A temporary Working Committee was elected to promote and publicize the Sabanna River Flood Prevention Project.

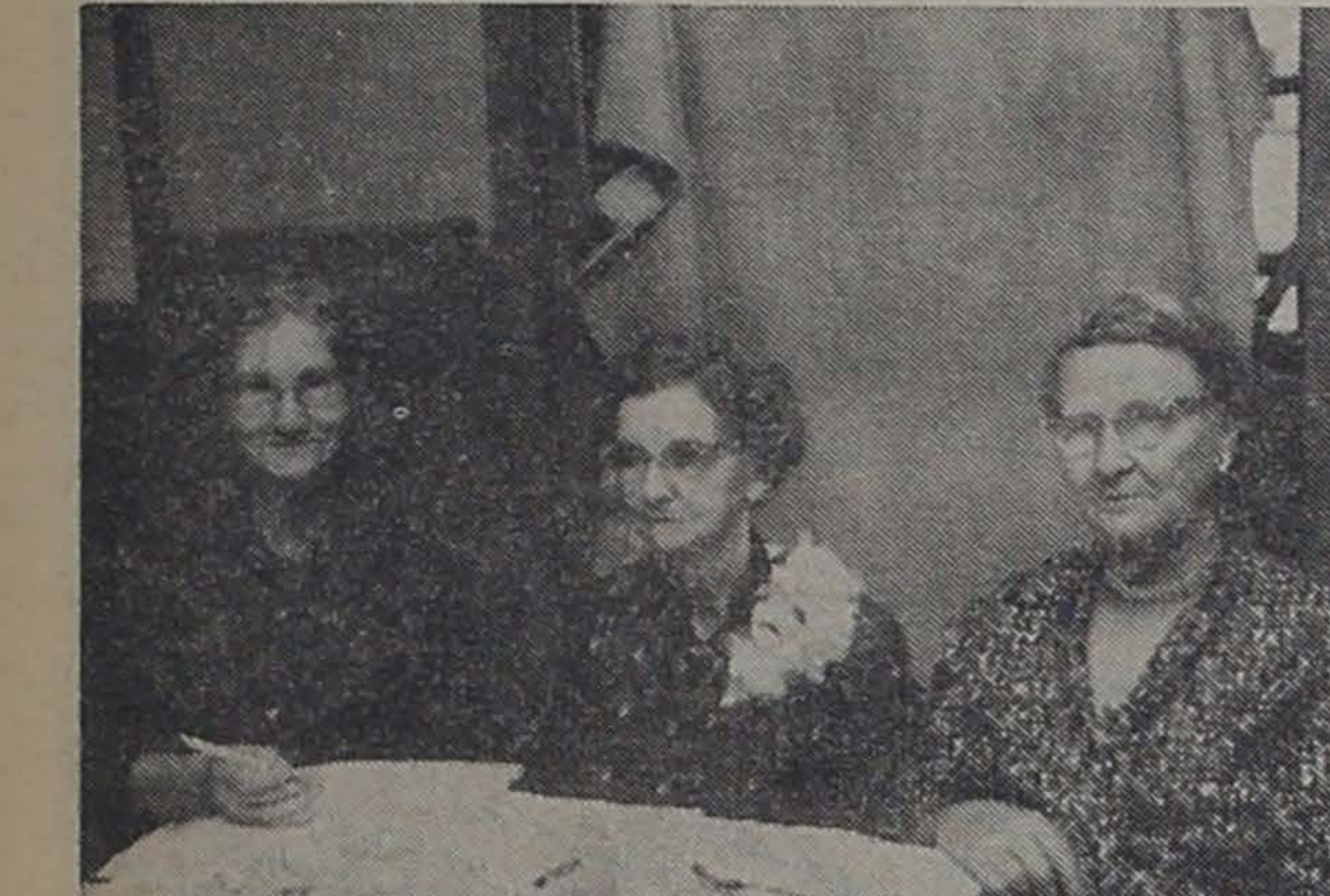

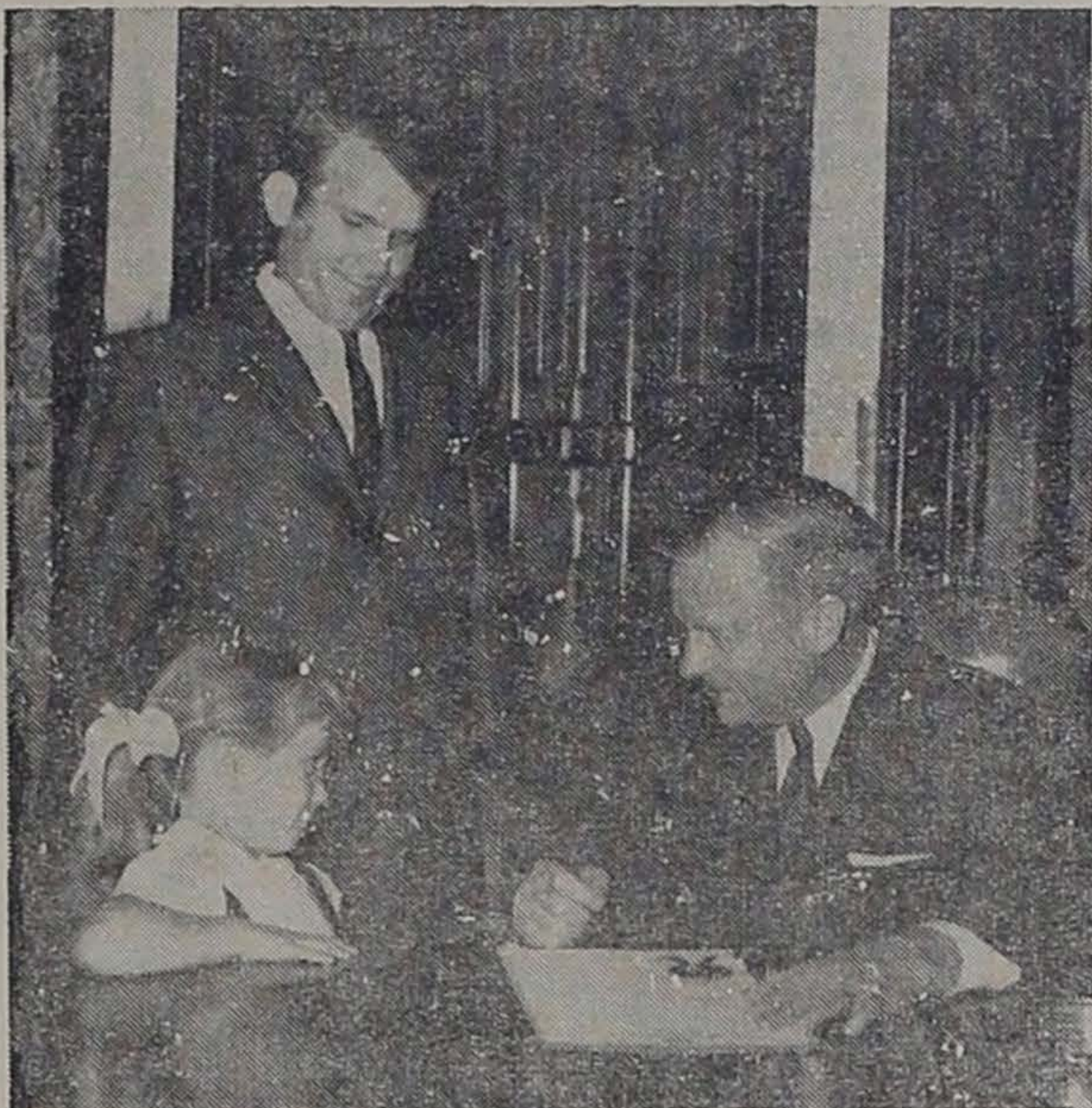
When the war was over the draft was sent north, worn and endorsed with dozens of signatures, indicating its usage as a means of trade and barter, it was honored by the Hartford.

