There will be only evening services at 8:00 p. m.

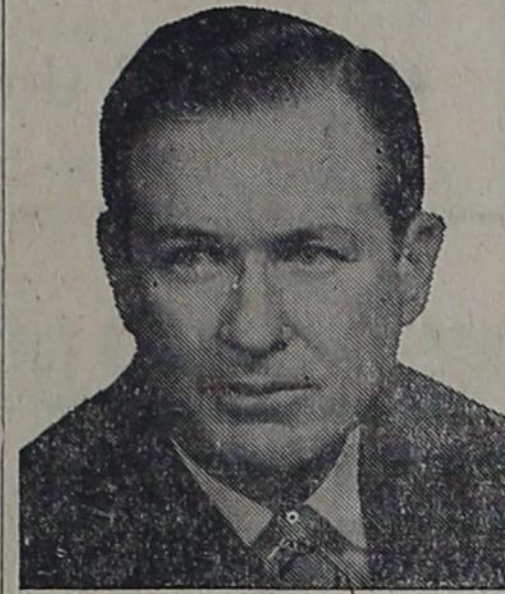

SWPGA Annual Meet Set For July 29 At Stephenville

Burleson To Speak Afternoon Session



Congressman Omar Burleson, Representative from the 17th Congressional District of Texas, will address those attending the Annual Meeting at the Stephenville City Park immediately following lunch. Mr. Burleson has worked closely with the peanut growers during the time he has been in Washington. Although he is not a member of the House Agriculture Committee, he has been a key figure in legislative and administrative decisions affecting peanut growers. He has consistently kept Southwest members of both houses of Congress advised of the feelings of the Southwest peanut industry on all matters of interest. His role as coordinator between the Southwest peanut growers and members of the Congress and the Department of Agriculture is of immeasurable value to our Association and the individual peanut producer of the Southwest. He introduced a bill in 1958 which, if passed, would have eliminated many of the objectionable features of the present peanut price support program. Mr. Burleson has recently expressed his keen interest in helping pass a bill next year on which growers from all three major producing areas are presently working.

Mr. Burleson is a Chairman of the House Administration Committee and is a ranking member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee. His talk to the group at Stephenville will be on the subject of "Foreign Affairs," an area of vital interest to everyone at present.

Congressman Burleson was recently re-elected to Congress by an overwhelming majority of the people of the 17th Congressional District.

New Directors for Texas Districts 1 and 2 will be certified and other business will be considered.

The membership meeting will be followed by a general session at 11:00 a. m. which is open to the general public. Mr. John Duncan, President, Georgia Farm Bureau, will explain the objectives and purposes of growers contributing to research and promotion through self-assessment programs. Growers of several commodities in Georgia are engaged in such programs and Mr. Duncan's comments will have added significance due to the fact that the peanut growers in the Southwest will initiate a voluntary assessment program this year. This program will be handled by the Southwest Peanut Research Foundation described elsewhere in this issue.

