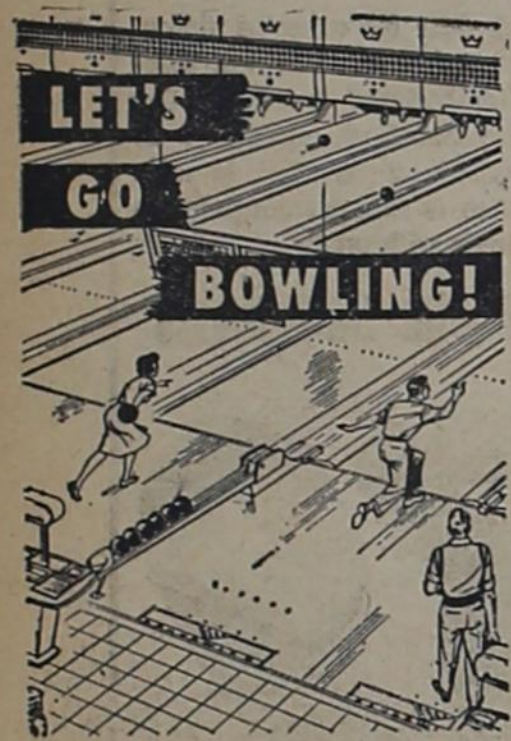

Protestantism - Communism

Christianity and Communism have nothing in common. The ideals of one are contrary to the ideals of the other. Christianity is the free expression of the individual in his relationship to God. Communism is the subjection of man's mind and very life to the authority of the state. A person cannot be true to the teaching and example of the Lord Jesus Christ and be a Communist.

These facts are presented so that Christians may intelligently interpret the current Air Force Manual Issue and the charge of communistic influences in the church.

FIRST: Let it be emphasized that it is not someone else that an agency of the U. S. Government has attacked with vicious falsehoods. It is the CHURCHES and whether your denomination is a member of the National Council of Churches of Christ or not, if you are a member of a Church, then this attack is on you and your Church. It is not a new attack. It has been going on for years by Carl McIntire, Billy James Hargis, Edgar Bundy, the Circuit Riders and a few lesser known figures.

The attitude of the leading Protestant Churchmen has been largely to ignore their verbal and printed barrages. However, when it became known that this stuff had been put in Air Force Manuals via Billy James Hargis through a civilian employee of Lackland AFB in San Antonio (who is a member of Grace Baptist Church, a fundamentalist, independent Church, not affiliated with the Southern Baptist denomination), the National Council of Churches decided to act.

The following is a copy of the resolution passed by the General Board of the National Council of Churches meeting in Oklahoma last week. The Board acted after having received a full report of developments from Mr. James W. Wine, NCC, assistant general secretary, who suggested that they consider the following central issues:

(1) The appearance in a document prepared and distributed by an agency of the U. S. Government of edited material which seeks to discredit, or to foster animosity towards religious institutions of this country.

(2) The appearance in the same document of statements which question the right of the American people "to know what's going on", as a fool hardy idea.

(3) The blunt statement in the same document that the American press prints only such information the government permits it to print.

(4) Statements in the same document which tend to discredit and to breed suspicion of the educational institutions of the United States.

(5) Statements in the same document which imply a relationship between the Revised Standard Version of the Holy Bible and atheistic Communism.

Those who have read the Christian Beacon published by Carl McIntire already are familiar with the methods used to try to discredit the National Council of Churches and its constituent denominations, particularly the United Presbyterian Church, USA, whose predecessor, the Presbyterian Church, USA, who long ago held an ecclesiastical trial of McIntire and divested him of his ordination on several counts. He and his followers are treated in the book, "Apostles of Discord" and some of the cohorts are included in the wartime book, "Under Cover", when it was Nazis and Fascists who were principal subversive threats.

This small group has been responsible for a large number of scurrilous pamphlets. For instance, the Circuit Riders have published a booklet, which was being distributed by Billy James Hargis, last week in Oklahoma City, entitled "2109" which purports to list that number of Methodist ministers who are fellow-travelers with communist front movements and organizations. Hargis said previously that they are going to publish another booklet called, "20.5", which would allegedly prove that 20.5 percent of the Episcopal clergy are Red-tinted and that a third volume would show that 51 percent of the Unitarian ministers have been communist influenced.

Using the McCarthy era method, the "Apostles of Discord", have included some of the most eminent Protestant Bible scholars as affiliates of organizations "which have aided and abetted the cause of Communism in the United States. Here are some of the men who have been slandered: Millar Burrows, Henry J. Cadbury, J. Phillip Hyatt, Fleming James, James Moffet, Paul C. Payne, Donald W. Richardson, Luther A. Weigle and 22 others on the Revised Standard Version Committee or the advisory group."