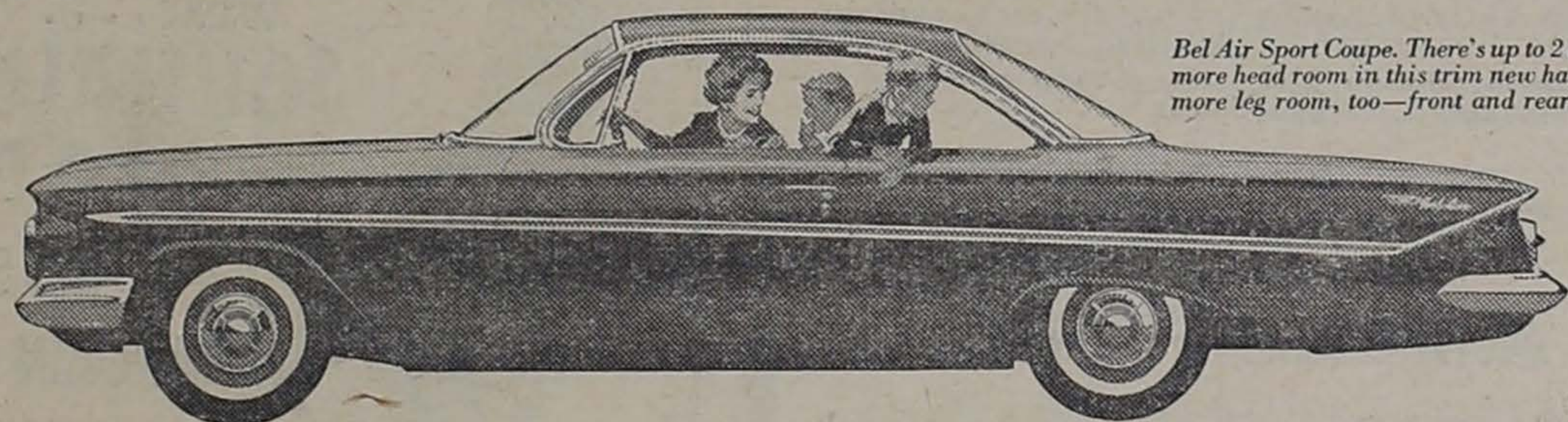

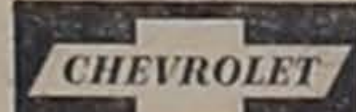

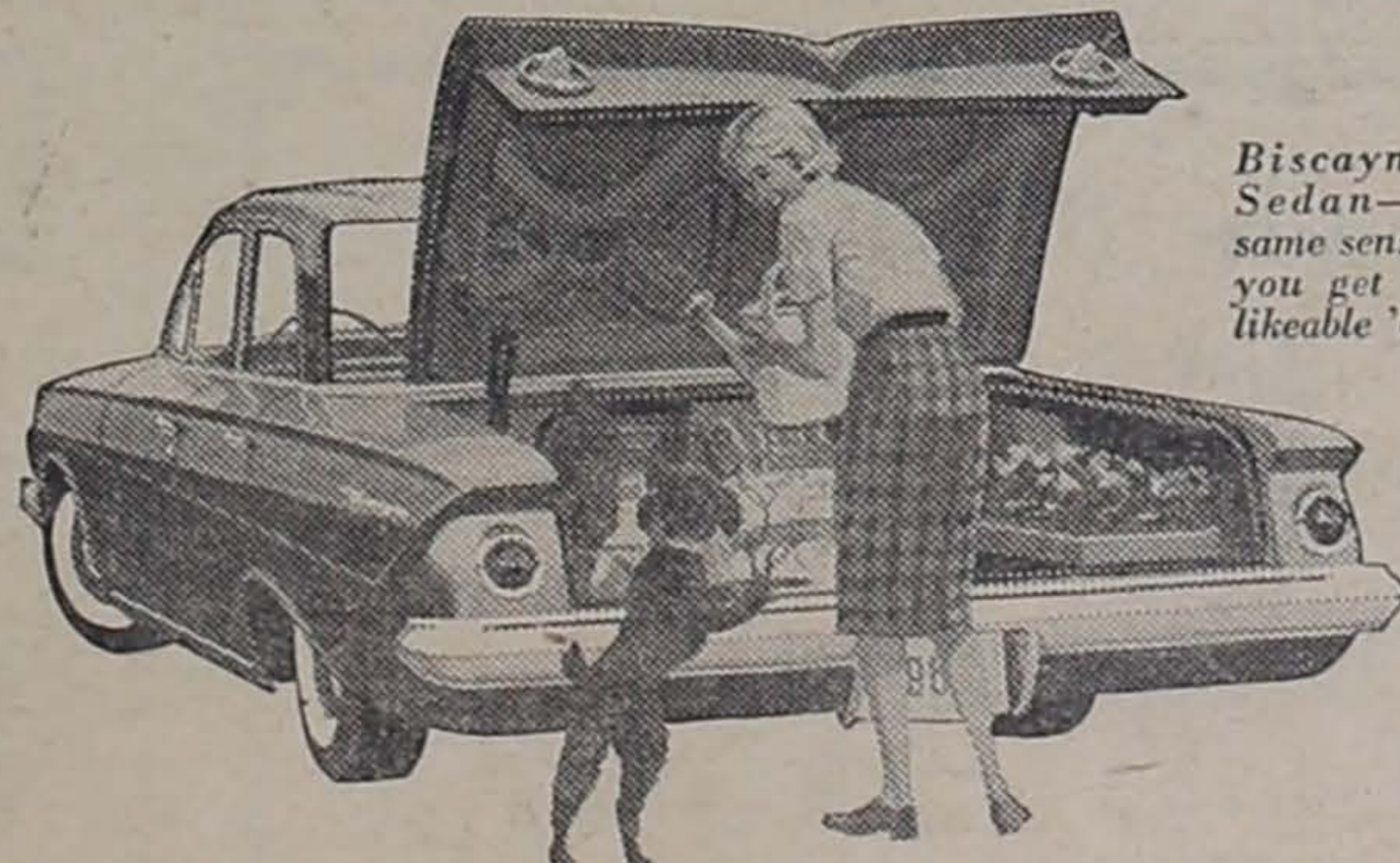

Save Deer Hides

Says VSC Group

Dallas, Nov. 5 — Puhleeze, Mr. Hunter, don't throw away that deer hide!

That's the plea of volunteers in state-operated hospitals who annually sponsor the collection of these skins and have them tanned into leather for use by patients in occupational therapy.

Mrs. Frank O. Hamilton of Dallas, chairman of the Volunteer Services Council for all the state hospitals and special schools, said the patients fashion all types of small articles from the leather which provide gifts for their families, or if salable, "Coke and cigarette" funds for themselves.

"The real value though," she pointed out, "is in giving the patient something to occupy his thoughts and his hands. Working with leather especially appeals to many men in our hospitals."

The hides should be lightly salted, drained and sent to the Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 Fredericksburg Road, Austin, where the owner L. M. Rathbone donates storage, curing and preparation of the hides for the tannery.

Most motor freight lines in Texas haul the hides without charge if the shipping tag is marked "charity". Many locker plant operators also will assist in adding the hides to the collection when the deer are skinned if instructed to do so by the hunter, Mrs. Hamilton said.

In addition to the Texas Motor Transportation Association, the buckskin collection has the endorsement and active cooperation of Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas, Texas Independent Meat Packers Association, State Game and Fish Commission, sports writers and radio editors throughout Texas, the Volunteer Chairman said.

Many Qualify For SS Benefits Due To '60 Amendment

Last week, November 4 or 5, many people across the nation received their first social security benefit checks - checks made possible for the first time by the 1960 amendments to the social security law, reports R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene District Manager for the Social Security Administration. Receiving checks for the first time were working people and their dependents (and also some survivors of workers who have died) who became eligible for benefits. The amount of social security credits required was reduced by about one-third, Tuley said.

Also receiving benefits for the first time were some widows whose husbands died after March 31, 1938, with at least 1 1/2 years of social security credits. Before the changes in the law enacted in September, no monthly benefits were payable to the survivors of any person dying before 1940.