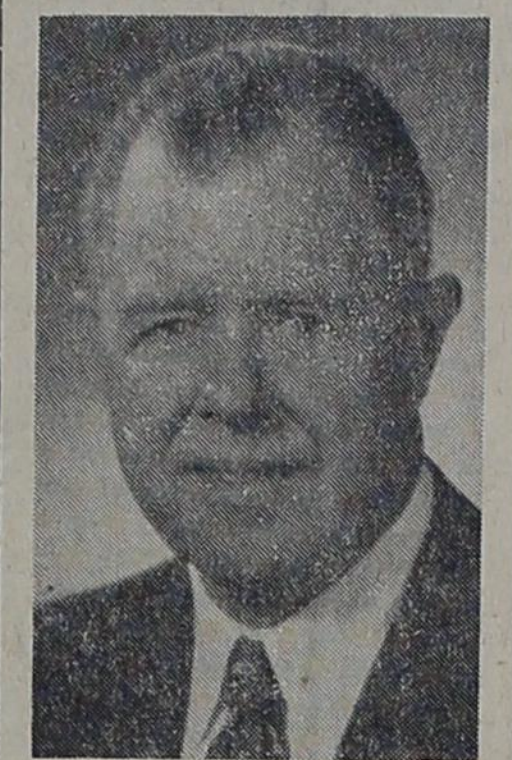

Cong. W. R. Poage, Principle Speaker



The principal speaker in the general session will be Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage, Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee. Mr. Poage is no stranger to any group of agricultural producers in the Southwest. He has been a staunch leader for agriculture and a respected representative of agricultural producers for many years. He has served as Vice Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture since 1947. He spent his childhood and received his first education in Throckmorton County, Texas; attended Baylor University, the University of Colorado and the University of Texas, receiving his A. B. and LLB degrees from Baylor. Mr. Poage was admitted to the bar in 1924 and practiced in Waco until he was elected to Congress. He was a member of the Texas House of Representatives from 1925 through 1929 and of the State Senate from 1931-37. In 1936 he was elected to the 75th Congress and was re-elected to each succeeding Congress. In addition to serving as Chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture Mr. Poage is Chairman of three important subcommittees: (1) Conservation and Credit, (2) Foreign Agricultural Operations and (3) Livestock and Feed Grains.

Congressman Poage has worked closely with SWPGA through the years. Although the peanut is not a major crop in his district he has consistently and effectively worked to improve the peanut growers' situation, both in legislative matters and in influencing administrative decisions of the Department of Agriculture.

Following the Congressman's address lunch will be served in the Stephenville City Park, compliments of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association. After lunch at approximately 1:00 p. m. there will be a demonstration by officials of the Federal-State Inspection Service of peanut grading equipment to be used for the first time in official grading in 1960. The demonstration will be held in the park.

Also, at 1:00 p. m. there will be a meeting for peanut buyers, county agricultural agents, ASC personnel and others interested in the operation of the self-assessment program to be initiated this year by the Southwest Peanut Research Foundation. The Foundation is the new peanut association sponsored by SWPGA, Texas and Oklahoma Farm Bureaus, Oklahoma Farmers Union and the Southwestern Shellers Association.

various sections of the territory within the past few days and the prospects for another bumper crop of peanuts look better as the days go by. The cotton farmers are grateful for the added moisture at this time.

The small grain crops were greatly benefited also, for some of it was in the last stages of putting on the seed heads. The tomato plants and pea vines are revived enough to start putting on new blooms so we can look forward to another crop from the old plants; and there is time enough to plant more.

We have been fortunate to escape any damage from high winds and flooding and no tornadoes have been sighted in this area to date.

Stories From The Past In Gorman

Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Powell of Tampa, Florida, stopped over in Gorman last Monday enroute, to San Saba where Mrs. Powell was to arrange for a headstone to be placed at the grave of her late father, Mr. Roscoe C. Senterfitt, who passed away last year. They had stopped at Robertson's Service Station for gas and while talking to the Powells he sensed a story and called the Progress office.

Mrs. Powell is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Robert McAdams, old-time residents of Gorman.

Mr. McAdams once owned and operated a general store and a leather goods shop in Gorman. He made saddles and boots and made repairs on leather articles. Some of the "bad men" of their time, including Bill Longley, traded with him, and the story is that Bill was always courteous and honest with him.

Those of you who remember the story of Bill Longley recall that he was hung for some dastardly deed, but he did not die.

For the edification of a lot of us, Mr. McAdams made a brace that fit around Bill's body and the brace had a hook attached. Bill Longley was hung alright, as far as the public knew at that time, but in some planned fashion, by Bill's hangman friend, the hook prevented the rope from tightening around his neck, so after dark his "body" was cut down and taken away.

The McAdams lived in Gorman during the early part of the "oil boom" when the population reached about 20,000. Sleeping accommodations were almost non-existent. Mrs. "Mc" rented space on their front porch for the men to have a place to stretch out and lay their heads to sleep and rest for the next day's work as a "mule skinner," a driller or any number of other jobs that were created during the boom.

The McAdams had two daughters, named Theo and Maude May. The two sisters married two brothers, Rodney and Roscoe Senterfitt, in a double wedding, the likes of which Gorman has never seen.

