There was a strike of bricklayers in New Jersey the other day. They were already getting \$4 an hour, or \$28 for a 7-hour day, for laying about 500 bricks. That's 51/2c a brick. But they got more-\$4.22 an an hour now, and \$4.50 an hour by May 1962.

Why is it that every strike seems to win an increase? Well partly it's because the government has granted organized labor monopoly powers enjoyed by no one else. A good many businesses have a measure of government protection, too.