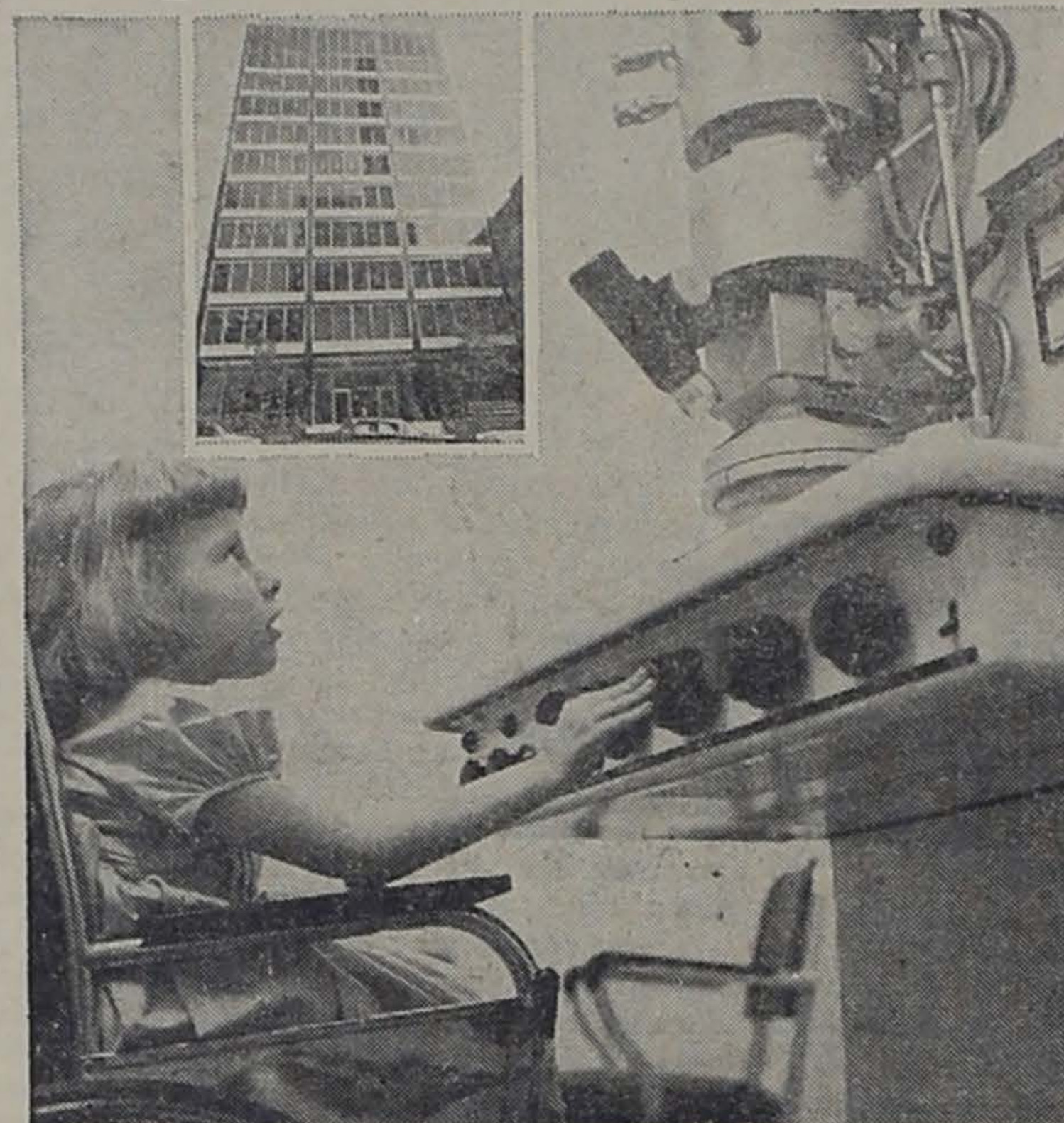
If you believe you qualify for benefits under the amended law, it is still not too late for you to apply, and receive benefits dating back to the month of October. Additional information about specific cases can be obtained by asking your Abilene social security office. For general information on the 1960 amendments, ask the social security office for the new leaflet on the 1960 changes.