The Senterfitt boys were ex-students of the Hankins Normal College. Roscoe, the father of Mrs. Powell, was a member of the debating society. He became a school teacher and the building where he first taught is still standing, not far from the old Senterfitt farm in the San Saba area.

The high chimney in the old homestead is still standing and Mrs. Powell recalls listening to the stories told about the Indian raids on the white settlement and about the family hiding from them up in the big chimney.

Mrs. Powell said she wished she had listened "harder" to the many tales that she grew up with but had no thought of their significance at that time.

It was her first trip through Gorman and we are glad to have met her and grateful that she could recall a bit from the past. Mr. Powell remarked that he wished he could stay here for several days, for stories of such

Besides being quick and easy to fix, it is practically a one dish meal. With a salad and crispy bread sticks or thin cornbread squares you are through with the meal in much less time than you thought possible. Makes a wonderful hurry-up company dish, too.

CHILI MACARONI

- 1/4 cup butter or oleo
- 3 tablespoons sifted flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 2 cups tomato juice
- 2 tablespoons instant minced onion
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 cup grated American Cheese
- 1 cup pitted ripe olives
- 12 ounces shell macaroni, cooked and drained.

Melt butter and blend in flour, chili powder, salt and sugar. Stir in tomato juice; add onion and garlic powder. Cook and stir until mixture reaches a boil. Boil a minute or two, until slightly thickened. Add cheese and olives and stir over low heat until cheese is melted. Pour over macaroni. Serve at once. Makes about six servings.

