CARE OF WOOD SURFACES

Reasonable care and intelligent maintenance will greatly increase the beauty and usefulness of wood buildings. Dirt and stain on painted wood, like on clothing, is objectionable, but can, in most instances, be removed. An occasional washing with soap and warm water will remove grime and dirt and frequently will restore the paint color and gloss.

To remove mildew from a painted wood surface, it should be brushed off and then washed with a 5% to 10% solution of Borax in warm water. This treatment may have to be repeated, since the fungus which causes mildew is difficult to control.

Rust stains in wood from nails or other metal and the mineral streaks from water stains may be removed by repeated scrubbing with oxalic acid mixed 5 ounces per gallon of cold water.

The pitch in pine lumber frequently works out of the boards and accumulates in streaks or patches on the surface. If the pitch is hard, it can be chipped or sanded off. If soft, it can be removed by rubbing with denatured alcohol. After using these stain removers, the wood surface should always be thoroughly rinsed with clean water.

RURAL YOUTH PRAISED BY AIR FORCE ACADEMY SUPERINTENDENT

Fl. Worth, Texas, Feb. 16, 1961 - A farm background gives the rural youth an advantage over the city youth.

These words were the words

of Major General William S. Stone, superintendent of the Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colorado, speaking at the 14th annual luncheon of The Cattleman magazine. Around 900 guests were on hand for the luncheon, which each year is held on the first Monday of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth.

General Stone used two Air Force Cadets, one from a large city and one from a nine-acre farm near Winona, Texas, to

illustrate why farm youth has the advantage.

Both had outstanding records in high school. Both were good athletes, both were editors of their respective high school yearbooks and both held high office in school organizations.

"Which had the advantage?" General Stone asked. "I would have bet on Dennis. Now I know better. Dennis, the city youth from the large high school, never did adjust to the demands of the Academy. These are demands for cooperation with his classmates as well as with his instructors.

"Carl, the boy from the nine-acre farm, from the Future Farmers, from the graduating class of 20 at Winona, Texas, had the advantage. And what is most revealing, Carl says so himself. He said that the farm and the FFA membership gave him an early responsibility that was 'just his.' No one else would do it for him. He could not leave it to someone else. His stock project and the attention and record-keeping it required was an important experience. There was no one looking over his shoulder telling him what to do next. He describes his advantages most clearly by giving credit to the self-discipline that the farm taught him. Showing stock as a Future Farmer taught him pride in himself and the community. Carl would have made an outstanding rancher and cattleman. For like reasons, he will make an outstanding Air Force officer.

"CARL GRANBERRY of WINONA, TEXAS, is not an isolated case to prove my point. I could have described many others."