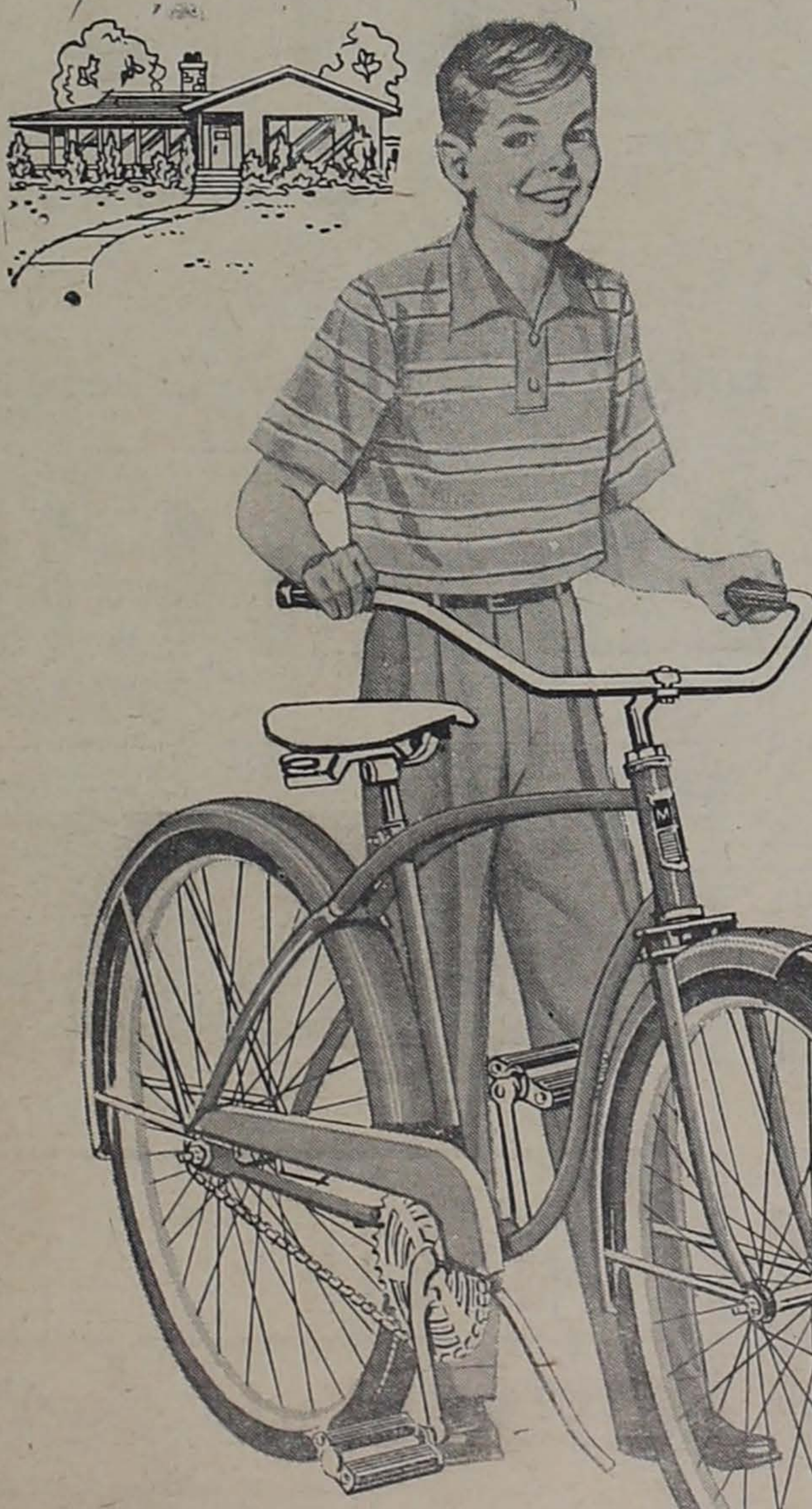

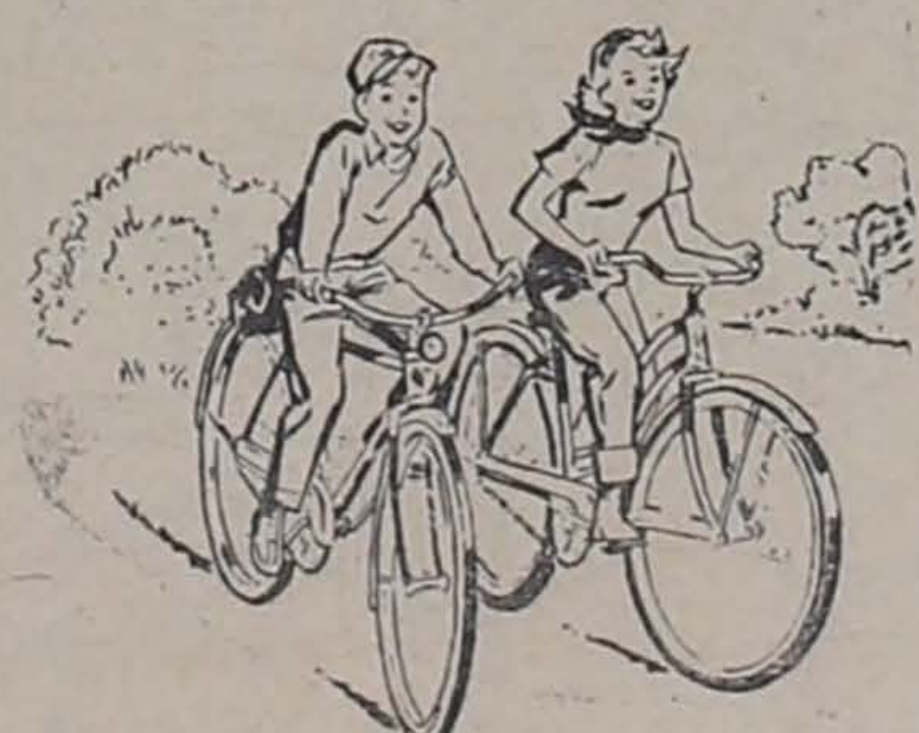

DECORATIVE PROPERTIES OF WOOD

Wood is an extremely variable material. For example, there is virtually no limit to the natural color combinations available. The sapwood of most species is light colored. Some are almost white. Some woods show no color difference between the sapwood and the heartwood. However, the heartwood of most species is darker colored than the sapwood.

The figure of a piece of wood depends not only on the species but also on the way the wood is sawn. Sawing accentuates certain grain characteristics with a particular wood. Some woods are preferred because of the figured stripes or ribbon effect