Davis Smith has been appointed Election Judge for the City.

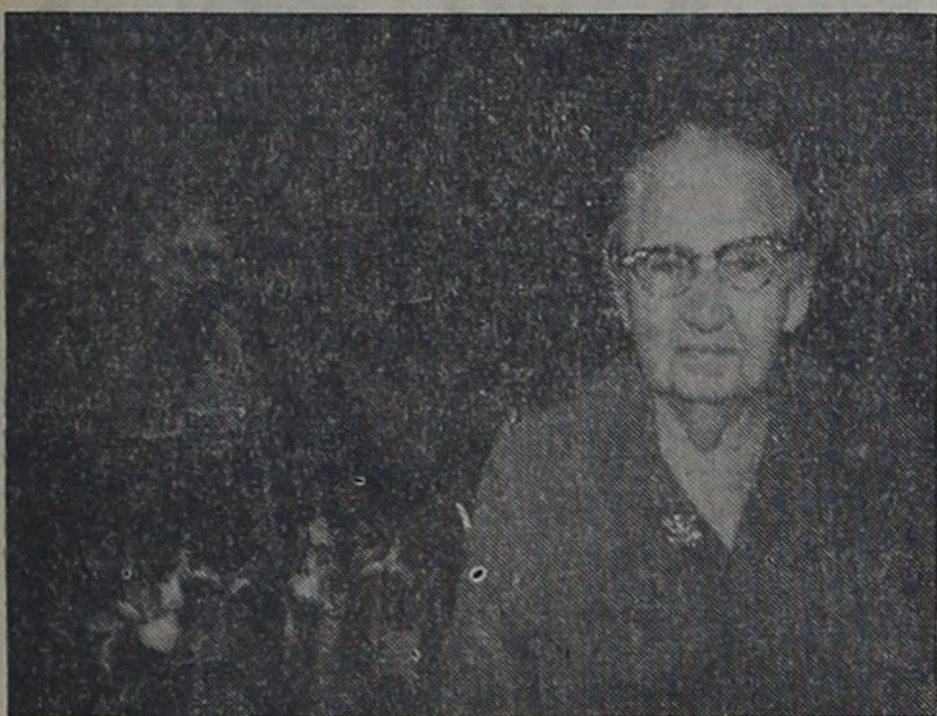
W. G. Baker is Election Judge for the County.

Mrs. Allie Hollifield To Celebrate 92nd. Birthday On Easter Sunday



MRS. ALLIE GRAY HOLLIFIELD . . . 92 years young

Mrs. Allie Gray Hollifield, born in Montgomery County, Arkansas in 1869, is approaching her 92nd. birthday April 7th. She will celebrate the event with her family Easter Sunday in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Joe Barnes, of Rising Star. Accompanying her from Gorman will be the daughter with whom she lives, Mrs. Henry Capers, a son, George Hollifield, and other relatives.

With the exception of an interval of 8 years at Rising Star Mrs. Hollifield has lived 68 years in Gorman. She recalls the tall timbers, heavy rainfall, morning dews, and dark, swirling rivers of her native state.

But 1893, her first year in Gorman, she remembers quite differently. When she, with her husband, the late William Hollifield, arrived January 20th a skiff of snow had fallen. Planting time passed with only a dash of rain April 29th and a storm that levelled parts of Cisco. Through the hot dry summer it was not the pleasure of being near her father, Dr. George Gray, who had prac-

ticed in Gorman for several years, but the price of railroad tickets that kept the Hollifields from returning to Arkansas. There were no roads from the farms to the little town, only deep sandy lanes cut through the knee to shoulder high oak shinnery.

But Christmas Eve came with "the sweetest, slow, soaking rain, falling all night long." And then the sun came out for Christmas.

Cotton would just about grow wild and the harvest of 1894 was something to remember. The 19 bales garnered by the Hollifields was ginned at Bass Lake, a site later decided by the late Henry Capers, son-in-law to Mrs. Hollifield, and Mrs. Capers to the City of Gorman. The site, now known as Frank A. Gray Memorial Park, was dedicated to the memory of the Capers' foster son, a World War II casualty.

Cotton continued a bumper crop until the early 1900's when the boll weevils brought in by the Galveston flood, supposedly on an ocean current from India,

School Head Discusses Educational Trends At Excelsior Club Meeting

Mr. Robert Browder, school superintendent, appeared as guest speaker at the Excelsior Club on Tuesday evening. He was introduced by Mrs. M. F. Allen, the hostess.

Mr. Browder, having noted the title of the Excelsior Yearbook, "Past, Present and Future," selected as his subject "Modern Educational Trends." "The World," he said, "hinges on education." He noted that education for girls in pre-public school days consisted of training at home in the household arts; and for boys, knowledge came from men who were known experts in the art of self-defense and who knew from experience or from tradition much about war.

With the changing Western World came the public school and co-ed education. High school education in this early period put much stress on mathematics and other sciences, with social conformity being a mark of the entire system.

When World War I had ended with what was considered a job well done, America and American education lapsed into a period of "laissez faire," (literally "let people do as they please.") The school curricula came to be embellished with a variety of choice in subject matter, with little requirement for conformity.

But laissez faire had not supplanted America with her need. World War II exploded and America's popularity was on the wane. So began a new trend back toward the sciences and liberal arts' emphasis, with high school graduation requirements being raised.

At several intervals Mr. Browder warned that education is the weapon with which we must win our competition with Russia and there is no doubt that we are in the competition for supremacy. He cited acts of President Kennedy in surrounding himself by intellectuals which he believes to be among the best minds of America.

Browder also discussed the National Defense Educational Act of 1957 under which funds are made available to schools for proposed projects. During the summer of 1960 the local head of the high school science department, Mr. Nelson Rand, was provided the opportunity of taking a special science course provided by the federal government. Gorman may feel fortunate to have an instructor who was selected among the 100 of the 1000 who made application for the training. Progress in improvement of the department has been noted by the students and administration.

A second phase of modern education is the testing and guidance program provided by the federal government. The goal of the program is to enable the students to select vocation, profession or occupation before graduation. The program provides information regarding colleges where training may be had, work required, finance needed and demand for trained workers.

"Education, the best," Mr. Browder said, "is vital to our youth and to our country. Our students must be fitted to confront the problems of today and tomorrow's world. It will cost money and Americans will have to provide because it is essential."