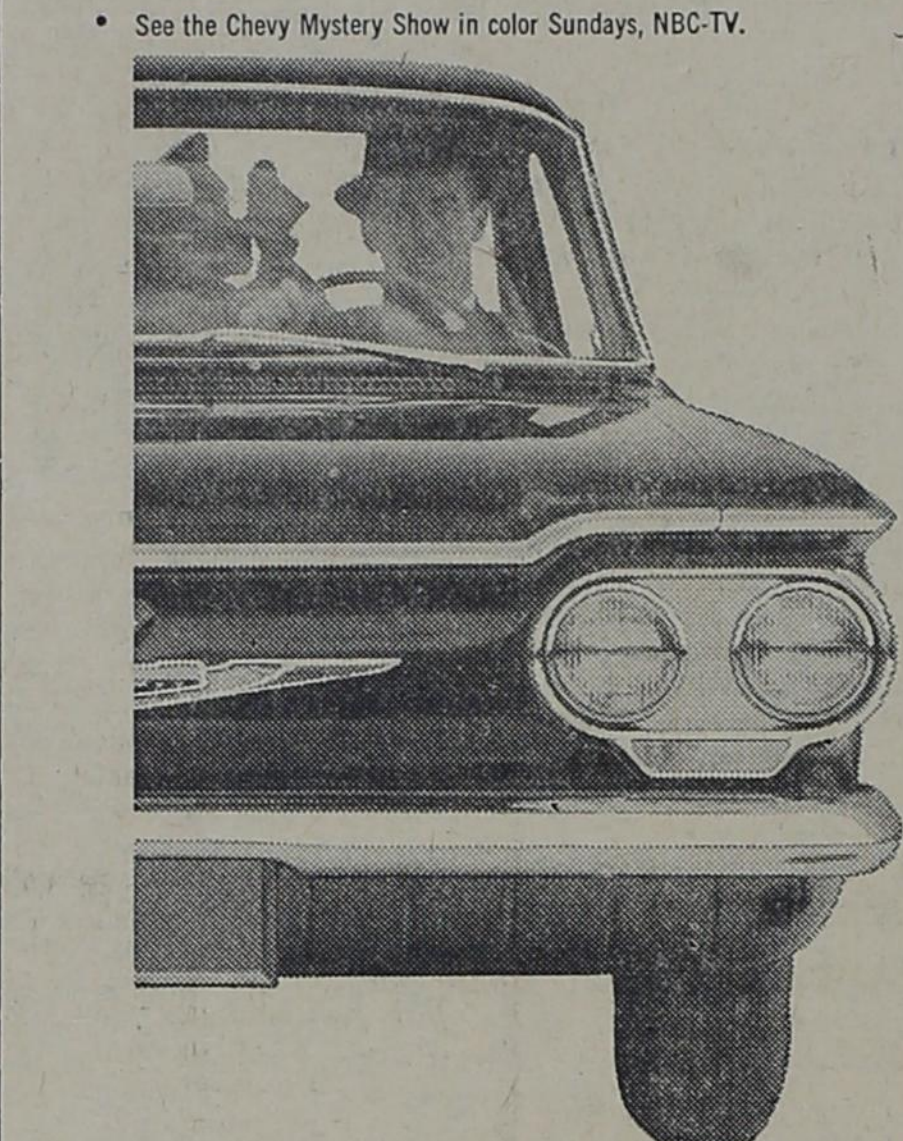

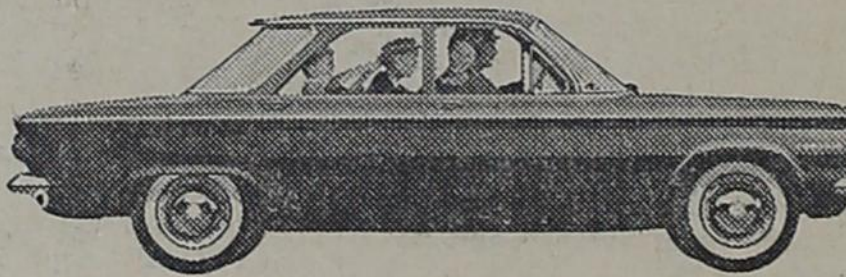

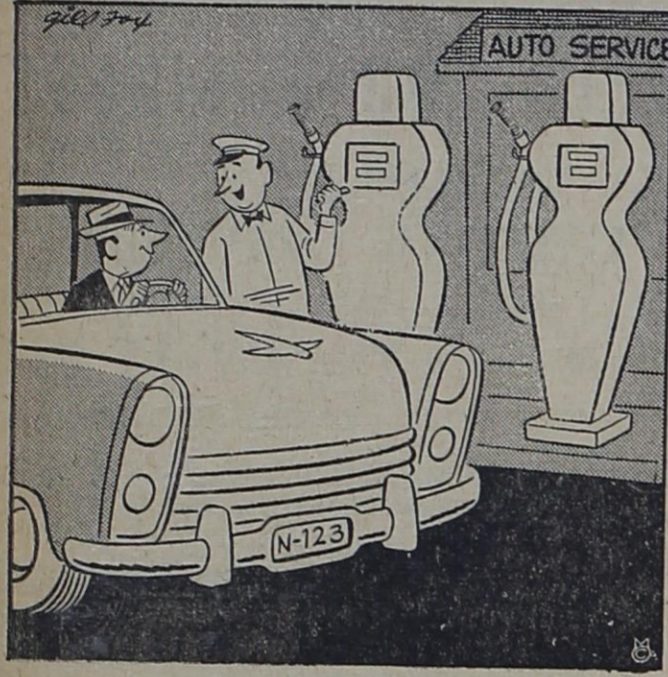
SEWING CLASSES WELL ATTENDED

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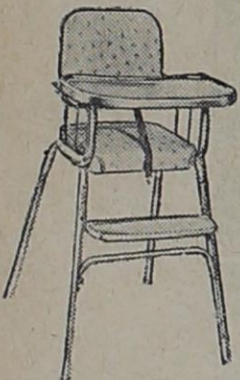
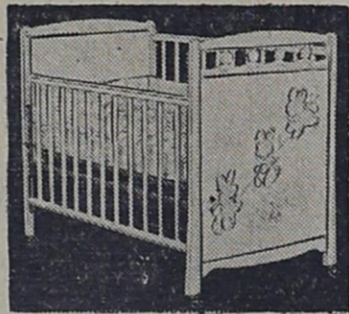


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