and others because of elliptical or curved patterns. It is the matching of these patterns and color shades that gives rare beauty to some pieces of expensive furniture.

The size character of the wood grain also influences wood appearance. Open-grained wood, like red oak, refers to the relative size of its pores. When applying finishes to such wood, fillers must be used. Such woods are often filled with colors which contrast with the basic color of the wood. Such color applications can be used with startling effectiveness.

When selecting wood, there are many characteristics to choose from and sufficient combinations to please any taste and requirement.

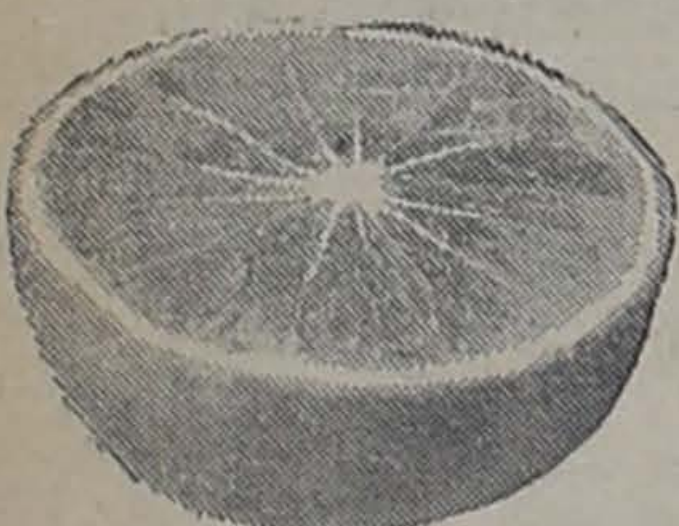