If we are to remain free and strong in our day, then we must stand together and work toward a spirit of harmony and "togetherness". Any group that seeks to divide one against another is not needed in these days of struggle and decisions. If there is to be an investigation, and surely there ought to be, then let it begin with these who are shouting the loudest and longest. Let it be decided what motives are behind these false accusations and situations.

Weigh these facts and irresponsible allegations carefully and you will know as I do the Communistic influences are not found in the Church and that it is the Spirit of our Lord Jesus Christ who directs and guides our thinking and not the spirit of Communism.

May our Father in Heaven forgive those who in the name of His Son seek to divide and confuse those who are not strong!

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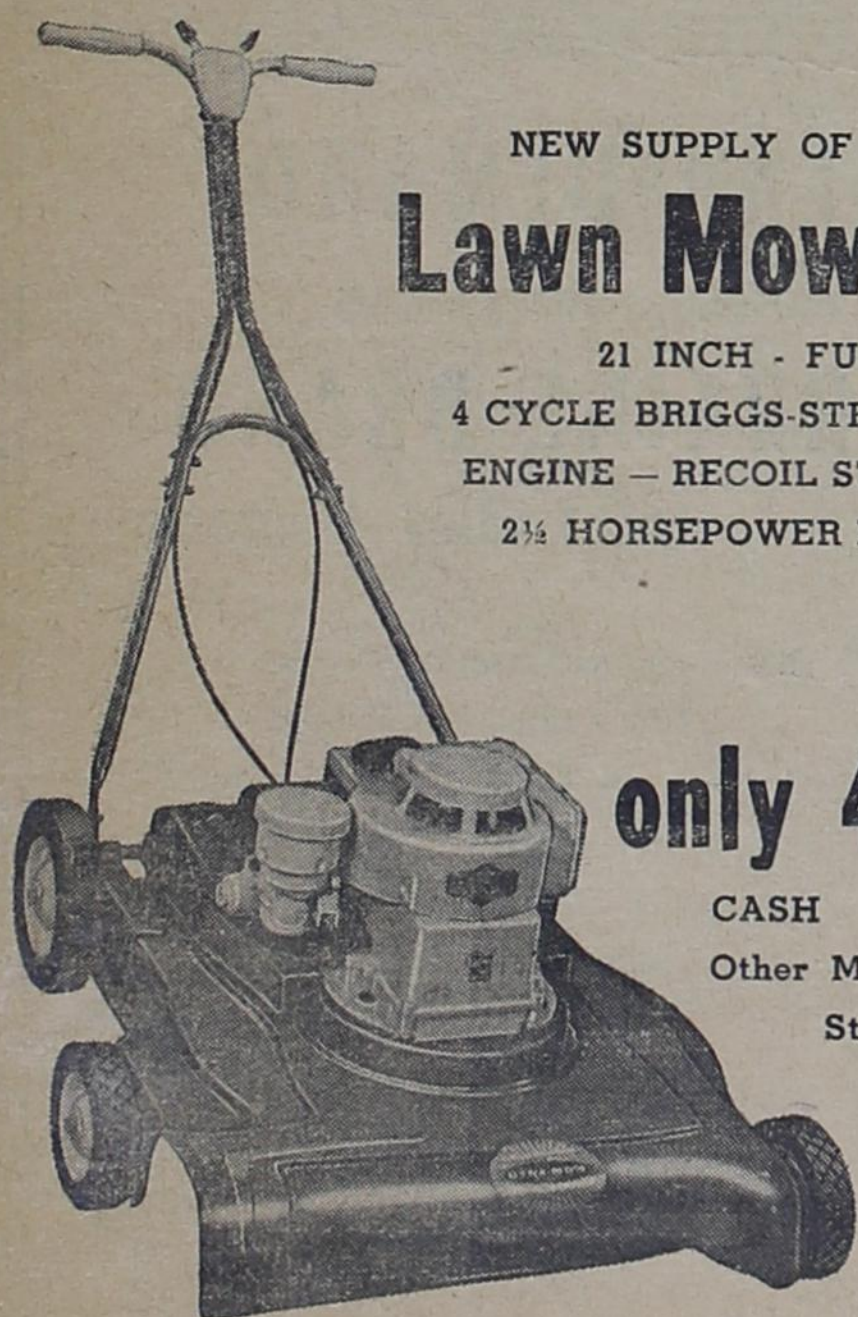
